

WILL CLEAN OUT THE NORTH END

CHIEF OF POLICE HUNT IS SWEEPING ORDER WHICH RESULTS IN FIFTY MEN BEING TAKEN TO STATION—SOME SENT TO ROCK ISLE.

Chief of Police Hunt this morning said that he had instructed his officers to thoroughly clean out the north end. With the close of the summer and the stopping of gambling in Washington, numerous desperate men have flocked to Portland. Many of them have spent the hot season in Alaska and come to the Northwest for the winter. Portland being an open town they found conditions to their liking here.

"Every suspicious character who cannot give a certificate of his honest intentions will be rounded up until we clear the city of this riff-raff," said Chief Hunt this morning. "I have detailed officers in plain clothes to go through the north end district, and the policemen in uniform will also be on the watch for bad men. All those who beg or steal and any who cannot show that they are working will be locked up and, with the assistance of the courts, we will scour the city."

As a result of this crusade there were 50 prisoners at the station this morning. When court convened about 35 names were on the docket. There was a larger number than usual of highway robbery and larceny cases. Seven were charged with drunkenness and the like, of vagrancy, begging and the like.

SAYS THE THEATRE IS FOE TO SABBATH

"Whenever you buy a ticket at a theatre door, by your money you encourage the degradation of the whole purity and honor is the glory of the American nation," said Rev. W. H. Selleck, pastor of the Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal church, in his sermon last night on "Can a Christian Consistently Patronize the Theatre?"

Rev. Mr. Selleck denounced the theatre as a foe to the Sabbath, spoke of it as a place tending to lower one's morals and said that no one had ever been known to have come from the playhouse with higher purposes or nobler resolves. "The forms of recreation," said Mr. Selleck, "that cultivate the body, refresh the nerves and mind without contaminating the soul or vitiating the tastes should be heartily encouraged among the young people, but the voice of the church should ever be lifted to warn the young from sinful indulgences."

Mr. Selleck does not deny that there are clean actors and clean plays where Christian people might sometimes derive pure intellectual enjoyment. "Christian ministers are often besieged to join forces with the theatre and make it what it ought to be," he said, "but such efforts, however well intentioned, have universally failed and the church is forced to say to the followers of Christ that the theatre as an institution is pernicious to the spiritual life, good morals and domestic virtue."

"It is," said he, "a foe of the Sabbath, it unsexes women, it is demoralizing to the purity of character of the men and women who make their livelihood by means of their acting, and should be condemned because of the character of the plays presented there."

LINEMAN WESTBROOK FALLS THIRTY FEET

S. Westbrook, a lineman employed by the telephone company, fell over 30 feet from a pole while working on the East Side this morning and was seriously injured. Westbrook has a wrenched hip and dislocated wrist and the doctors fear he is seriously injured internally. He was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital. Mr. Westbrook came to the city recently from Eugene.

SCHOOL BOARD SHORT OF MONEY

MUST BORROW TO MEET SALARIES NEXT PAY DAY—\$60,000 OF THE APPROPRIATION USED TO BUY IN BONDS WHICH WERE HELD IN THE EAST.

The Portland school board will be compelled to borrow money to pay salaries on pay day. This is a statement which Clerk Allen will present at the monthly meeting to be held this evening. The funds, as in many previous years, have run out, and to tide over the time elapsing until sufficient money is on hand to liquidate the claims the board must fall back on its credit at the banks.

Several causes have led to this depletion of school funds. The principal one of which is the expenditure of \$60,000 as a part of the appropriation to buy in the school bonds that were held in the East. These bonds will be sold again soon, and the proceeds will put the school account on a flourishing basis. The school taxes have also been slow about coming in.

"This condition is not unusual," said Mr. Allen today. "It has frequently been the case about this time during previous years that we have had to go to the banks for funds to tide the district over a temporary embarrassment. Our expenses have been unusually heavy also and we have bought in the bonds which were formerly owned by parties in the East. Of course, as soon as the proceeds of local people we will have plenty of money."

WAIT IMPROVEMENT ON CHARTER RATES

The German ship Christel moved this morning to the American Can company's dock, where she will tie up and await an improvement in the charter rates. There are four other grain-carriers in the harbor whose owners are unwilling to accept a prevailing rate, which is about 15s 3d, to the United Kingdom. These disengaged vessels are the British ship Red Rock, the Italian ship Ninfa, the German ship Arthur Fitter and the German bark Professor Koch. A report has it that the French bark Marchal de Turonne has been chartered to load grain at Portland for Europe at 17s 6d. It is generally believed that all the cheap vessels have been taken and that the rates will increase from now on.

DEAD A CENTURY YET THEY LIVE

MEETING IN MEMORY OF THE IRISH MARTYRS ALLEN, LARKIN, O'BRIEN AND WOLF TONE—ADDRESS BY FATHER McDEVITT, FRANK DAVEY AND J. E. MURPHY.

Memorial services in commemoration of the Irish martyrs Allen, Larkin, O'Brien and Theobald Wolf Tone, who lost their lives in the cause of Ireland's freedom over a century ago, were held by the United Irish league in the Foresters' hall yesterday afternoon. Speeches were made by Rev. Father McDevitt, Frank Davey and James Hennessey Murphy.

Vocal solos were rendered by J. P. Meehan and Miss Lena Harwas, and Miss Dillburn read two original poems appropriate to the occasion.

Mr. Murphy opened his lecture on "Wolf Tone" with some caustic allusions to what he termed an Anglo-Saxon propaganda, which he said had been vigorously pushed in this country the past few years by emissaries of a foreign government, whose ultimate object was an alliance of the English-speaking peoples, that is to say, an alliance of England and the United States.

These propagandists he said had invaded every avenue of our literature, they had exploited the glories of the Anglo-Saxon race by special writers in the high-class magazines, and they had invaded a certain section of the daily press. They were in evidence in the mouthings of the shadows of the Pilgrim club of London, as for illustration the recent gathering of the banquet hall patriots at the Hotel Portland, headed by his excellency, "Bombastes Furioso," who clearly went outside of the amenities of the occasion by attacking a friendly government in the capacity of the chief executive of this city.

"But in spite of this," said the speaker, "this noisy minority of Anglo-Saxon patriots have failed in three specific points, viz: They have failed to convince us, first, that the Anglo-Saxon government did not try to strangle liberty in the infancy of this great republic; second, that it undertook to destroy it in its early manhood, and third, that now in order to save itself from the wrath to come of the drugged and debauched peoples that it has fed in a trail of blood and robbed of the birthrights, it would ally itself with this great liberty-loving nation, that is built upon the heroism, sacrifices and blood of noble men who came principally from other nations. Mr. Murphy appealed to these latter people to ally themselves with the Irish brethren and combat this Anglo-Saxon spirit and put a stop to its nascent vaporings."

The speaker paid a splendid tribute to the memory of Wolf Tone.

Frank Davey, in his speech on "Allen, Larkin and O'Brien," caustically referred to certain efforts to injure the names of Ireland's noted martyrs. The editor of the Oregonian, the speaker said, had made an attempt to connect the names of Manchester heroes with fenianism and anarchism, which all true Irish sons would resent. The writer had gone out of his way, he said, to administer a slap to the Irish cause.

Father McDevitt's address was confined principally to the subject of Irish patriotism, and roused the 400 friends and natives of Erin in attendance to a high pitch of enthusiasm. "Thank God that he gave me an Irish heart," said the speaker, and cheers answered the expression.

TRIO OF NEGROES CHARGED WITH THEFT

Dan and Raymond Jackson, brothers, and William Harris, all coal-black negroes, were arraigned in the police court today charged with robbery. They waived examination and were held to the grand jury, bail being fixed at \$2,000 each.

The prisoners are charged with having robbed William Willis of \$25 and a shotgun in his house on the river bank about a mile below the Northern Pacific planing mill. The robbery was committed Saturday night about 7 o'clock. When the men entered his house, Willis was suspicious and edged over toward his shotgun to defend himself, but the bullies struck him over the head with a heavy club.

The Jackson boys admitted their guilt in Delmonico's restaurant, but Harris denied he was implicated. However, in his pocket were a knife and plug of tobacco which Willis identified as his.

NICK WALKER DEAD.

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 23.—Nick Walker, a well-known resident of Umatilla county, was drowned in the Umatilla river near the mouth of Birch creek last evening. Mr. Walker was formerly an extensive farmer near Pendleton and lately operated a large threshing outfit. He leaves a widow and three small children. No particulars of the accident have been received.

WATCHMAN DROWNED.

Earl Hardwick, night-watchman, fell overboard from the steamer City of Eugene Saturday morning and was drowned. His body has not yet been recovered. At the time of the accident the vessel was making ready to leave Magres' wood dock, near Newberg. The local inspectors have been apprised of the accident, but further than to have announcement they have been provided with no details.

CHIEF SUSPENDS OFFICER HOSELEY

PATROLMAN WHO FAILED TO SUBDUCE A MILITARY CAPE ORDERED TO TURN OVER HIS STAFF—LATTER BELIEVES CHIEF HAS FEELING AGAINST HIM.

For failing to provide himself with a military cape, Patrolman Jacob Hoseley was suspended from the police force yesterday. This morning he turned in his star and city property to Chief of Police Hunt.

The matter will be considered at the next meeting of the police committee, and Patrolman Hoseley intends to fight for his retention on the force. That he has been unjustly dealt with is his opinion.

Order of Chief Hunt.

The order of suspension reads as follows:

"Police Headquarters, Portland, Or., Nov. 22, 1903.—To Officer J. Hoseley: On the 10th of the present month an order was issued to the patrol force of this department to put on the winter uniform. Several days prior to this date this branch of the service was ordered to provide themselves with uniform capes. All have complied with this order but yourself. Captain Bailey has spoken several times to you in regard to your getting a cape. Your answer as to your intention has been very unsatisfactory. You failed to comply with the order, and show a disposition to ignore the orders that have been given you. This I consider as a refusal to obey the order which has been given you and is an act of insubordination on your part.

"You are, therefore, suspended from duty as an officer of this department, pending investigation of your conduct by the committee on the police of the executive board. You will deliver to your captain your badge and other property belonging to this department in your possession."

"CHARLES H. HUNT, Chief of Police."

Patrolman Hoseley told Chief Hunt this morning, when he took off his star, that he had given his order to a friend who was delayed by sickness in his family, of which Hoseley knew nothing. This was the cause of his inability to thus far don the military cape with which the other officers are provided. Hoseley will make a legal fight for his place.

SLOT MACHINES MUST CEASE TO GO

Money slot machines in saloons and elsewhere are to be suppressed, according to an order of Chief of Police Hunt. For some time these devices have been running in open defiance of law in every saloon and gambling-house in the city. "Yes, some of the saloon men sneaked in some of these machines on us," said the chief, "but I have ordered them out."

MARTIN CASE IS UP TO THE JURY

The jury in the case of the Indian Martin, accused of the murder of U. S. Grant, is still out at 3 o'clock.

The examination of witnesses in the case of Abe Logan, charged jointly with Martin in the murder of U. S. Grant, was commenced at 2 o'clock this afternoon. It is not thought the 12 jurors will be secured before tomorrow morning.

Austen Wells, George Stratton, William Irwin and Ireland Cochran of La Grande, indicted by the federal grand jury for making counterfeit nickels, were arraigned. Irwin and Cochran pleaded guilty. The others will be placed on trial at the conclusion of the murder trial of Abe Logan.

INCREASE \$2,200,000 INSTEAD OF \$1,200,000

The increase of taxable property in Multnomah county for the year 1903, over the year 1902 is over \$2,200,000, instead of \$1,200,000, as appeared in the journal Saturday. The error was due to an incorrect total in the official figures given out, which made the 1902 valuation appear \$1,000,000 more than they really were.

MUST NOT SELL WHISKY TO REDS

Siletz Indians in Portland, who were called as witnesses in the pending murder cases are allotment men—that is living on farms given them by the government—and it is unlawful to give or sell them intoxicating liquor. United States Attorney John H. Hall said: "I have received instructions from the attorney-general to employ detectives to see that no one supplies the Indians with whisky. Cases of violation will be severely dealt with."

The Indians of the Siletz reservation dress as white men and wear their hair cropped short. Many of them are neat of appearance and speak good English. For years they have farmed and some of them are well to do. Industrious Indians from different tribes are gathered there, as was shown yesterday when witnesses in the Martin case told of the tribe to which they belonged. They are Aikans or Rogue River Indians, Klickitats, Yakimas, Joshuas and Tutuques.

LARGE CROWDS AT ST. MARK'S.

Interest in the mission is continuing to grow and at both the morning and evening meetings large crowds were in attendance. Today's services were held at 6:30, 7:30 and 9:30 o'clock.
