

AN EQUAL RATIO ON ALL HOLIDAYS

PACIFIC COAST LEAGUE MAKES AN IMPORTANT DECISION WHEREBY HOME AND VISITING CLUBS SHARE RECEIPTS EQUALLY—MEETING ADJOURNS.

(Journal Special Service.)
San Francisco, Jan. 5.—The magnates of the Pacific Coast league were occupied during a considerable portion of yesterday's session with discussing a schedule of games for next season. This is a very important matter and the greatest of care must be used in order that each club shall secure an equal division of the best dates.

The schedule committee, in order to formulate a satisfactory list, each member withdrew to draw up a rough draught as an outline and from each of these the regular schedule will be adopted.

Equal Division at Holiday Games.

One move on the part of the league, which gives excellent satisfaction, is that whereby they voted for an equal division of the gate receipts.

The proposition to give President Burt more authority in the matter of discipline than has been accorded the league head heretofore met with unanimous approval. The president may now suspend or fine any player who is guilty of a breach of the league rules, without referring the case to the directors.

The league further adopted a resolution whereby each club manager was to receive 25 copies of the rules and regulations, the same to be distributed among the players on the various teams in the league, with instructions to peruse them carefully, for no excuses regarding ignorance of the league formula, will be accepted as a plea in defense of any breach thereof.

The Los Angeles club was assessed with an additional fine of \$200 for Captain Dillon's offense at Seattle. The matter of selecting a competent staff of umpires for next season has been left to President Burt. It seems probable that Jack O'Connell, possibly Jim McDonald, will be asked to officiate in that capacity. Just who the other man will be is not known as yet, but it is hinted that a northern man is under consideration. The uniforms worn while a team is playing at home will again be white, no definite color being designated for the road suits.

The northern delegates will probably leave for their homes tonight as all the important business has been transacted and the meeting adjourned.

ILLEGAL SHOOTING OF DUCKS.

The fact that a party of would-be sportsmen have been using automatic pump guns in their duck-shooting excursions to the Columbia slough in the vicinity of the Vancouver road, has been brought to the notice of the public. The men in direct violation of the law have on several occasions succeeded, with the aid of unlawful deceptions, in killing several hundred ducks in a day, which is in itself contrary to the law. Something should be done immediately to prevent these parties from future violation of the law and unwarranted and illegal destruction of game fowl. As there is a law with a penalty attached, these men should be made to feel the full measure of justice required in their case.

HIGH-BRED FOWLS ON PARADE.

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MAIDEN SAYS MILE IN 1:50

THE VETERAN TURFMAN BELIEVES THAT A TROTTER WILL BE DEVELOPED THAT WILL LOWER DILLON'S RECORD BY SEVERAL SECONDS.

Lexington, Ky., Jan. 5.—John E. Madden, although having forsaken the harness turf years ago for the thoroughbred, still takes a lively interest in his former work and is one who holds optimistic views regarding the harness horse development.

"You ask me if Lou Dillon's record will ever be broken, I should say 'Sure,' as I believe that like our race horses, trotters are being bred speedier every year. Tracks are faster, sulky appliances and equipments are hourly being improved upon and with continued improvement in the breed of trotters 20 years from now 1:50 may be the champion mark and two-minute horses by no means of unusual appearance.

"I look also for an expansion in trotting horseracing in the near future. The brilliant performances of stars like Lou Dillon, Major Delmar and Crescens in one season, with Dan Patch and Prince Alert among the pacers as side issues, has given the game a great boost, and the next few years will see much new capital invested in light harness horses. But I figure that I would be a little green in that line now and I reckon I had better stick to my thoroughbreds and see if I can't win the Futurity again in 1904."

Doug Thomas has aroused much interest in trotting circles here by the announcement that he is not averse, if his owner is willing, to let Katherine A., the 2-year-old Kentucky Futurity winner of 1902, meet E. E. Smathers' sensational \$20,000 Saddle Mac in a series of 4-year-old races in 1904. While the daughter of Peter the Great defeated the Clay filly in both the Futurity and Kentucky stakes, her trainer still is not willing to concede that Saddle Mac is superior to the Bourbon county bred and owned filly. Thomas says the sickness Katherine A. passed through last year makes it remarkable that she ever raced as a 3-year-old, and he is confident in another season, having now even recovered from her severe illness of last season, that she will prove her superiority over Saddle Mac or any other 4-year-old of 1904.

Those intimately acquainted with James E. Clay incline to the belief that he will not stand in the way of his sensational daughter of Wiggins meeting Smathers' filly in a series of races. His only reason may be on account of Katherine A.'s mark of 2:11. She will be eligible when a 5-year-old to all the rich, slow-class purses and he may decide to lay her over next season for a heroic campaign in 1905 for the big events which enabled Billy Buck to be such a star money winner the past racing season.

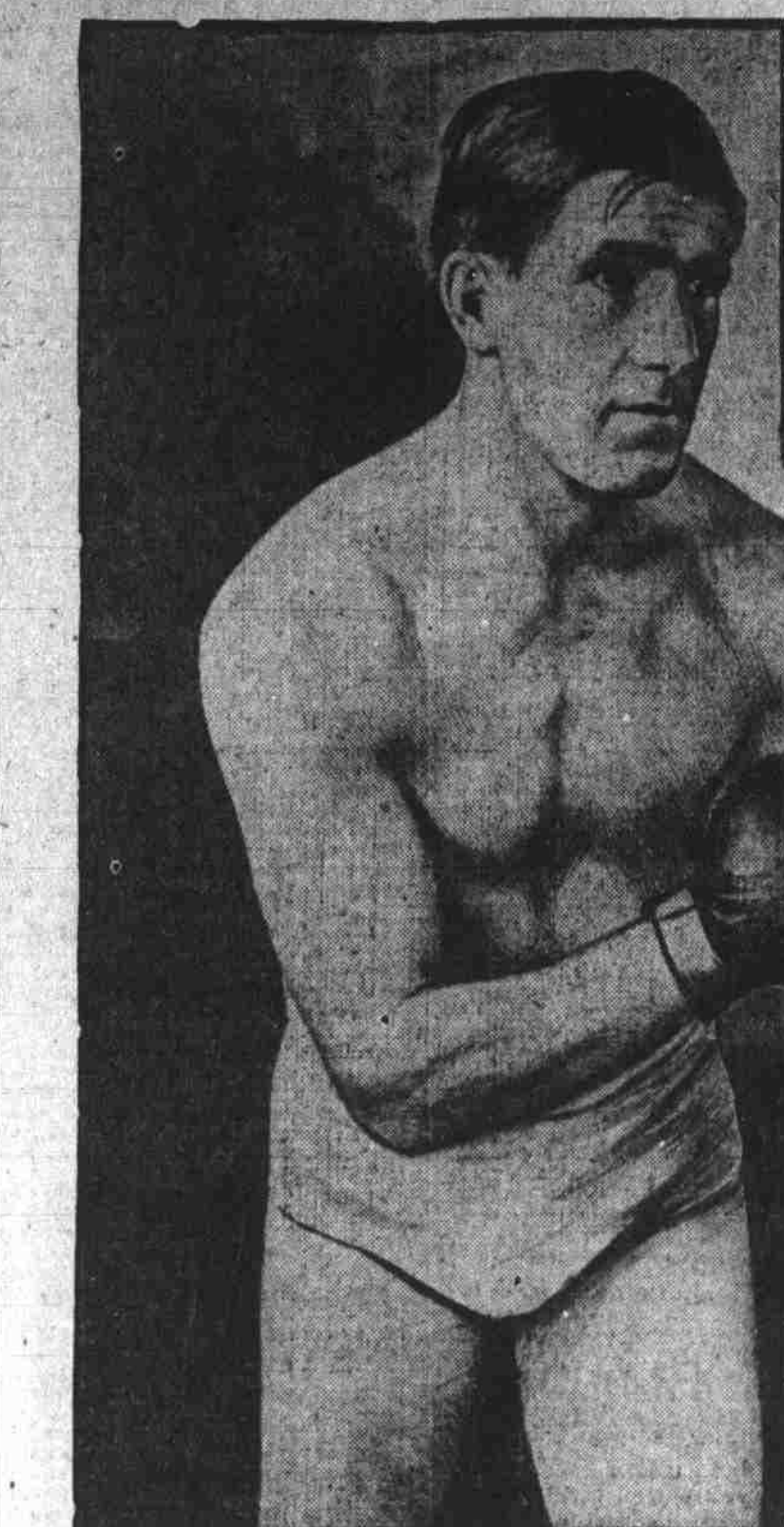

CHEMAWA INDIANS DEFEAT RELIANCE

Salem, Or., Jan. 5.—The best football game of the season was played here yesterday afternoon when the All-California team, under the name of the Reliance, met the Chemawa Indian team on the Willamette field, and the Indians won the contest after one of the best played games ever seen in Salem. The teams were not evenly matched as regards weights, for the Reliance men weighed an average of 170 pounds and the Indians average weight was only 152. The best players for the In-

dians were Foster, Sanders, Moon and Harris, while for the Reliance Hamilton, Smock and Goehen played well. Chemawa kicked off sending the ball to the 25-yard line, where Reliance stopped it and from there began a battle, the Californians pushing the Indians steadily back until finally, after a desperate struggle, they pushed the ball over the Indians' goal line, but here they lost the ball on a fumble and Chemawa secured a ball and scored a touchdown, the Indians thus saving themselves from preventing Reliance from scoring a touchdown. The Indians having the ball, at once began to advance on the Californians, and soon sent the ball toward the other end of the field and on a punt Reliance fumbled, but securing the ball began to batter the Indian line. This was hopeless, however, for they lost the ball on downs and Chemawa punted sending the ball to the 5-yard line. Here California made a desperate effort to regain their ground and on a punt gained some yardage, but Harris, catching the ball on the run, one of the prettiest plays of the game, soon advanced it into the California territory, and the Indian quarterback sent it over the line where Saunders caught it and scored a touchdown. Saunders kicked goal and the score stood 6 to 0.

Reliance kicked off and sent the ball far into the Chemawa territory, but the Indians secured the ball and carried it back, when the Californians again got the pigskin on one of a fake play gained a big advantage, carrying it fully 35 yards, and when time was called for the first half the ball had in the Indians' territory.

In the second half Reliance kicked off, but Chemawa secured the ball and began to advance at once into the Reliance territory and after a hot fight pushed the ball to the line, Green finally carrying it over amid the wildest enthusiasm. Saunders kicked for goal, but missed and the game stood 11 to 0.

Chemawa kicked off for the second time and the battle waged in California's territory, the ball was finally kicked over in the direction of Teabo, Chemawa's quarterback, who made the sensational play of the day, for he fought the ball and started down the field with it. A burly Californian man him and attempted to tackle the little Indian, but Teabo, leaping high in the air, sprang clear over the Reliance player and lighting on his feet raced down the field. He cleared another Californian with a bound, but was tackled and dropped to the ground hugging the ball to his breast. After a sharp fight the Indians finally succeeded in kicking the ball over the line, but the Californians secured it and sent it back. Chemawa again made an effort to carry the ball over the goal line and finally gained another touchdown, but failed of a goal kick, and the score stood 16 to 6 in favor of the Chemawa Indians when time was called.

The game was entirely devoid of "ragging" and was enjoyed by a large crowd. It was a splendid exhibition of football, the best game of the season and will long be remembered by all those who witnessed it.

FITZSIMMONS AND HIS NEW PLAY

RUBY ROBERT TO STAR IN "PECK AND HIS MOTHER-IN-LAW," WHICH WAS WRITTEN ESPECIALLY FOR THE FORMER CHAMPION—HAS OPPORTUNITY TO SING.

The forthcoming production of "Peck and His Mother-in-Law," in which Robert Fitzsimmons is shortly to appear as the star, is attracting considerable attention. The play was written especially for the blacksmith champion, and affords him the opportunity to display his musical talents and also his shape incased in a dress suit.

The following extracts from an exchange shows the comedian's ambition in its several aspects: "If any misguided person should imagine Robert Fitzsimmons is not taking seriously his elevation of the stage, that individual need only call at Central hall, where the 'Peck and His Mother-in-Law' rehearsals are being conducted, to witness the manner in which the ruby-topped pugilist-actor lands on the drama and beats it into a protesting pulp.

"In a small room on the third floor the rehearsal is being done. There yesterday Fitzsimmons and Mr. Ruby Robert remain on the stage and bow to the chorus for this feature is to run as follows:

"You're all right Bobby, You're my hobby, Back to the lobby with Corbett, oh! You've fought the fighters And beat the pikers, And you're the fellow for all my dough."

"Backed by a resplendent chorus of women in long costumes and men in dress suits, Robert Fitzsimmons, pugilist-actor, will hear these lines in an avid cast of countenance in his proposed new play, 'Peck and His Mother-in-Law.' "To watch the pleased smile come over the Cornishman's face when this verse is sung, even at the rehearsal, is a long walk. It is but fair to remark that the lines as the writers handed them over named Sharkey. Fitz shied at this, however, and said:

"Nix, Sharkey is not a bad sort. I want a wallop at Corbett. Put his name in there."

"It was done immediately and the song was rehearsed with that change. Then a long discussion was held as to the manner in which the song should be put on. It was finally decided that 12 girls, each a man dressed as above, should do the chorus with him.

"Fitzsimmons himself rather fancies Fitzsimmons in evening clothes anyway, and his wife particularly admires the set of his shoulders in a claw-hammer coat. Then the chorus business was rehearsed for the song.

"Next week he will be little of the real acting done by Fitz. Further than the singing of a couple of songs the fighter will merely content himself with giving a bag-punching exhibition. He is studying his part, however, and will assume the chief role of the piece on Monday. In explanation of this, Fitz said yesterday:

"You can hardly expect a man to get up in a big part like that in a few days. This is a serious business with me. I am going to take by time about it. On Monday I am going on in that part, and I am going to make good in it, too."

"Apparently he means it, what is more. The champion light heavyweight is going to win this fight if he never makes another effort."

SPORTSMEN ELECT PANTON PRESIDENT

The Oregon Fish and Game association held their annual meeting Saturday night. There was a large attendance. Dr. A. C. Pantan was elected president, John Carr, treasurer; H. J. Stillman of Pendleton, vice-president, and A. E. Gebhardt was re-elected secretary. Owing to the lateness of the hour when the election was over the papers and addresses which were to be read were postponed until the next meeting, on Tuesday, January 10. Those elected directors are: John Gill, James A. Taylor, Dr. E. F. Tucker, Joseph Paquet and L. P. W. Quimby. The retiring president of the association, J. Teal, addressed the meeting and called the attention of the members to the better protection of the game birds and fish of Oregon. He also spoke of the projected fish hatchery which the government is to start here, and said "the streams and lakes of the state will not be able to remain much longer well stocked with fish if the government does not go to the interior and plant and map out Lake Chad—the first time it had been done—and to take over that section of the country from the natives and to determine the boundaries, and to establish order there."

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
