FORMER FRIENDS
HAVE FALLING OUT

PRESIDENT LUCAS CHARGES DUGDALE WITH HYPOCRISY AND PLACES DISRUPTION OF PACIFIC NATIONAL LEAGUE AT SEATTLE MAGNATE'S DOOR.

(Journal Special Service.) Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 29.—President W. H. Lucas of the Pacific National league has returned to his home in this city, expecting to remove his family to Spokane where his future headquarters will be, but he is delayed by the unexpected and serious illness of his daughter.

Mr. Lucas has made final arrangements for his four-club league and says that everything promises a successful season over in the mountains. Three clubs, Spokane, Butte and Salt Lake, have already put up their \$1,000 guarantee, says Mr. Lucas, and the fourth city will be either Boise, Idaho, or Ogden, Utah, either of which will put up its money the instant the league officials make a choice.

It has been shown that Dugdale was haggling with the Coast league to sell out his Seattle holdings at the same time that he was in Tacoma talking Pacific National and swearing undying loyalty to Lucas. It is known that Dugdale's proposal to sell out the Seattle club came before the San Francisco Coast league meeting and it was there voted to be advisable to purchase his franchise for a sum not to exceed \$4,000.

In the light of this showing of Dugdale's treachery toward Tacoma, Mr. Lucas, who claimed to have faith in the Seattle manager to the last, says that he does not blame the Tacoma magnates for going into the Coast league.

Lucas has been the central figure in Tacoma baseball for many years and has many friends in the city who are sorry to see him leave and who say that but for Dugdale's actions last season and this the old league would still be intact. As the affair has turned out, however, there is general rejoicing among the fans at having broken with the Lucas-Dugdale-McCloskey faction.

Mr. Lucas says: "I do not know that I blame Dugdale for selling out, but I do blame him for misleading me and playing the hypocrite. If he had deposited his \$1,000 guarantee last season as Tacoma did, the other cities in the league would have deposited their money and there would have been no break in the circuit. Dugdale himself was responsible for the failure of the Pacific National league in that way."

"The past year has seen a great change in the baseball situation. I have no complaint to make, however. We are going to have a good strong league east of the mountains. It is certainly stronger than the eight-club league we had last season where only three had their guarantee money up and those three had the money returned to them because the others did not put up. This year we are bound together solidly and there is no danger of any classes."

"I like Tacoma, although misfortune seems to have followed me ever since I left Spokane. Tacoma is a rattling good ball town and one of the best on the coast. Next year I think the baseball situation will right itself."

PUTTMANN LOST TO
SPOKANE CLUB

Spokane, Jan. 29.—August Herman, chairman of the national baseball commission, has made a decision that the Spokane club do not like. This decision is given in the case of Pitcher Ambrose Puttmann, who was claimed by Spokane after being drafted by the New York club. Puttmann jumped Spokane at Salt Lake August 25, 1903, and later the point was raised that he was purchased by Helena. The draft worked him into the New York American club, which forwarded to President Williams of Spokane the first installment of the draft money. A claim for Puttmann's fine was put in and after the evidence was presented, Herman wrote that under a recent ruling of the commission Puttmann would be ineligible until the fine was paid. Later, however, the officers of the commission got together and in the latest announcement it is given out that the commission has no jurisdiction in the case, owing to the fact that the national agreement was not subscribed to until September 11, and Puttmann jumped in August. The fact that the New York club practically recognized the claim by paying part of the draft money was lost sight of in the revised ruling. Helena's purchase claims were not considered, and the only defense put up by Puttmann was that he was not given as much advance money as had been agreed upon. As the case now stands Puttmann is lost to Spokane.

MULTNOMAH MEN TO
HOLD THEATRICALS

At a meeting of the directors of the Multnomah club last evening H. H. Herdman was appointed as a committee of one to arrange for an amateur theatrical production this year at the club. Last season Mr. Herdman had charge of the arrangements of the "Wizard of the Nile," and largely through his efforts a splendid production of that opera was rendered. Mr. Boyer and Mr. Bernard will be asked to help out the clubmen again this year.

The club election will be held on February 3, and while six men have been chosen by the nominating committee to be balloted for, it is whispered today that an independent ticket will be placed in the field. Several interested in the independent movement are most prominent in the affairs and councils of the club, and political activity on their part would cause the regular nominees to step lively. The independent ticket will be made known in a day or two, and in the meantime considerable guessing will be indulged in.

EUGENE MANAGER IS
SIGNING PLAYERS

Mr. Du Shane, who was formerly with Morley's Los Angeles team, has an extensive acquaintance with players all over the coast and promises the fans of Eugene a splendid aggregation of ball-tossers.

Suitable baseball grounds are now being negotiated for, last year's park having been divided into city lots and sold. The local club is well financed and the directors will spare no expense in erecting a good grandstand and putting the grounds in good shape.

HANLON AND BROAD
READY FOR CONTEST

THE HUMOROUS KID SAYS THAT HE WILL DROP "CUTE" EDDIE WHEN THEY MEET ON TRIBUNE BEACH—HANLON IS QUITE CONFIDENT OF VICTORY.

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—The sports of this city are much excited over the lively tilt last evening in the matter of a referee for tonight's fight between "Kid" Broad and Eddie Hanlon. The Hanlon boys favored Grancy, as did Tim McGrath for Broad. However, Alce Gregains surprised them by saying that Grancy cannot ever referee a contest before the San Francisco Athletic club in the future and must step down from tonight's battle. Gregains was finally chosen himself to referee, and now says he was forced to take the stand by one of the city supervisors, who is a political enemy of Grancy. Gregains has kept friendly with the supervisors and gave in. The entire sporting element here today are talking of the affair.

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—Kid Broad, who seems to be the humorist of the prizefighting, although his face is marked with tragedy, spent a busy day yesterday. He is prepared for his bout with Eddie Hanlon tonight at Sheehan's beach tavern.

He went a long journey on the road yesterday morning, boxed with Cyclone Kelly in the afternoon and was at work in the gymnasium again last night. He is paying particular attention to his breathing apparatus, as his muscles of iron need but little tuning up.

"The lure has been held out to him that if he beats Hanlon he can have a match with Corbett next month. When he was told this he said: 'You watch me drop him.'"

There has been little betting on the fight up to the present time, but from the inquiries being made it is thought Hanlon will open an 8 to 10 choice. There is not the same magic in the name of Broad that there is in that of Champion Young Corbett, so the man from New Orleans will be on the long end apparently throughout all the betting.

A number of sporting men were going out to Broad's quarters at the beach yesterday to see him in action. He promises to take on any aspiring boxers who may appear.

Hanlon is ready for business and expects to be able to go at any pace Broad may set, whether it is boxing or slugging.

Ike was in rare form and fooled the oily batters and was highly praised for his work.

"Not a member of the Oil City nine was allowed to cross the pan in the game Sunday afternoon, and Manager Phelps' \$100 bet is now in the possession of the local nine—or was—after the end of one of the briskest games of the season, lasting just a trifle over one hour and a half. Butler of the Portland team was in the box for the local nine and he had his opponents at his mercy. Westlake, the oilfields twirler, held his own, but he was given only fair support. In the second inning the oilfields players completely lost their heads and allowed the home team to bring three men across the rubber. They played good ball after that, but the Bakersfield team made two more runs. Taking it all in all, the game, lopsided as it was, was one of the best games played this season. Barring the fateful second inning, the oilfields played a good fielding game, but they were unable to land safely on Butler's curves. ONE DOZEN NEW
PASSENGER COACHES

ORDERED IN PHILADELPHIA FOR THE O. W. P. & R. R. CO.—TREASURER MORRIS SAYS PORTLAND STREET RAILROADS BEAT THE EAST IN EQUIPMENT.

Twelve new passenger coaches will soon be added to the equipment of the Oregon Water Power & Railway line, Portland's interurban railroad, and by May 1 electric cars will be running to the terminus of the Springfield branch—Casadero, 40 miles southeast of the city.

Treasurer Fred Morris of the company returned yesterday morning from a three weeks' trip to Philadelphia, where he arranged for the purchase of the new rolling stock and attended to other road matters. "I have little to say concerning my trip," said Mr. Morris, "other than that I found business conditions good in the East. I was in New York only a few hours, and spending most of my time in Philadelphia. I am glad enough to get away from the snow and ice and back to a more congenial climate. There is much buying in conservative business circles and little movement of stocks."

"Our Portland street railway service is ahead of the East. Here we don't have to keep our tracks clear of the snow, and I did not find the eastern cars heated like the local ones. I don't know how the suburban cars are equipped, but I found the street cars lacking."

"I find upon my return that both freight and passenger business has been very good during my absence. Materials are on hand for the electrifying of the Springfield branch, to the terminus, and also material is in readiness for the building of the waterfront branch here in the city."

Mr. Morris noted one peculiar fact, apparent in the East. There is little or no war talk. "I hardly heard the war mentioned," he said, "and even the papers had but little to say. As to effecting trade, I don't think the Oriental situation is bothering it one way or another."

SOON AT WORK

Two more dredges will soon be operated by the government, one on the Willamette river above Portland and the other on Snake river from Riparia to the headwaters of that stream. Sealed proposals for the construction of the vessels will be received at the headquarters of the local United States engineer's until next Wednesday. The vessel for use on the Willamette is known as a one-cubic-yard dipper dredge and houses. It is to be about 80 feet in length and 30 feet wide.

Tenders for the second vessel will be submitted for the construction of the house, hull and propelling machinery. It will be 125 feet in length and have a 26-foot beam.
