

SHIELDS' CLAIM
COVERS MUCH

FORMER MANAGER OF ARCADE
THEATRE BRINGS SUIT IN RE-
PLEVIN TO SECURE PROPERTY
WHICH HE SAYS S. MORTON COHN
WRONGLY WITHHELD.

Valuing to secure an injunction
against S. Morton Cohn, proprietor of
the new Arcade theatre, Edward Shields,
who was ousted from the management,
has brought suit in replevin against
Cohn to recover personal property
valued at \$250, which he says is unlaw-
fully withheld from him.

The papers were filed in Justice
Reid's court late yesterday afternoon.
Constable Jackson served them and Mr.
Cohn filed a bond to keep it until the
case is heard. Mr. Shields' bond in the
suit is for \$500.

In the suit Shields says that he is
"the owner and lawfully entitled to the
possession of the following described
personal property" now at the Arcade
theatre, 330 Washington street:

All the rope now in the house except
the two roller lines on the garden drop
and the long line and center line on the
center door of the fancy drop; a piece
of cable under the stage about 50 feet
long (double conductor No. 8); two
switches and one cut-out in the house
where the machines were; the medallion
or carpet for the stage; all the electri-
cal supplies in locker under the stage
stairs; two torches, two wood seats, the
lash center door and the drapery,
the border lights, 35 wood seat chairs,
the picture frames and easels, the large
mirror in one of the dressing rooms
and the small one on the stage door on
the stage, the center table cover in the
locker, all the globes in the footlights,
the oil drop, the 500-volt rheostat, the
110-volt rheostat, stereophone and poly-
scope complete and two washpans.

The complaint alleges that this prop-
erty is being "wrongfully detained by
the defendant" and that "none of it has
been taken down since the removal of the
same pursuant to an order of the court
under an execution or attachment
against the property of the plaintiff."

Furthermore, it is asserted that
Shields has demanded the possession of
the articles in question and the defend-
ant has "refused, refused and neglected to
deliver them to the plaintiff."

Resisting asking for the property, the
plaintiff prays for \$250 damages and
costs and disbursements.

BORING MAIL WILL
GO BY TROLLEY LINE

Special mail service to Boring has
been discontinued and that place will
be supplied by the Oregon Water Power
& Railway line hereafter. The chief
Clerk Whitney of the railway mail ser-
vice announced the change. It is ex-
pected that the service will shortly be
extended to Cazadero, the end of the
new extension of the Oregon Water
Power & Railway company, 40 miles
southeast of Portland. A hundred men
are at work at this place and a fourth-
class postoffice with a daily service will
be established.

The four carriers to be placed on duty
December 15 at the new substations—
University Park, Woodlawn, Peninsular
and Central—will be selected from
among the substitutes of the city of
Portland. Postmaster Bancroft,
who is confined at his home on account
of illness, has not yet named the new
carriers.

BANDIT'S WIFE SENT
TO JAIL FOR 90 DAYS

After pleading guilty to simple lar-
ceny, Mrs. Emma Johnson, the child
wife of the bandit, was sentenced to
serve 90 days in the county jail by Judge
Cleland in the state circuit court this
morning.

Mrs. Johnson took the sentence
calmly, and seemed evidently to think
that she had got off easy.

In a plea to the court for clemency,
Mrs. Johnson's counsel said that she had
been unfortunate and left almost desti-
tute by her husband, now in the peni-
tentiary. She needed clothes on a cold,
rainy day, and she took what she needed,
but not with criminal intent.

A brother of the woman has be-
friended her and signified his intention
to procure a home for her when she shall
have served her sentence.

CONCESSIONS MAY
AVER DEADLOCK

GOVERNOR MAY BE CONTENT WITH
ASSURANCES THAT SPECIAL SES-
SION WILL BE CONFINED TO TAX
LEGISLATION, AND MAY WAIVE
PLEDGE.

Reports from Salem seem to indicate
that even if Governor Chamberlain does
not receive the explicit pledges he has
asked from the members of the legisla-
ture, he may yet call a special session if
satisfied that nothing but tax legisla-
tion is attempted. Many members who
are in sympathy with the idea that the
session should be confined to this one
matter are nevertheless opposed to making
any promises to the governor, feeling
that he has no right to exact them and
that the legislative department of the
government must not be controlled in that
way by the executive.

Governor Chamberlain may be content
with assurances that no other legislation
is contemplated, and may waive his de-
mand for an explicit pledge from a ma-
jority of the members. In that event,
the danger of a deadlock will doubtless
be averted, for the general sentiment is
undoubtedly in favor of a short session
and an immediate adjournment as soon
as the tax law has been amended so as
to permit the levy of this year's taxes.
In Multnomah county, where the need
of remedial legislation is greatest, the
legislators are almost unanimous in their
resolve not to bind themselves by the
pledge that the governor has asked, and
at the same time most of them are in
accord with the idea that prompted it.
In other parts of the state sentiment
among the lawmakers is divided as to
the governor's request, and in a number
of cases the pledge he asked has been
given.

Only Tax Legislation.
Pendleton, Nov. 14.—Senator C. J.
Smith and Representative W. M. Blakely
have both expressed themselves on the
subject of a special session of the legis-
lature. The former has sent over 25
letters to the various school districts
and municipalities of the county, asking
the opinion of the school boards and the
mayors, and he will be advised by the
letters he receives in answer. But
Senator Smith will consent to ask for a
special session only on the condition
that it be for tax law.

Mr. Blakely is in favor of the session,
but will not tie himself by any pledge,
for he thinks that the members should
not be hampered for fear that some-
thing demanding action might arise be-
fore a session is called. While he has
not said that he will not pledge himself,
he is not in favor of doing so.

Senator Walter M. Pierce is not in the
city at present, but it is said by his
friends that he is in favor of the session
if there are counties that need the
1903 tax.

Opposed to Phelps Law.
Dallas, Or., Nov. 14.—G. L. Hawkins,
representative from Polk county, was
one of the seven men who voted against
the Phelps law at the last session of the
legislature. During the session of 1900
he was chairman of the committee on
assessment and taxation, and helped
make the law that was amended at the
last session.

In an interview today Mr. Hawkins
said: "I not only voted against the
Phelps bill, but I was one of the few
that spoke against it. I was aware
that the legislature was making a grave
mistake when the bill was passed and
became a law. I have received the gov-
ernor's circular letter, but have not yet
replied to the same. You can say for
me that I am in favor of calling a
special session and that the legislative
body should adjourn as soon as this
law has been remedied, but I do not
care to run after the governor asking
him to call a special session. As gov-
ernor of the state of Oregon, he should
consider his duty and act upon his own
responsibility. I have no pledges or
suggestions of any kind to make, and
will have none."

A committee of the Taxpayers' league
is gathering information from the vari-
ous counties of the state and from Sec-
retary of State Dunbar, to ascertain
the amount of county and state indebt-
edness that will probably be created if
there is no levy of taxes for 1903. The
report of the committee has not yet
been prepared.

PEACEMAKER SITS
ON THE LANDLADY

For trying to act as a peacemaker,
S. F. White was made defendant in the
East Side court yesterday on a charge
of assault preferred by Mrs. F. Thomp-
son. At the trial it was brought out
that Mrs. Thompson, who conducts a
rooming-house, had some trouble with
one of her tenants and the latter not
being able to do anything with the
irate mistress of the house, White was
sent for to act as peacemaker. She
charged that he sat on the landlady's
chest for some time. Justice Seton,
in discharging the defendant, said that
it was very plain that White was only do-
ing his duty as a citizen in quelling a
disturbance.

NEW TIME CARD TO
TAKE EFFECT NOV. 22

General Passenger Agent Craig of the
O. R. N. stated today that the new
time-card of his road would not go into
effect before the 22d day of this month.
"We hoped to get the new schedule in
operation by the 15th," said Mr. Craig,
"but a Chinese puzzle is nothing beside a
new timecard and we will have to delay
the inauguration of the various changes
for a week at least."

The Southern Pacific will also change
its schedule on the main line between
Ogden and San Francisco about the 22d,
but no changes are announced for the
local service.

SAN DIEGO HARBOR
GREATLY IMPROVED

New York, Nov. 14.—Prominent ship-
ping men here, including the Lloyds and
the editors of the New York Commercial
and the Journal of Commerce, agree in
commenting on the remarkable progress
on the Pacific coast, as shown by a pri-
vate dispatch from San Diego today, an-
nouncing the first cut across the entrance
to the harbor to a depth of 30 feet mean
at low tide. Shippers here say this is
one of the most important accomplish-
ments of the government on the Pacific
coast in recent years, as it permits the
largest warships and merchantmen to
enter at any stage of the tide for the
first time. It is now the nearest port to
Panama.

A man blind from birth, speaking of
the mental pictures which unfortunately
like himself have of external things,
said:

"We get some idea of shape more
than we do of size. Of color, we have
an idea of black and white and of red,
but I think few, if any, of us can com-
prehend any other hue. We picture the
sun as an immense mass, with red rays
shooting about it, and daylight as a
million white shafts floating above the
earth."

"When a blind man dreams his dreams
are not like those of other people, but
consist almost entirely of sensations of
sound. He cannot dream of scenes and
places, for he has never seen them. For
instance, when we dream of hearing of
our friends we dream of hearing their
voices."

"The sensation of sound and motion
take the place in the dreams of the blind
of the objects which appear in the
visions of the sight to those who can
see. I speak of those who have been
blind always, for of course with those
who are almost entirely of sensations of
sound, he cannot dream of scenes and
places which their waking eyes cannot
now behold, but which may appear
vividly to them in sleep. But one who
has been blind always cannot dream of
seeing."

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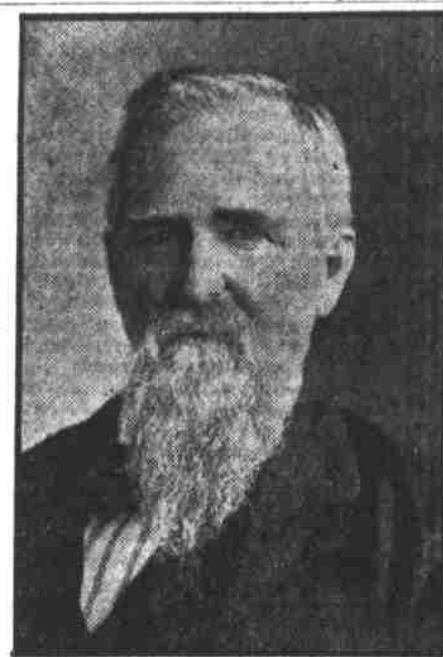
MACEDONIAN LEADER
