

WOMEN ACT AGAINST MOBILE GAMBLING HOMESLEY ON DUTY; Last Soldier of 82 Hemsworth to Go Vigorous at 17

**CHIEF HUNT GIVES PATROLMEN
A LIST OF OVER FIFTY SALOONS
IN WHICH CASE-PAYING SLOT
MACHINES APPEAR TO BE WORK-
ING—ORDERS INVESTIGATION.**

Ample notice has been given to the saloon men about the city that money slot machines are under the ban, but apparently these pernicious gambling devices are running as openly as heretofore. A few days ago Chief of Police Hunt stated that his officers had reported to him that there were no machines in operation.

At roll call this morning the men on the day relief were given a heart-to-heart talk by the chief and by General Beebe of the police commission. The chief came out squarely against the machines and ordered his men to report to him every device which is seen in operation.

The chief read off a list of over 50 saloons where, according to what he had learned, the money machines were in open view and were being worked. "I have a word of explanation in regard to the slot machines," began Chief Hunt. "They went in originally as trade devices, but it has come to me that some of the saloon men have substituted money for checks. This is clearly a case of gambling. I have been told that some of the saloon men were assured that S. Morton Cohen would stand by them in case of arrest. Some of them want to pay a bonus or percentage for the privilege of running and thus create a monopoly. This will not be tolerated. In some cases attempts have been made to evade the order by mixing trade checks and money."

Gives a List of Places.

In enumerating the places to be watched the chief mentioned saloons in all portions of the city. Among them were the following: J. B. Nye, saloons at 83 1/2 Third street and 318 West 11th; Nemo saloon, 321 Second street; Olympia saloon; P. A. Allen, Third and Everett; W. Mills, Third and Salmon; Phoenix saloon, Third and Couch; Matias saloon, 290 Salmon; Peterson, at Quimby street near J. B. Bomedich, Third and Morrison; T. A. Stewart, Third and Washington; 1012 East Belmont; A. Shapiro, Mase Cafe; Swanson's saloon, 781 Washington; Surprise saloon, Third and Flinders; B. Strive's saloon, Third and Morrison; Sixth and Couch; Ellis & Bach, 41 Sixth street North; Shaffer's saloon, 288 Burnside; Tracey & Denny, 105 Fourth street; C. Brown, Fourth and Everett; Prachtman's place, Third and Morrison; William Cox, Third and Clatsop; The Waldorf, Park and Morrison; Belser, North Third; Atlantic Cafe, 61 Third street; Whitney & Snyder, 224 Yamhill; Barr hotel, 310 Glisan; Cactus hotel, Sixth street; Sing Wah, 230 Second street; Wing John, Second street; Esmond hotel, Front and Morrison; Fred Fritz, Second and Burnside; Grotto saloon, Third and Yamhill; Hub and Kratz's cafe, Sixth street; Merchant hotel, North Third street.

Referring to Nye's saloon, Chief Hunt stated he was satisfied the machines were played for money there. In regard to Allen's saloon he said there was evidently no attempt to disguise the fact that the machines were money devices. He told the men that the place at 1012 East Belmont has two nickel machines. In the list the chief had the name of Mrs. Steele, who he said to the officers ran a sporting house at Sixth and Stark streets.

"Don't go near it and bother her," he admonished the detail.

Beebe Baps the Oregonians.

Following the chief's advice to the officers, General Beebe said: "I noticed with much pleasure when in the East that the Oregonians had a little to say about the police. The tirade which was carried on for a time previous to my departure seemed to have ceased. But during the last few days it seems to have broken out again. This appears remarkable, owing to the fact that it comes immediately upon the return of Mr. Sichel and myself, who came back together. It seems the more remarkable that it has started again, and this will undoubtedly result in an attack in not upon the police department proper, but upon the police commissioners."

"While in the East I investigated the departments there and our own little force looks as well to me as any of them, even that of New York."

FARMERS' BODIES TO MERGE.

Prominent among those actively interested in the movement are Harvie Jordan of Georgia, president of the Farmers' National congress; R. P. Hamer, president of the South Carolina Agricultural Association, and Senator W. A. Drake of Fort Collins, Colo.

**PATROLMAN SUSPENDED FOR FAIL-
ING TO SECURE A REGULATION
MILITARY CAPE IS REINSTATE-
D—WARM SESSION OF EXECUTIVE
BOARD REPORTED.**

Patrolman Jacob Hoesley, who was suspended from duty a week ago for failing to secure a uniform cape, returned to duty this morning. He was clad in a military uniform. When relieved from duty last week Patrolman Hoesley stated that he had ordered a cape, but his tailor had been unable to complete it in time, and therefore he was not guilty of any intentional infraction of the rules of his superiors. With Patrolman Frank Hemsworth he was tried by the police commission Friday, and yesterday it was announced that Hoesley could return to work whenever he appeared in a cape, although his suspension had been forfeited the right to a vacation and would not be paid for the time he was off duty.

In order to lose no time Hoesley borrowed the cape belonging to Hemsworth, who is slated for dismissal if the recommendation of the police committee is adopted by the executive board. This was evidently satisfactory, for Hoesley was received into the folds of the department again.

While Hemsworth will not discuss his case at the present time, it is believed he will make a hard fight to retain his position. This he will do, not so much for the job himself as to clear himself of the stigma of being dismissed while under charges.

That the meeting of the executive board Friday will be a warm one is likely. There are several members who are said to be willing to espouse Hemsworth's cause, and the matter may cause considerable acrimonious discussion. The fact that the police committee had put the matter up to the board seems to indicate that it desires to shirk the responsibility of discharging the officer.

There is another story in circulation to the effect that the recommendation to let Hemsworth go was made because it was thought he intended to resign after being cleared of the charges. Then it was feared he might tell more than would be comfortable for certain people. For this reason it was decided to drop him, so that if he gave out any inside information the commissioners could point to his discharge and say that he was "sore."

ment has shown that a fine quality of bread is made from macaroni wheat.

Insufficient Rainfall.

"Nearly one-third of the area of the United States has insufficient rainfall, and in spite of the extension of irrigation enormous areas must remain in the present arid or semi-arid condition, and the bureau of plant industry is occupying itself with the future of these regions. It is believed that by intelligent management the grazing capacity of these lands can be increased. The department is endeavoring to secure plants that will grow in very dry soils and at the same time yield crops profitably marketable."

Greatest of the World.

Although the consumption of cotton in this country is greater than in any other country in the world, yet, in addition to the cotton raised here, the South exported last year over three and a half billion pounds of cotton, worth \$317,000,000.

Of grain and grain products the export exceeded in value \$221,000,000, and the supply of animal meats and products the value of exports was \$211,000,000.

The balance of trade shows that the favorable balance to the credit of this country is due entirely to the farmers. The balance of trade in favor of the farm products during the last 15 years, no year excepted, aggregated \$4,806,000,000. In products other than that of the farm during the same period the balance of trade was adverse to this country to the extent of \$365,000,000. Our farmers not only cancelled this immense obligation, but placed \$3,940,000,000 to the credit of the nation when the books of international exchange were balanced. He concludes that "it is the farmer who have paid the foreign bondholders."

Reviewing the magnitude of the agricultural productions, after giving the figures of the most important crop there is, found that the value of all farm products exported to live stock for 1903 considerably exceeded their value in the census year, when it was given as \$2,742,000,000.

Awful Losses. An investigation of the great forest fires of September, 1902, in Washington and Oregon disclosed a total loss aggregating nearly \$18,000,000. Most of the destruction was due to carelessness, and might easily have been avoided.

Examinations and reports dealing with technical problems in the management of forest reserves have been made for reserves in Utah, California, Oregon and New Mexico. Representatives of the bureau have, during the past summer, examined over 120,000 acres proposed as forestry reserves in the Rocky mountain and Pacific coast states.

Great difficulty exists in the protection of game in Alaska, owing to the absence of an appropriation permitting the employment of competent wardens. Several experiments substituting have been opened and are being conducted with interesting results in Alaska. The secretary urges the necessity for additional buildings at the central station, and the addition of a game preserve and live stock. He suggests the desirability of partaking in the practical experiments in live stock, and suggests an experiment with Galloway-bred cattle similar to that authorized by congress in the case of reindeer.

The work of the station in Hawaii is being carried on as actively as the appropriations at the secretary's disposal will permit.

The office of experiment stations has also continued its investigations with a view to furnishing information regarding the requirements and possibilities of irrigation. The secretary points out the desirability of undertaking a special study of power in relation to running pumps, and points out how the information thus collected may be made useful in other lines of farm work. He regards this line of work as so important that he has recommended a special appropriation to enable the department to extend its operation to agricultural engineering, especially on the application of power to farm machinery.

HEALTH BOARD ASKS FOR \$13,730

MR. BIERSDORF TURNS IN HIS ESTIMATE—MUCH INTEREST IN THE REPORT OF THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION IN PREPARATION BY ITS CLERK.

For the operating expenses of the city of Portland the health department during the year 1904 it will require a sum approximating \$13,730 for expenses. This is the estimate completed yesterday by Health Officer Biersdorf and presented for verification at the annual session of the health board this morning.

The estimate divides the total into the following departments: Salaries, \$5,040; materials and supplies, \$2,600; miscellaneous, \$4,090. Under the head of "miscellaneous" is listed the operation of the pesthouse-inspection and quarantine, and the hundred and one things which constitute the duties of the department. An additional appropriation of \$5,000 more is requested for the erection of more crematoriums at the city garbage crematorium, doubling the present capacity. The original crematorium cost \$14,000, and there are only two furnaces, but the additional furnaces, it is thought, can be installed now for a sum not exceeding the amount specified.

It was explained that the crematorium is just now running to its capacity and that next year it will be impossible to handle the refuse and rubbish which is sent there to be destroyed. The plan is to have the furnaces require cleaning out, which happens once in six weeks, the work falls just that much behind and it is next to impossible to catch up. This brings the total appropriation for that department up to \$13,730.

License Officer Lotan today made out his estimate of stationery and blank supplies for the department during the year 1904. One radical change has been determined on. All wagons and rigs, instead of being designated by their generally accepted names, will be classified simply as single and double vehicles. Heretofore a separate license form had to be used for each separate style of vehicle.

M. E. CHURCH SOUTH SEEDS PASTOR HERE

THE REV. E. H. MOWIE TO HOLD INITIAL SERVICES IN PORTLAND NEXT SUNDAY—NAMED AT COLUMBIA CONFERENCE HELD AT CORVALLIS.

The first congregation of the Methodist church South, to be established in Portland will hold its initial service at 171 1/2 Second street next Sunday. The Rev. E. H. Mowie was appointed to the Portland pastorate by Bishop Morrison of Louisville, Ky., at the Columbia conference of the South church held in Corvallis, Ore., two months ago. Mr. Mowie arrived in this city over a week ago from Phoenix, Ariz., secured temporary church quarters and has already a congregation of about 50 persons. Funds for erecting a church building will be furnished by the mission board of the South church. At a meeting for organization, to be held perhaps next week, the pastor will announce his appointment of stewards and trustees, subject to confirmation by the quarterly conference, which will be held this fall. Henry Spiess, presiding elder of the Columbia conference, is expected to come from Halsey, Ore., to visit the new congregation within a few weeks.

The Methodist church South has 2,000,000 members in the United States, 1,000,000 less than the North church. Two of its conferences embrace Oregon and Washington, East Columbia and Columbia. The dividing line is the Cascade mountain range. Portland is in Columbia conference.

LOYAL LEWIS LEGION ASKS FOR DAY AT FAIR

Supreme Chancellor F. P. Lewis of the Loyal Lewis Legion has written the Lewis and Clark fair corporation asking that a day be set apart during the summer of 1905 for the society. This society is composed of lineal descendants of the historic family of Lewis, of which the famous explorer was a member. The order secured from the St. Louis management September 23, 1904, as their day, this being the 95th anniversary of Lewis and Clark's return to St. Louis after their journeys in the Northwest.

It is asked by the chancellor that the Lewis and Clark fair Legion day be on the 100th anniversary of the explorers' return to Portland. Though the order is an Eastern one and most of its members live in New England, the supreme council resides in Seattle and there are many members of the legion scattered over the country.

GASOLINE EXPLODES IN SANDWICH WAGON

A sandwich wagon stationed at Fourth and Davis streets was almost entirely destroyed by fire at 12:10 o'clock this morning. The blaze was occasioned by the explosion of a can of gasoline. When chemical arrived the interior of the moving kitchen was filled with flames, but the firemen soon extinguished them. The loss will be about \$200. No one was injured.

After putting out the fire in the union depot early yesterday morning the members of chemical and hose companies 1 were given sandwiches, coffee, cake and cigars by James W. Latimer, proprietor of the restaurant at the depot. The men are grateful for the treat.

IOWA IMPLEMENT DEALERS.

(Journal Special Service.) Davenport, Ia., Dec. 1.—Members of the Iowa Retail Implement Dealers' association, several hundred in number, are gathered in Davenport for their annual convention, which will be in session during the next three days. The convention is one of the largest and strongest of its kind in the country and its conventions are always of great interest to the trade. The presiding officer of the convention is O. V. Eckert, of Northwood, and the secretary, D. M. Grove, of Nevada, Ia.

GAMBLERS' MIX-UP CLOSES THE TOWN

Independence, Or., Dec. 1.—Friday afternoon a trial was held in this city of a young man by the name of Bert Gordon who was arrested on a charge of stealing. The man who caused his arrest is from Dallas, named Baldy Gilder, who loaned him a sum of money with which Gordon was to open a saloon in the Imperial saloon at this place. Gordon opened the saloon game and conducted a gambling game for something like three or four weeks, when Gilder telephoned down to Independence to see if he could not have some one else run the game. Gordon left his hired help in charge of the game and went to Dallas to talk the matter over with Gilder and his partner Wilkeson, who claims to be interested in the money. At the trial Gordon was bound over to appear before Judge Burnett at the circuit court in December. The evidence disclosed that all parties were interested in gambling, and as a result all of the saloons in Independence have closed their games which heretofore have been open and running in full force. This is the first time gambling has been entirely closed in this city for a number of years.

When Gordon returned home from Dallas he took charge of his game again and settled up with the saloon, paying them their commission and took a team for Salem that night, and was going to Cottage Grove to reopen another game in a saloon there. He was arrested without a warrant at Salem, and returned to Independence, where he stood trial.

After the meeting an excellent dinner was served. Mrs. Hurley has held her present position as secretary in this lodge since its first organization here, almost six years ago.

Lewis and Clark Club.

The ladies of the Lewis and Clark Centennial club will hold a big dance on Friday in the Auditorium at this place. The orchestra here has already been secured. The club is endeavoring to raise a sum of money upon the fair appropriation proposition, wherein prizes are offered to the clubs sending in the most money by certain dates. The club feels highly elated over the fact that they won the big prize of the pennant over all contestants in this state, and it has aroused a great deal of enthusiasm in the lodge of Lewis and Clark ladies generally. They opened their meetings in the city hall on account of the insufficiency of the private houses to accommodate the people.

**TACOMA HAS MANY
CASES OF BURGLARY**

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 1.—Several night burglaries have taken place in Tacoma during the past week and as many as half a dozen stores and saloons have been entered and robbed. Last night a robbery was committed and down the drug store of Michael Bros., in the southern part of the city, was entered and robbed of \$75 worth of booty and \$2.50 in cash. A window was broken to gain entrance. On Thanksgiving morning E. Martin's saloon in the same vicinity was robbed and the store of O. G. Austin nearby was visited at the same time.

Violent Stabbing Affray.

A violent stabbing affray in a downtown saloon occurred here Saturday night, in which George Christie, a Sicilian, severely cut about the face and head by a countryman named Paolo Arena. The fight followed a slurring reflection upon the king of Italy.

Christie was sitting in a chair when the other Sicilian approached and began abusing him in Italian. Suddenly he whipped out a knife and stabbed again and again. Christie's nose was almost severed from his face and a severe cut extends from his nose to his right cheek bone, laying the skin open to the bone. He is now lying in the hospital. His assailant, who belongs to the colony of Italian fishermen on the bay, disappeared in the confusion following the fight and is still in hiding.

One Italian says the trouble grew out of a long-standing quarrel. Another cause is said to have been a demand made by Arena for 5 cents which Christie owed him. Hot words followed which led to the insult to the ruler of Italy and the drawing of knives. Christie is said to have tried to draw first, but Arena had his knife up his sleeve.

FAIR COMMISSION HAS EXPENDED \$4,992

The monthly report of the State Commission of the Lewis and Clark fair has been made public and shows the total expenses of the body from the time of inauguration to the present to be \$4,992.55.

STATE SUPREME COURT DECIDES TWO CASES

(Journal Special Service.)

Salem, Or., Dec. 1.—The supreme court decided two cases yesterday. They were:

E. Adams, respondent, vs. W. H. Kelly et al., appellants, appeal from Baker City; Hon. Robert Eakin, judge; decision reversed. Opinion by Associate Justice C. E. Wolverton. This was a proceeding by a writ to review the proceedings that were had before W. H. Kelly, recorder of Greenhorn City, who was acting as justice of the peace, the plaintiffs claiming that the officer was without authority to act as justice. The circuit court having denied the defendant's motion to dismiss the writ of review, rendered a judgment and the defendants appealed. The appellate court, however, holds that the city recorder was authorized to entertain the action, and the judgment of the circuit court is reversed.
