EGGS SHOW SIGN OF BREAK IN PRICE

Receipts today were not large, but indications now point to greater volume in next few days—meat quotations stiffer—coffee up.

Front Street, Jan. 22.—The principal events in the local wholesale markets were: Hog market stronger; prices of eggs showing a change in egg situation; Poultry market improves; Coffee doing stunts; Hops continue lively; Creamery butter higher; Wheat ton improves; Potatoes firm; Onion condition changes.

Change in Egg Situation. There were slight indications of a change in the egg situation this morning. The receipts are beginning to show an improvement and from this time on it is expected that the arrivals will be much larger.

Slight Improvement in Poultry. The poultry market is showing a slight improvement with the receipts quite small. The demand just now cannot be said to be excessive, but there is more call for stocks than there were several days ago.

Hogs Are Stronger. The hog market today for the dressed carcass is showing a vast improvement and the price is slightly higher.

Improvement in Mutton. It was only slightly over a month ago that there was no demand for mutton at all in this market and the few arrivals that did stagger in were drugs on the market.

Creamery Butter is Higher. The receipts of the very best grades of creamery butter are now nominal and the market is showing an improvement in the tone with prices advanced.

Wheat Tone is Better. The fluctuations of the wheat market in Chicago and other eastern cities is causing a firmer tone in this market with the millers still paying a premium of from 1 to 2 1/2 cents over the prices quoted by the exporters.

Potato Market Firmer. The potato market in Frisco is growing better and prices are improving all along the line.
