ATTEMPT TO SECURE LOCAL OPTION ACT

Let the people themselves decide whether they desire intoxicating liquors sold, says the Anti-Saloon league, and with this purpose in mind members of this organization are circulating petitions to secure the required number of signatures to invoke the initiative amendment in the matter of local option.

Eight thousand voters must sign the petition within the next 10 days if the matter is to be voted upon, but the Anti-Saloon league declares that if it falls it will not give up the fight.

It said the petitions are receiving a number of signers, many being persons who are opposed to local option, but ready to sign the petition to bring the matter to a vote of the people.

Said one signer: "I will sign this petition to bring the matter before the voters, but I won't promise to vote for local option."
