

STARTLING ROLL CALL OF CHILD CRIMINALS



Never in the history of Portland has the crop of juvenile law breakers been as great as at the present time. Special Officer Hawley of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society is devoting his entire time to looking after the youthful offenders.

"Some children are degenerate," said he. "They are children of vicious, intemperate or criminal parents. They may have comfortable surroundings and have every reasonable advantage to make something of themselves but they are continually in trouble. It seems to be a second nature with them. For this class there is little hope of ultimate reform. They may for a time under favorable conditions live lives of rectitude, but when it is least expected they will surprise those who are trying to reform them by an exhibition of some vicious trait. In this class the moral sensibilities seem to be lacking and they have no conception of right or wrong, and have no hope for the future or desire to lead honest lives. As an illustration of this type may be cited Harry Thomas, 16 years of age, sentenced by Judge Rogers to a year in the county jail the other day. This lad has been at the Aid society a number of times and has been treated well and given every chance to make a man of himself. All advice or effort to help him he looked upon with disdain. Each time after being dismissed it would only be a short period when he would again be caught in some wrong doing. He finally refused to stay at the home without open rebellion, and said he would rather go to the county jail than to the Aid society. This is his third among the criminals. This is his third time there. The last crime was the securing of 95 cents by false pretenses. He has always had an ambition to pose as a second Tracy.

SHORT OF FUNDS TO REBUILD SCHOOL

SCHOOL DIRECTORS FACE SERIOUS PROBLEM—NEW PARK SCHOOL CANNOT BE PROVIDED UNDER PRESENT TAX LEVY—BONDING QUESTION AGAIN COMES UP.

The burning of the Park school last week may bring about a radical change of plans with the board of education. An estimated appropriation had been made for new buildings and repairs, but it was figured down to an exceedingly close point, and the loss of this \$60,000 building will mean a revision of those plans, possibly with the result that the conservative policy may be discarded in favor of a bonding scheme.

At the time the estimate was fixed upon it was acknowledged to be only a question of a very few years until a general overhauling of all the municipal schools would be required and with the new buildings which would be required this could only be achieved by bonding the district.

There is a strong undercurrent of opinion among a number of the large taxpayers and citizens generally that there would be no better time than the present to put the Portland schools on a first class condition by bonding. The issue, it is represented, could be made according to the life of the building, about 40 years, and in the meantime by providing for a small sinking fund surplus the debt could be cleared away in that length of time and hardly felt. It is a notorious fact that many of the buildings are now past their usefulness and will not last many years longer, even with the best of repairs and renovations. The population is also growing rapidly, and this year the capacity of the schools was taxed to the utmost in the majority of the districts. A number of portables were used, but these are only adopted as a method of temporary relief.

Previous to the last annual taxpayers' meeting, when the estimate was decided upon, a number of prominent taxpayers had signified their belief that a bonding issue should be voted away from the people, but the conservatives insisted so strongly upon securing money by a levy that they ceased their efforts for bonding until some later time.

The board faces a serious problem, whether they take up the bonding question or not. The proposed levy was small enough, and it is absolutely out of the question to think of providing a new Park school from the sum named. Without considering a new building there, the total sum was not large

Cigarettes and Crime.
"Smoking cigarettes is a stepping stone to crime. The practice seems to remove all moral compunctions and makes boys reckless. It is a noticeable fact that nine out of 10 of the boys that we have to deal with use cigarettes, and most of them show the evil effects of the pernicious habit in their pale drawn faces, glassy eyes and blue lips."

"Crimes are becoming more and more frequent among the young. Several weeks ago a boy only nine years of age was brought up for horse stealing. He went to the outskirts of the town and whenever he noticed a horse-staked out he brought it into town, and approached some one with a tale of woe about his people all being sick and in need, and being authorized by his father to sell the horse at some price. In this manner he created sympathy and from one man secured \$4 for a horse taken from Piedmont. This boy stole everything in sight and made his escape from the Aid society on two different occasions. This is a case of the most pitiful kind. His parents are honest people but have no control over the child, as he will not submit to parental restraint and refuses to remain at home whenever rebuked.

"Children that are sent to school have not the opportunity to get into mischief and as a rule seldom are in trouble. Those that are kept busy are as a rule safe.

"The trouble in many cases is that the parents are too lenient with their children. They refuse to take the advice of outsiders and resent the insinuation that their children are not the best on earth. They always lay the blame for the misdeeds of their offspring on the children of some one else. In the last month nearly a score of young boys and girls have been taken in charge by the society.

STRONGER NAVAL FORCE IN EUROPEAN WATERS

Washington, Feb. 1.—The administration has decided to send a largely increased naval force to European waters after the winter maneuvers in the Caribbean sea. The present European squadron is to be recalled to attend the maneuvers, after which a strongly reinforced squadron will return, mobilized in the vicinity of the Balkans. The demonstration will be sufficient to greatly impress not only Turkey, but all Europe with the power of the United States, and its purpose to protect American interests in that quarter of the world. The squadron is now located as follows: The Brooklyn at Alexandria, the San Francisco at Beirut, and the Machias at Port Said.

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MUST DANCE OVER FATHER'S CORPSE

EVANGELIST CALMS DELIVERED CONDEMNATORY ADDRESS ON THE EVILS OF WREST PARTIES, SMOKE AND DANCING—WHERE GAMBLING HALLS GET REBUKE.

Progressive euche parties and dancing came in for harsh criticism by George Robert Cairns, the evangelist, at the meeting of Sunday club at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon. He declared that the recruits for Erickson's gambling hall get their cue at the progressive euche parties. As for dancing, he believes it "tugging to a musical accompaniment," and would not live with his wife if she waltzed with another man. His daughters shall never dance, he emphatically asserted, unless it be over his dead body.

The speakers' subject was "The Paid the Fare." The experience of Jonah, who reached Nineveh in the belly of a whale, was used as an illustration. It takes a tough man to fight against God, the speaker explained, and for that reason Jonah escaped with his life, though he paid a heavy fare. Stories illustrating of a person reaping as he sows were given. In conclusion, it was pointed out that there is at least a possibility of the Bible being true. If it is true, the man who lives up to its teachings will enter heaven, while the infidel and the thoughtless sinner will go to hell; if it is not true, then the Christian will stand as good a chance as the sinner, anyhow.

FAITH IN IMMORTALITY.
In the opinion of the Rev. George Crosswell Cressy, Ph. D., D. D., as expressed before a large congregation at the First Unitarian church yesterday morning, the tendency of advanced thought is not toward the materialistic. He believes that faith in the immortality of the soul is increasing among those who are in the habit of thinking. The topic of the sermon was: "Is Belief in Personal Immortality Decreasing?"

In substance, the divine advocated the theory that thinkers are becoming less demonstrative than formerly, but that they are exercising the gray matter of their brain to advantage, nevertheless. For dogmatic denial of the existence of "things not seen or heard," he expressed strong contempt of the true agnosticism, which stands perplexed before a mighty problem, he had nothing to say but words of kindness.

It was pointed out by the preacher that a cardinal tenet of the Roman Catholic church is a belief in the immortality of the soul. The so-called evangelical churches have the same tenet of faith and have gained more rapidly in membership than the Catholic in proportion to the growth of population. In a general way, he touched on the subject from a scientific standpoint, deducing the conclusion that matter is, after all, only a series of phenomena in consciousness, and that neither matter nor force explains this consciousness.

At the home the boys are made to mix healthful work with study and recreation. The woods back of the home are being cleaned up and the boys are engaged in this work. They also have to spend a certain period in study each day. The lads have freely confessed their misdeeds and profess their repentance.

The parents of the boys are grief-stricken at their waywardness. Mrs. Grant called at the home yesterday and expressed her desire to do anything to help reform her son. Mrs. Simmons is also heartbroken at her son's disgrace, while Mrs. Casey has stated that her boy needs discipline such as he will get at the home.

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FIREBUGS NARROW ESCAPE WITH LIFE

SETS FIRE TO COUSINS' RESIDENCE WITH KEROSENE WHEELS—WOMAN WATCHES FOR HIM REVOLVER IN HAND—POURED OIL ON BACK PORCH.

Saturating the rear porch with a gallon of coal oil, a desperate incendiary attempted to burn the residence at 307 Sixth street, owned by Mrs. H. A. Cousins and owned by Mrs. M. F. Wyatt, this morning.

The fire started shortly after 4 o'clock but fortunately the blaze was discovered by Mrs. J. B. Patterson, of 205 Sixth street, who around the occupants of the adjoining dwelling. Mrs. Patterson also bravely waited the re-appearance of the firebug, prepared to shoot him if she saw him.

The act of the firebug is today puzzling the police and fire authorities. Not the least clue has been obtained as to his identity. Neither has the slightest motive been discovered for his attempt which, had it been successful, would in all probability have resulted in loss of life besides great damage to property.

Heard Firebug Walking.
Mrs. Patterson occupies a room facing rear of the Cousins residence. She happened to awake early this morning and heard a man walking on his toes beside the next house. Thinking that he was a burglar Mrs. Patterson drew out her revolver, which she keeps at night under her pillow, and waited an attempt to break into her apartments. Then she heard a match scratched but she supposed that the man was trying to find his way. A few seconds later she noticed that it was bright as day outside the window.

Hashtly she lifted the curtain to see that the back porch of the Cousins house was ablaze.

Mrs. Patterson lustily cried "Fire," arousing the occupants of the next house. Then she went to the telephone and summoned the fire department. But as she notified them that the blaze was under control no apparatus was sent out.

Family and Roomers Work.
The Cousins family keep roomers and there was considerable excitement among them when they first saw the bright reflection from the flames. With considerable presence of mind Mrs. Cousins and others of her women roomers rushed out upon the porch and poured water on the flames. A bucket of ashes was also used to good advantage and almost before the woodwork of the porch was scorched the flames were extinguished.

On the rear porch was piled a lot of firewood. The incendiary selected four sticks of this, over which he placed some newspapers. Then the coal oil was poured over the pile and the match set to it. In the basement, the door of which opens on the porch, was any amount of dry kindling and old boxes, which the fire would have burned with rapidity and fury.

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MAYBRICK CASE STILL A MYSTERY

London, Feb. 1.—An air of mystery still surrounds Mrs. Maybrick's whereabouts. The American embassy believes she is still detained, as no official notice of her liberation has been received. The British officials decline to discuss the matter.

Solicitor Harris, prominently identified in the effort to release Mrs. Maybrick, today discredits the report that she has been released. He expects the case to be reviewed and release effected in a few days.

Although the officials decline any statement regarding Mrs. Maybrick they are certain she has not yet been released, but is removed to some other prison than Aylesbury, where she will be detained until finally discharged. This will probably be within a short time. Papers today contain conflicting reports as to her present location, but all agree on this procedure. American interest is evident by the numerous telegrams from the United States today asking for confirmation and her present address.

IN HOUSE OF DETENTION.
Washington, Feb. 1.—A private cablegram received here says Mrs. Maybrick has been placed in a house of detention, from where she will be released with a full pardon between July 13 and 26 after she is reported to be in good health and happy over the prospects.
