GUNS DISCHARGED FROM INDRASAMHA

Early this morning the big Oriental steamship, the *Alaska*, from the Alaska to the Alsworth dock where the remainder of her cargo will be discharged. It consists mostly of the goods intended for the St. Louis fair. They will be started east as soon as the cargo is loaded on quays.
