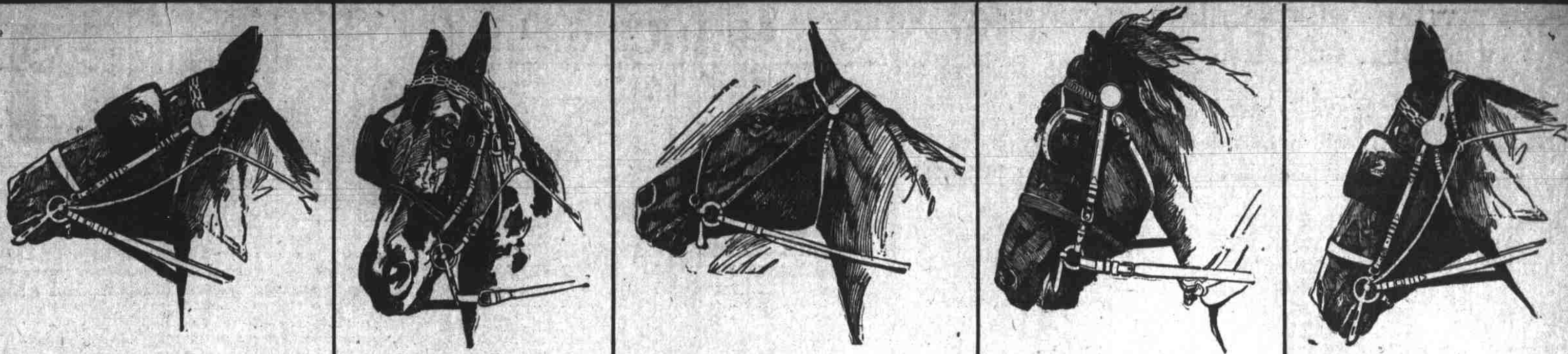

GERRY PARTY GOES TO CALIFORNIA

LEAVE WITH MRS. IN PRIVATE CAR OVER SOUTHERN PACIFIC—HIGH OPINION OF PORTLAND—MAY RETURN TO LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR.

Commodore Elbridge T. Gerry and his son Peter left last night at 10 o'clock by special car for San Francisco, it having been decided by the doctors that the young man had recovered sufficiently from his protracted illness to be able to travel. They may spend several weeks in a healthful region of California.

Peter Gerry was a member of the E. H. Harriman party and a guest of the railroad magnate on his Western tour last December. Upon the party's arrival in Portland symptoms of typhoid fever developed in young Gerry. He was ill three weeks at St. Vincent's hospital and was subsequently removed to the Portland hotel, where he could have the constant companionship of his father.

Recently a decided improvement in his condition became apparent, and he was declared able to stand a trip by rail. Thinking that the California climate might be a benefit to him the special car, which was placed at their disposal by Mr. Harriman, was requested of the Southern Pacific.

Robert Gerry, a brother, and the family physician, who were first to arrive from New York, have returned home. The special car is occupied by Elbridge T. Gerry, Peter Gerry, a nurse and their servants.

To friends and acquaintances gathered last evening to bid them farewell, Commodore Gerry expressed his delight with Portland and his visit here. He declared they had thoroughly enjoyed themselves from the moment it was announced that the sick young man was out of danger. For Portland, Mr. Gerry entertains a high opinion. He expressed a hope of attending the Lewis and Clark exposition next year. "I want to experience some of the delights of Oregon's summer weather," said he.

Manager Richard Kohler, of the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, ordered his private car attached to the special and accompanied the Gerry party southward. He will leave them at Dunsmuir, Cal., and returning will make his monthly inspection of the road under his management.

HE KILLED MANY WHO WERE INNOCENT

of a drunken orgy went to the house of another Indian named Wakes on the Blackfoot reservation and before leaving killed five members of that family. He then killed a young daughter in a neighboring family and going home stabbed his wife, causing death. He tried to commit suicide but his wounds proved inconsequential. He pleaded guilty to seven counts charging manslaughter.

TO BLAST OUT BIG BOULDERS

PREPARATIONS MADE TO IMPROVE CHANNEL OF UPPER SNAKE RIVER—MEN EMPLOYED BY GOVERNMENT TO REMOVE OBSTRUCTIONS TO NAVIGATION.

The upper Snake river is again to be made navigable for small steamers. David Ogden, United States assistant engineer, returned yesterday from Riparia and Lewiston, where he went to ascertain just what character of work is needed in order to put the channel in good condition.

At a point about 50 miles above Lewiston, he says, large rocks are projecting out into the stream. During the high water season dangerous eddies are formed immediately below them. If a vessel should get caught at either of these places it would be whirled and dashed about with such violence as to prove disastrous.

Mr. Ogden made the necessary preparations to have the rocks removed. A force of men was employed and the obstructions will be blasted out with powder.

Recently the steamer Innahwa was wrecked in that vicinity and was a total loss. Since then the ranchers and miners along the river have had to do without steamboat service. A new vessel, however, is being built to be placed in commission there. She is being built at Portland, but will probably not be completed before spring.

In the meantime Mr. Ogden says it is the intention to put the channel in good shape and keep it that way. Between Lewiston and Riparia he reports that a large fleet of small boats are being operated regularly, transporting wheat and other farm produce to the railroad.

SAUNDERS WAS A MURDERER'S VICTIM

(Journal Special Service.) Salem, Jan. 12.—The county court this morning offered a reward of \$300 for the arrest and conviction of the murderer of L. B. Saunders, the Butteville hop dealer, found shot to death at that place at midnight, November 18 last. At the time of his death an inquest was held and the jury found a verdict of death caused by an unknown person or persons. The theory of the officers was suicide. Later developments, however, indicated murder, and at the request of Deputy Prosecuting Attorney McNary a reward was offered.
