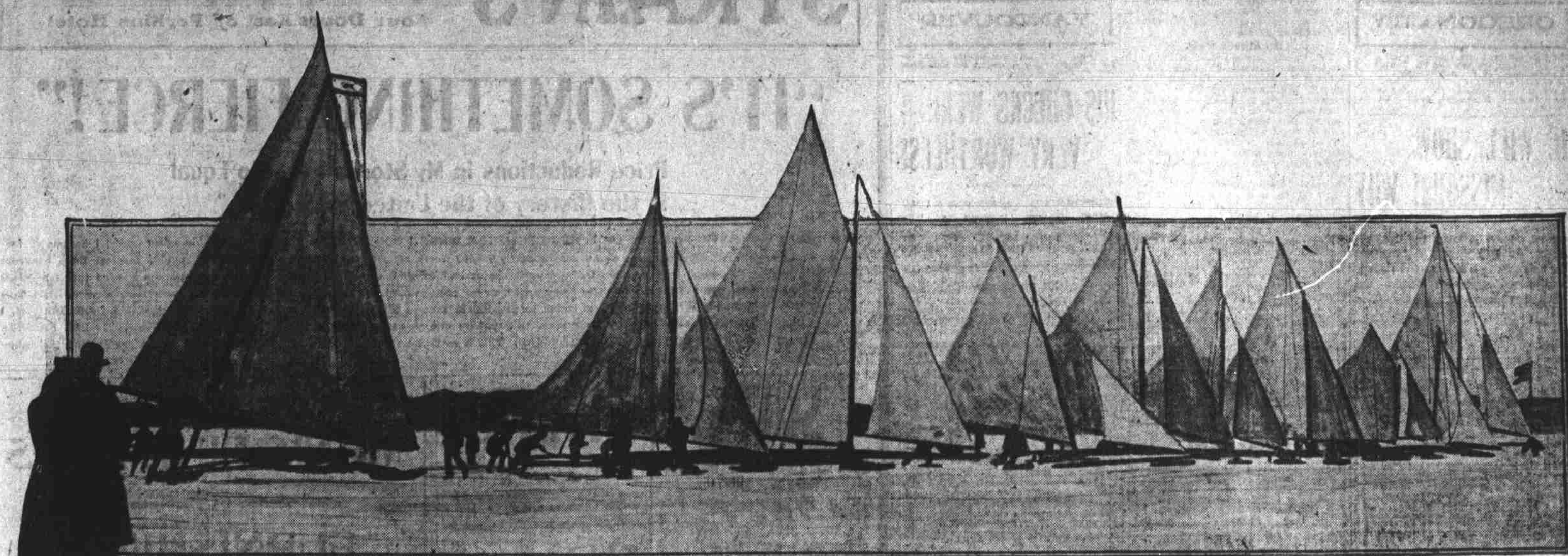


SPORTING NEWS OF TODAY

DUGDALE DEPARTS WITHOUT HAVING ACCOMPLISHED ANYTHING BY HIS VISIT. JEFFORDS EASILY DEFEATS YANK KENNY. PENDLETON SHOOT COMMENCES TODAY

FOR YACHTS LINED ON GULL LAKE, KALAMAZOO, MICH., PREPARATORY TO STARTING IN ONE OF THEIR INTERNATIONAL RACES. ONE OF THE GREATEST FOR YACHT REGATTAS OF THE YEAR WILL BE SAILED ON THAT LAKE IN THE NEAR FUTURE. SOME OF THE FASTEST BOATS FROM THE EAST AND WEST AND CANADA WILL MEET IN A SERIES OF RACES. LAST SEASON THE REGATTA WAS SPOILED BY POOR ICE AND LACK OF WIND AND MANY OF THE EASTERN BOATS HAVE BEEN KEPT THERE FOR THIS YEAR'S RACES. THE PROGRAM INCLUDES INTERNATIONAL RACES, BEST THREE OUT OF FIVE FOR BOATS CARRYING FROM 450 TO 850 SQUARE FEET OF SAIL, A RACE FOR THE MICHIGAN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP WITH AN 850-FOOT CANVAS LIMIT, A SWEEPSTAKES HANDICAP RACE FREE FOR ALL, CONSOLATION RACE.

DUGDALE DEPARTS ENTIRELY DISGUSTED

EXPECTED LOGICAL TO RECEIVE HIM MORE CHERISHINGLY THAN WAS THE CASE—NO AGREEMENT COULD BE REACHED—RETURNS TO SEATTLE.

D. E. "Cupid" Dugdale, formerly and according to himself still of Seattle, King county, Washington, left this city yesterday afternoon, as stated in The Journal, to return to his home on Puget sound.

Mr. Dugdale did not meet with the reception that he had expected, from the fairy tales imparted to him by the person or persons who made overtures to his highness to accept a position with the local club.

Unsuccessful Conference.

Upon his arrival here he held a conference with the local moguls, and as no satisfactory arrangement was reached at one pow-wow it was arranged to hold another. After two, if not more, ineffectual confabs, the Seattle magnate decided that the best thing for him to do was to go back to Seattle and await developments. At any rate he will not take any more trips to Portland unless he is guaranteed some material result to be secured by such a visit. Evidently Mr. Dugdale is not a lover of "wild goose chases," for he was not in the best of humor at train time yesterday afternoon.

Looks as Though Dug Refused.

Just what arrangements were made at the meeting is unknown, but one thing is certain, Dugdale either wanted too much, or was not satisfied himself with the standing of the local club's finances. It seems unreasonable for a body of men, who are representative business men of this city, to hold off this long in order to give Dugdale a chance to put in his bid for a half interest in the club, which is said to be the limit of the amount of stock the magnates are willing to sell, when everything could be settled smoothly and some progress made immediately toward getting a ball team together by allowing Mr. Ely to either buy the stock which is for sale, or come to some definite understanding with him whereby he can proceed to secure a team to represent this city in the Pacific Coast league this season. The time is short and the urgency of the case necessitates it.

PENDLETON SHOOT COMMENCES TODAY

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 22.—Shooters from all parts of the Northwest have assembled in this city to participate in the grand tournament which opened this morning at 9 o'clock. It is estimated that over 75 entries will be shown when the shoots are complete.

The Portland delegation is here and is composed of Messrs. Hillis, Caldwell and Winters, and others may join them today. The Parker brothers of Salem are with the Portland delegation.

The shoot commenced this morning and is governed by the interstate rules. Two sets of expert traps with electric pulls arranged in the Sargent system are being used.

The association has secured the use of the rooms of the Commercial association as headquarters during the tournament, and the prizes will be paid here each day, after the averages have been computed and the winners decided.

The high average medal has arrived and is on exhibition in the window of the Tallman & Co. drug store, together with the low average consolation prize, which is a beautiful blanket from the Pendleton mills.

C. C. Berkeley has been appointed as official scorer for the tournament.

NATIONALS ARRANGE THE 1904 SCHEDULE

Spokane, Jan. 22.—President Williams of the Spokane baseball club says that the schedule of the Pacific National league will be so arranged that there will be no necessity for changing the program during the season. Each town will have the best dates possible for that locality and in that way the league has a better chance to manage the financial end of the matter.

Miners' Union day is the occasion for a great time in Butte, and it will be so arranged that the Miners will have that date. In Utah the Elders have a special holiday, and Salt Lake will be given dates at that time for their home games.

WORKING FOR FIRE SAFETY IN SPOKANE

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 22.—The special committee on fire protection has finished its work and adjourned sine die, with the recommendation that the work be continued by the board of fire commissioners with the chief of the fire department. The report recommends the appointment of a building inspector to compel all buildings hereafter constructed to be built according to the regulations. The report says he should be a capable and vigorous man and that the city would be greatly benefited and economy would result from his appointment.

The report calls attention to the danger to pedestrians from the flower pots, jugs, glass and stone jars, bottles, etc., which are permitted to stand on unshielded window sills. It asks that this practice be stopped and also that property owners be compelled to keep the alleys clear of rubbish and boxes, which endanger fire.

The ordinances now in existence, the committee thinks, sufficient except in a few minor details. But because the ordinances have not been enforced the facilities for fire escapes have been woefully deficient and in some instances entirely inadequate and affording scarcely any protection from great loss of life in the event of fire. This was true in theatres, halls and churches. The school buildings were in better condition. When great loss of life was threatened immediate remedies were ordered.

The committee further reports that many other buildings within the fire limits do not conform to the ordinances as to fire escapes, exits, fire ladders, stairs and hallways and it recommends that a notice be given if the defects are not remedied in 90 days they will be remedied by the city at the owner's expense.

Scare Over Dynamite.

Officer Jelset appeared at the police station yesterday with a can containing a stick of dynamite. He stated that he found the stuff in a pile of rubbish in the eastern part of the city and could find no owner for the thing. He deposited the can on one of the window ledges back of the city hall and left it there, to the astonishment of everybody who appeared on the scene a moment later and found evidence to suggest that someone was trying to blow up the city hall.

HUSBAND AT IRRIGON.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 22.—W. G. Ives, formerly of Woodburn, Or., has purchased a tract of 25 acres of land under the ditches of the Oregon Land & Water company at Irrigon, and will start a first-class nursery there.

He has planted eight tons of peach seeds, and set out 25,000 apple and other sprouts, to begin with, and will bring enough other stock from Willamette valley points to make up the entire tract. He expects to conduct a first-class nursery, and with the climate and natural surroundings so favorable, hopes to build up a permanent business in the new town.

FORTUNE FOR THE FATHER.

GOOD TRADE IN THE WEST.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 22.—The general wholesale trade in the Central West is solid and of the promising sort. In many lines the activity thus far in 1904 has exceeded the expectations. This is especially true of the grocery and dry goods trade. In the general grocery trade the present business is very noticeably above the normal, and in staples the activity is pronounced. In the iron and steel branches the year's beginning is very propitious, and scarcely any part of the industry reports other than most encouraging prospects for at least six months to come. Producers of agricultural implements, wire and nails also report the situation and outlook as highly satisfactory. The general lumber business is likewise reported much improved, and the dealers are expecting much better things in the near future. Receipts in Chicago at present are barely enough to meet the immediate requirements of the trade.
