SLOT MACHINES TURNED TO WALL

(Journal Special Service.) Eugene, Or., Dec. 18.—The city authorities have ordered all money-paying nickel-in-the-slot machines to be closed, and today the scores of machines in the various saloons and cigar stores were turned face to the wall and the "rounders" who were wont to throw away their small change this way wore a disappointed look when informed that they could not play the machines.

This move is following on the heels of the closing down of the gambling games. While many contend that the present moral wave is only a repetition of former spasmodic actions on the part of the city officials along this line, the police declare that they intend to keep the game closed all the time if it is possible to do so.

INSANE MAN WRITES GOV. CHAMBERLAIN

(Journal Special Service.) Salem, Or., Dec. 18.—Governor Chamberlain is in receipt of a letter from a patient at the insane asylum, who demands to be heard before the legislature at the coming special session. The letter is as follows, given verbatim:

"December 8th, 1903. J. F. Calbreath, Resident Superintendent, of Oregon State Hospital, Marion County, Oregon, of the United States, of America.

"You Stated, unto me, yourself, that Governor, George E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State, of Oregon, of the United States, of America, had called a special session, of legislature, to convene, on the 21st, of this month.

"I demand, of Governor, George E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, of the United States, of America, that, special session, of legislative, rights, when, it, is, in, Special Session, I am, respectfully, Mott, Smith, an, equalled voter, of, the United States, of America."

He is 50 years old and weighs 210 pounds.

CITY OFFICIALS MUST WORK FOR FUN

(Journal Special Service.) Corvallis, Or., Dec. 18.—At a meeting in October the council an ordinance was passed which provided that both councilmen and mayor were to receive \$2 each for each meeting. This was deemed a good thing, as it would insure better attendance. At a meeting Monday night, however, the ordinance was repealed by a majority vote, having shown that the action was not in conformity with the city charter.

The Tax Levy. The revenue from city taxes for general purposes will be \$3,850 the coming year, and for streets \$1,540. A levy has been made of 5 mills for general and 2 mills for street purposes, and the estimate is drawn from this. The total taxable property is \$710,000. The increase of revenue from this source over that of last year will be, for general purposes about \$1,400, and for street purposes \$560.

Will Appeal the Case. At the last council meeting it was unanimously voted to appeal the case of Mary Smith to the supreme court. It concerns the right of the city to punish individuals other than regular liquor dealers for giving intoxicants to minors. The case was tried before the circuit court on appeal from the city police court, and the circuit court decision denies the right of the city to punish such persons except they be saloonkeepers.

A Double Wedding. There was a pretty double wedding at the home of Mrs. Tucker yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The brides were Misses Evelyn and Lella Tucker, and the grooms Lewis F. Gray and Arthur J. Allen. The wedding march was played by Miss Grace Lowell, and Rev. Green of the Congregational church performed the ceremony. Fifty guests were present.
