A BICYCLE CAUSES THREE RUNAWAYS

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 15.—The bursting of a bicycle tire this morning caused the runaway of three teams. The accident happened at the corner of Fifth and Main streets. The three wagons and teams were on their regular morning routes, one being the Vancouver Merchants Delivery company's wagon, another a milk wagon and the last belonged to the bakery. The two former were stopped a short distance from the starting point, but the bakery delivery team made a quick dash for the city vicinity. The driver was in the act of delivering bread to one of his customers, when the team started. The horses got scared at the cracking noise made by the bicycle and started east on Fifth street, following the regular route made each morning, turning in at the garriage house and not stopping until it arrived at the post canteen. The bakery wagon delivered bread every morning at the canteen, and the horses are well used to the route.

The horses stopped for the usual length of time required to deliver the bread, when of their own accord they turned around and started on the return trip home, meeting the driver very much out of breath trying to catch up. The route taken by the team was very easily ascertained, as there was a continuous string of bread along the road. Beyond this incident there was no damage done.

Denies the Strike.
Mr. Peters, the senior proprietor of the Peters-Hadley sawmill, denies that there was ever a strike or defection among any of his employees, except one man. In support of his contention Mr. Peters has shown checks which have been endorsed by the employees and paid. Mr. Peters says that he has one pay day each month and that on that day he pays his men in full for all services rendered prior to that time. The mill, he claims, has been a thoroughly paying business and has at no time lost him a cent. It is true, he says, that the mill had to close a few times on account of some piece of machinery breaking, which had to be ordered from the foundry, but beyond this there has been no trouble.

The story of the strike and shutdown was circulated, he alleges, for the sole purpose of doing him an injury by a dissatisfied employee, and with the exception of that one man, he says, there is not another dissatisfied man in his camp. In this instance, he further claims, Mr. Turner, who is the dissatisfied man, did not receive his money in full of account, as he requested that he might take lumber in part pay; that he was in need of lumber and it would be as good as cash, and the only reason that Turner had for becoming dissatisfied with that arrangement, made at his own instance, was that he heard of the proposed sale of the mill and refused to run the engine until he went to Portland to see Mr. Peters. During the time Turner was in Portland, the mill closed down for the want of an engineer. Mr. Peters shows receipts whereby Mr. Turner received his pay in full by check on the Peters-Hadley company's bankers.

Mr. Peters further claims that his mill was not established for the purpose of selling lumber, but to manufacture lumber to be used in his own business in connection with his building contracts in Portland and vicinity.

Illustrated Lecture.
Chaplain J. R. Smith of the Nineteenth infantry, gave an illustrated stereoscopic lecture last night in the Post hall. He presented views of Palestine and then spoke of the place being one of the greatest in a historical as well as a religious sense, being the place where the "great professor," the Christ, lived and worked. This he followed up with other views of Palestine in all her glory and grandeur, making suitable remarks and comments to illustrate how the times then compared with our present manner of living. In his explanation, he made an exceptionally strong impression on all of his listeners. In connection with the illustration of Belshazzar's feast, he spoke strongly of how the facts of those times illustrate our daily life of drinking, carousing and other evil practices in this age. That although the handwriting is not seen on the wall as it was presented to the merry-makers at that time, yet the message is being written on the wall of conscience, and will in the end bring judgment not only mentally, but physically, and that judgment of sorrow, misery and death will surely follow as it did with the downfall of Belshazzar.

Won't Pay Dog License.
The case of the city of Salem vs. Gilbert Loftis was tried before a jury Saturday afternoon, on the legality of the action of the police, under the provisions of the ordinance, to arrest the defendant for his refusal to pay the annual dog license. The ordinance provides that the refusal of a dog owner to pay the license shall be followed by the impounding of the dog, or by the arrest of the owner and his punishment by the payment of a fine. Mr. Loftis refused to pay the fine and was arrested. He fought the case and secured a verdict of acquittal.

**JUDGES CLASH IN
THE SALEM COURTS**

(Journal Special Service.)
Salem, Or., Nov. 15.—Litigation in the circuit court here is attracting attention from the apparent clash between the two departments, that presided over by Judge Burnett and the one under the jurisdiction of Judge Boise. Recently, in the city recorder's court, Landlord Whalen brought a suit against L. H. McMahan to oust the latter from a residence occupied by him. McMahan claimed to have a verbal lease on the house for three years, and the complaint was knocked out on a demurrer. Whalen appealed to Judge Burnett's department of the circuit court, where the recorder's court was reversed, the motion overruled and an order issued commanding McMahan to place Whalen in possession of the property. McMahan immediately petitioned Judge Boise for a temporary injunction, restraining Whalen and Sheriff Colbath from interfering with him and his family, and brought suit for the specific performance of the verbal contract alleged to exist between McMahan and Whalen. Judge Boise decides that the injunction will lie to restrain the execution issued out of the department presided over by Judge Burnett out of the first department, and he overruled Whalen's motion to dissolve the injunction.

Plaintiff contends that he leased the house for a period of three years, which term has not expired and that defendant Whalen is attempting to secure the property for the sole reason that the contract was not in writing and therefore void at law. As an equitable defense plaintiff claims to have performed all the conditions of the verbal agreement, and as the contract has been performed, he claims the right to equity enjoyment of the premises. The case will now be tried on its merits.

Frightful Accident.
Bernard Kays, a youth of 18, while out duck-hunting on the slough of the Willamette river above this city, met with a frightful accident yesterday morning, which nearly proved fatal, and which will lay the young man up for some time. The lad, with some companions, pulled across the slough in a skiff to the island in the river, and on landing, reached into the boat for his shotgun. In pulling the fowling piece out of the skiff, the hammer of one of the barrels caught in some way and the gun was discharged, the load taking effect in the lad's left shoulder, tearing a hole twice the size of a man's fist. The badly wounded young man was at once taken to the Salem hospital, where Dr. Byrd administered to him, and while he will be disabled for a long time, he will ultimately recover. An examination of the wound developed the fact that the entire charge entered the shoulder, but, strange to say, not a single one of the large blood vessels was ruptured.

thought of politics, and the one man whom I consulted about it before sending the letter to a Republican. I took the course which I did in the belief that it would meet with the approval of the taxpayers and business men of the state, and that it would best serve the public interest."

Reasons for December Session.
The governor has been urged to call the extra session in December, for the reason that under the existing laws most of the county boards meet early in January to make the tax levy, and if the session were not held until that month, some confusion might result.

In Grant, Lake, Douglas, Wasco, Crook, Morrow, Gilliam, Malheur, Tillamook, Umatilla, Klamath, Columbia, and Wheeler counties, the county board is required to meet in the months of January, March, May, July, September and November.

In Josephine, Curry, Coos and Wallowa, the board meets on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in January, and in April, July and September.

In Sherman the dates of meeting are the same except that the fall meeting is held in October.

In Harney the board meets on the first Wednesday in February, April, June, August, October and December.

The governor's attention was called to the difficulties which might arise if the special session were not convened until January. He replied:

"I do not think it a serious matter, for the legislature could provide for special meetings of the county boards all over the state. But I shall convene the session in December if it can be done."

Debt That Would Accrue.
The Taxpayers' League of this city has prepared a statement of the financial consequences which must ensue if no special session is called. According to this statement the total indebtedness which would be created before December 31, 1904, would be \$4,291,519.01. This does not include, however, expenditures for public roads, which would increase the total by several hundreds of thousands of dollars. In Multnomah county the road tax last year amounted to \$102,528. The taxes of this county are about one third of those in the whole state, and upon this ratio the total road taxes of the state would be in excess of \$300,000. If this sum is added to the estimate of the Taxpayers' League, the entire indebtedness at the end of next year may be figured at over four and a half millions.
