ARCADE ELECTRIC SIGNS TORN DOWN

UNDER NOTIFICATION THAT HE WOULD GO TO JAIL AT 6 O'CLOCK IF HE FAILED TO ACT, PROPRIETOR S. MORTON COHN REMOVES THEM.

Pursuant to the order of the city council street committee yesterday, S. Morton Cohn, proprietor of the Arcade theatre, this afternoon tore down the large electric sign in front of his establishment on Washington street. They will not be replaced until a petition which he filed at the city hall today is granted. The committee did not mince words during an interview with Mr. Cohn and notified him if the signs were not down at 6 o'clock today he would go to jail. The signs came down.

When the Arcade theatre management erected its electrical advertising signs without permits from the proper authorities, and afterwards sent each of the councilmen an annual pass, it started a movement that will end in a strict observance of the law hereafter. Failure to comply with the exact intent and meaning of the ordinance will be followed by arrests.

M. G. Cohn, representing the theatre management, explained to the committee yesterday that there had been a misunderstanding. "We want you to wait until the owner returns," he suggested.

"Wait nothing," shouted Councilman Bentley. "Those signs have no business up there, and it was an insult to the members of the council when those passes were sent to us. I move that if the signs are not down by 6 o'clock tomorrow the proprietor be arrested." The motion carried.

Mr. Cohn's explanation was meant as a peace offering. He had intended all the time, he said, to send the members of the council annual passes, but had carelessly overlooked it.

In connection with another street-sign violation, Councilman Sharkey narrowly escaped arrest. He was formerly proprietor of the New Grand Central hotel, which was said to have a sign up contrary to law. Bentley's motion that a warrant of arrest be sworn out for the council member fell flat when the latter explained that he had sold out.

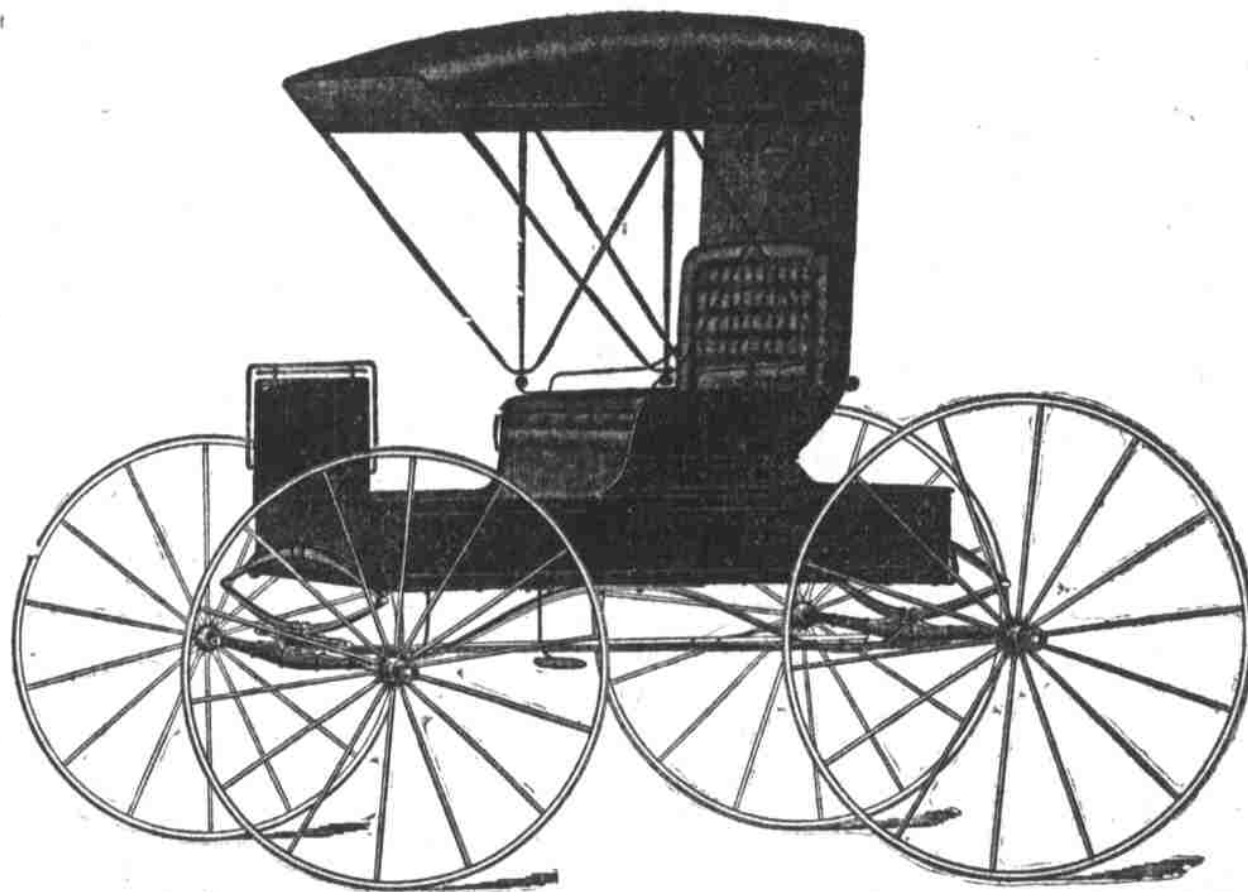

ITALIAN SHIP TAKEN FOR LUMBER

Balfour, Guthrie & Co. chartered the Italian ship Nimpa this morning to carry lumber to Cape Town, South

Africa. The rate is reported to be 42 shillings, which is a material advance. Heretofore the prevailing tariff has been about 39 shillings for transporting lumber to South Africa.

A few days ago the owners of the Nimpa rejected an offer of 17s 6d to carry a wheat cargo to the United Kingdom. It is stated that the lumber cargo will net more than would the wheat at

this rate. Only two vessels are in port that are not fixed for outward cargoes.
