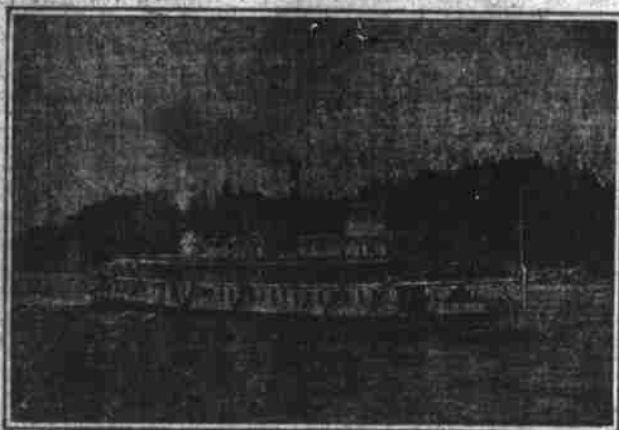

FIFTY MORE WOULD OPEN SALOONS

INCREASE IN NUMBER OF AP-
PLICATIONS FOR PERMITS TO SELL
LIQUOR—INSPECTORS JOGGING
MERCHANTS, DOCTORS AND LAW-
YERS WHO ARE BEHIND IN DUES.

During the past few days more than
2,500 applications for licenses for 1904
have been sent out to merchants in all
parts of the city. At the present time
Licenses Inspectors, Hutchinson and Mc-
Eachren are busy in an attempt to
straighten up their books for this year,
and for this purpose they are after de-
linquents with a sharp stick.
Physicians, dentists and attorneys who
have forgotten to pay their official dues
are receiving attention from these offi-
cers. Some of these professional men
are three quarters behind, but most of
them are liable only for the last quar-
ter of the present year.
"We want them all to settle up at
once," said Inspector Hutchinson this
morning. "For we will be able to give
them but little notice. We have to
close our books for the year soon, and

BURGLAR ENTERS VIA A TRANSOM

Some person thoroughly familiar with
the premises is believed to have fobbed
the Cosmopolitan saloon at Third and
Davis streets between 1 and 5 o'clock
this morning.

When the place was opened about 5
a. m., the cash register was found rifled
and two slot machines had been broken
open and their contents taken. Investi-
gation proved that the prowler got into
the place by pushing open the transom
over the rear door. The amount of

money taken is not definitely known but
it is not believed to be more than a few
dollars. The slot machines were em-
ptied yesterday so that they did not con-
tain a great amount.
The hooks fastening the transom were
not broken, thus showing that they had
been unhooked before the saloon was

closed. When the thief was ready to
work he simply had to push the transom
open. This leads the officers to believe
the burglar is a frequenter of the dive.
MONMOUTH NORMAL AFIRE.
Monmouth, Or., Dec. 10.—The Oregon
State Normal school took fire Tuesday

at about 1:30 p. m. The building was
saved from a total loss by the efficient
work of the people in Monmouth and the
students at the school. There is no
water supply at Monmouth, except the
engine in the basement of the school,
which is strong enough to force a small
stream. The fire broke out in the west

part of the big brick building and was
caught from the big pipe that runs up
the west end of the training department
building.
The whole of the west roof is totally
destroyed. The girls of the school did
excellent work, carrying water from the
tank on the third floor of the building

to the roof, where men were stationed
endeavoring to put out the fire. The
hook and ladder department from Inde-
pendence was called upon, but arrived
too late to be of any service.
