THERE ARE OTHERS SEEING OREGON

MANY EASTERNERS TAKE ADVANTAGE OF LOWER RATES TO CONVENTIONS—TOOK LOOK OVER THE STATE WITH A VIEW OF SETTLING HERE.

Numbers of people not connected with the week's conventions have taken advantage of the reduced rates from the East to Portland on account of the session of the National Livestock and Fruit-growers' associations, and are visiting this state looking for homes or places to settle.

So far 223 persons have presented tickets for stopovers at various Oregon points. They came in with the livestock men over various transcontinental lines and almost every one will return home via California, stopping in Oregon at points where their attention has been attracted by advertising mediums.

These 223 men came in with the stockmen and stayed but a day or so in Portland, leaving immediately for interior points. They are all after homes in the great Northwest.

"The livestock convention is a help to Oregon in more ways than one," said a railroad official today. "It gives these people a chance to come to Oregon during the worst season and they will decide between the conditions left at home and conditions found here very quickly. The total number of this class of visitors is expected to reach 300 before the end of the week. They all intend to make a midwinter visit to California. Oregon may expect to win 90 per cent of the number that decides to establish themselves on the Pacific coast."
