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STEAMBOATS ARE BECOMING IDLE

SIX VESSELS ENGAGED IN LOGGING BUSINESS HAVE BEEN TIED UP WITHIN LAST FEW DAYS—NORTH PACIFIC MILL TO CLOSE DOWN.

During the past few days six steamboats which were engaged in the logging business, have been taken out of commission and are now tied up at their docks. They lumber are becoming slack and the sawmills are not running to their full capacity.

The Albany of La Camas Transportation company, which has been towing for the Portland lumber mill, laid off her crew yesterday and is now lying at the foot of Oak street.

The Cascades, now towing logs from points down the river to the North Pacific mill will tie up today.

The Fannie, which has been under charter to the same company, was laid up a few days ago, as was also the No Wonder of the Shaver Transportation company's fleet.

The situation is very discouraging to steamboat men, whose vessels are now lying idle. Excepting the Inman-Poulsen plant there is not a sawmill in the city that is running to its full capacity.

As a consequence all of them are well stocked with logs, and not in need of towing.

Preparations are being made to close down the North Pacific mill. It is announced that the machinery is to be given an annual overhauling, and that the shutdown will be but temporary.

Owing to there being no business in sight, several of the steamboat owners will avail themselves of the opportunity to repair their vessels.

The Gamecock is now at Supple's yards where she will be given a complete new hull. The mills were running to their full capacity in order to fill the foreign and domestic orders which were being constantly received.

All at once a change came, but no one appears to be able to give a satisfactory explanation of the situation.

"This always is a dull season of the year," is the rather vague explanation given.
