

## BROOKLYN ANNEX ARE FOR A FILL MAY BE CLOSED AT ALDER STREET

**PUBLIC MEETING APPOINTS COMMITTEE TO CO-OPERATE WITH MOTHERS' CLUB IN A VISIT TO BOARD OF EDUCATION—IMMEDIATE ACTION SOUGHT**

At a public meeting held last night in Blank's hall at Powell and East Thirtieth streets steps were taken to prevent the wants of the Brooklyn annex in the way of better school facilities to the board of education. The bad condition of both the main building on Milwaukee avenue and the annex on Powell street was also ventilated by the speakers, with the probable result that the annex will be condemned and closed.

Judge Waldemar Seton was elected chairman and S. F. White secretary of the meeting. A statement of the situation was made by Judge Seton. He said the Brooklyn district had long waited for better school facilities, while other portions of the district had been provided with new and modern buildings. It had been intimated that there was a prejudice somewhere in the board of education against the Brooklyn building and that the time had come to end this unjust discrimination. The people were thoroughly aroused and were determined now that the agitation should not cease until Brooklyn should have a modern building.

### Pronounced It Criminal.

It was reported at the meeting that Dr. Woods Hutchinson and Dr. Mae Cardwell of the state board of health had visited the Brooklyn annex and had pronounced it criminal to allow it to be further used as a schoolhouse; also that Dr. Hutchinson had offered to assist the community in its efforts to secure school facilities. J. A. Stronbridge, Jr., spoke in defense of the board of education and said all the directors were favorable to the erection of a new schoolhouse as soon as some additional ground could be secured south of the present site. He said the title to a portion of the lots in question had been clouded, but would soon be cleared up, when the new building could be erected. Mrs. C. W. Boost and other mothers present commented severely on the action of the board of education in housing children in such a building as the Powell-street annex. It was suggested that since the Stephens building annex was completed the children attending the annex might be sent there, but there was a storm of protest from the mothers present. They said that they could not and would not send their children that distance to school.

On motion of Judge Waldemar Seton, F. G. Urfer and S. F. White were appointed a committee to co-operate with the committee from the Mothers' club in waiting on the board of education about securing a new schoolhouse, and with instruction to take immediate action.

## GETS AWAY WITH A LARGE BANK ROLL

Dallas, Or., Nov. 25.—Bert Gordon was arrested in Salem yesterday on a warrant sworn out by B. Gildner of this city, on a charge of larceny. It seems that Gordon, who is a professional gambler, had been employed by Gildner to conduct a game for him at Independence, about 11 miles from here. On last Monday Gildner was informed by parties at Independence that Gordon was not running the games as he should, and on Monday evening Gildner phoned to another person in Independence requesting him to take Gordon's place. This was done, and when the thief drove into Salem he was promptly arrested and jailed. Gildner swore out a warrant for his arrest last evening and the preliminary hearing will take place at Independence this afternoon.

### Big Turkey Shipment.

Dallas has been a shipping center for dressed turkeys during the past week. On Monday morning 3,000 pounds of dressed birds were shipped from the Southern Pacific depot here, and on Thursday morning another ton of them were sent to the Portland market.

## FIGHTING FOR LIFE OF PLEAS ARMSTRONG

Salem, Or., Nov. 25.—In the supreme court yesterday the motion for a rehearing of the case of Pleasant Armstrong, recently affirmed, was overruled and the matter is now up to the circuit court of Baker county. Armstrong's sentence will now have to be again pronounced, but it is difficult to say whether he will be sentenced to be hanged in Baker county, under the law in force when he was first sentenced, or whether his execution will take place in the penitentiary, under the law now in force. It is said that efforts will be made by Armstrong's counsel to save him from execution, under the conflicting laws, and the outcome will be watched with interest.

## HAS EPILEPTIC FIT AT THE UNION DEPOT

Henry Johnson, a business man of Clatskanie, was seized with an epileptic fit just after boarding the train for Astoria at the Union depot this morning. The train was held for a few minutes until the sick man was given attention, and then the patrol-wagon was summoned to take him to Good Samaritan hospital.

While in the fit Mr. Johnson sustained a scalp wound by falling, but this is not serious. Later in the day his condition was reported as improving, and he will likely be able to return home shortly.

### GOVERNMENT FEED ORDER.

More feed for army mules is wanted by the government for shipment to the Philippines. Bids will be opened at Seattle, December 23, by Quartermaster P. R. Grant for the delivery of 5,435 tons of hay and 4,320 tons of oats at Portland, Tacoma, Seattle or San Francisco. From the point of delivery the feed will be shipped by transport to Manila. The hay and oats are required to be of the best grade.

## LOST IN MOUNTAINS AND NEARLY FROZEN

Eugene, Or., Nov. 25.—Two ranchers, Hans Yates and Charles Gilson, became lost in the mountains west of Eugene Sunday night and came near freezing to death. They were on Yates' homestead, where they had gone to spend a few days. In the afternoon they took their rifles and went out in search of game. Before they realized it, darkness had come on. They tried in vain to retrace their steps, but became bewildered and soon realized that they were lost. They were both in their shirt sleeves, the afternoon having been quite warm, and neither one had any matches with which to start a fire. They found a huge hollow tree into which they huddled to try to keep warm, but the weather suddenly turned colder and they were compelled to hop and jump around to keep up their circulation. When morning finally dawned the two men, almost frozen, followed down a canyon, reaching a rancher's cabin about noon, where they were cared for.

## LOGAN SAYS HE WAS PEACEMAKER

ONE OF THE INDIANS CHARGED WITH SLAYING U. S. GRANT GIVES HIS VERSION OF THE FIGHT—ASSERTS THAT MARTIN PICKED THE QUARREL.

Abe Logan this morning told his story of the killing of U. S. Grant, the Indian he is accused of murdering. Logan gave his version of the drunken scene on the river bank between Grant, Albert Martin and himself. If the story of the witness is the truth Abe Logan was the peacemaker. Apparently friendly, the three began to drink. Finally, when the fumes of liquor had intoxicated them, Martin's bad spirit began to make itself manifest and, in Logan's words:

"He turned to Grant and he said, 'Grant I believe you say other day that I go with your wife.' Grant he say, 'I guess that what I say.' Then Martin he tell Grant guess they better settle it right there. Grant he willin' and start to get off his horse."

At this juncture Logan says he took the part of the peacemaker, but was unable to keep his two drunken companions apart, and left them fighting on the gravel while he staggered to Martin's home for assistance.

It was Mrs. Martin, according to the witness, who suggested that U. S. Hall the stock-raiser, be requested to say nothing about seeing the Indians together on the river bank.

The case is expected to go to the jury late this afternoon.

### Hints at Conspiracy.

"I heard Mrs. Martin tell her sons, George and John, Newberry, that they must save Albert Martin and lay the blame on Abe Logan," mumbled old Joe Cook, patriarch of the Siletz Indian reservation, on the witness-stand in the Logan murder trial yesterday afternoon. "Old Joe," as he is called by the Indians, came to Portland, he said, to "hear the court." He was not subpoenaed as a witness in the trials of Albert Martin and Abe Logan, charged with the murder of U. S. Grant, but he came anyhow. Yesterday he informed the defendant's counsel in the Logan case that he had something to say, and he hobbled into the courtroom and was sworn.

"Old Joe's" voice is weak and his language broken, and the court and attorneys had to gather around the district judge to hear him. By cross-examination United States District Attorney John H. Hall attempted to shake the story of the aged swash, but Joe clung to his story that while waiting outside the coroner's office, where the inquest over the body of Grant was being held, he heard Mrs. Martin arrange with her two sons to save her husband and their stepfather by laying the blame on Logan.

### White Man Gave Liquor.

Mose Lane, an Indian, declared he heard Ed Collins tell the Newberry boys that they should throw the body of Grant in answer to a question Lane admitted that he didn't like Collins because the latter drank too much.

"He's been drunk ever since he came to town," said Lane. "As a matter of fact," asked Mr. Hall, "have you been drinking too?"

Mose admitted that he had. "Who gave you the whisky?" asked the prosecuting attorney.

Attorney Jones, for the defense, objected. "I don't believe the district judge has the power to turn this trial into a grand jury to try Indian whisky cases." But the court allowed the question and the witness replied with a grin that a white man gave him the liquor.

### Saw Blood on Logan's Face.

Mrs. Martin, John Newberry and Mrs. Logan declared that they saw blood on Logan's face the night of the murder. Mrs. Martin said Logan remarked to her husband that they ought to pay W. S. Hall, who saw them at the ford with Grant, to "keep his mouth shut."

Tom Macdonald and his wife, two Siletz Indians who reside at Siletz, said they passed the Woodman ford early on the evening of the killing and saw Grant, Martin and Logan together. Later, as they returned, they heard voices raised in anger and heard Abe Logan say, "Stop killing that man!"

## ASKS HALF SHARE FOR TRADE MARK

An unusual suit was filed in Justice Reid's court yesterday by Paul Strain against T. G. Bligh. Strain sues for one half interest in Bligh's saloon because he claims the latter has infringed on his rights in naming his place "The Hub."

Strain, in his complaint, alleges that when he began business at Third and Burnside street he named his clothing store "The Hub" and designated the hub of a wheel as his trade mark. This he claims to have registered with the secretary of state. This, he says, was done because he desired the exclusive use of the name in the state. He alleges that Bligh has christened his saloon at 148 Sixth street "The Hub" and therefore has infringed upon his rights. Bligh, the document alleges, though asked to do so, has failed to remove the name and trade-mark from his business property.

Mr. Strain therefore asks for a one half interest in the saloon, valued at \$500, or \$250 and the costs of the action.

### HARRIMAN IN UTAH.
