LIGHT-DRAFT STRAMER.

Before the next low-water season occurs the Oregon City Transportation company will have a steamer in commission on the Upper Willamette river which will draw but 12 inches of water. At the same time the vessel will carry 350 passengers and several hundred tons of freight.

The contract for her construction has been let to the Portland Shipbuilding company. She will be known as the Oregon, and her dimensions will be as follows: Length, 132 feet; beam, 26½ feet; depth of hold, 4 feet. J. H. Johnston drew up plans for the boat.

WAREHOUSE MEN WISH TO MOVE

DISSATISFACTION IN REGARD TO LOCATION AND INSURANCE RATES ON THE EAST SIDE BOTTOM CAUSES MANY OF THEM TO LOOK ELSEWHERE.

"The principal call for realty now," says Grindstaff & Blain, "seems to be for warehouse property. The large jobbing firms which now have their headquarters along the bottom lands of the east side are not satisfied with their location because of insurance rates and other things, and are now looking for a change of location. They all look toward the northern portion of the city, where they can get good truckage facilities, and during the past few months quite a number of quarter blocks have changed hands for this purpose."

"We find the principal call for realty at this time," says the Title Guarantee & Trust company, "to be for residences. The workmen are buying homes."

There was a rumor on the street yesterday that S. Morton Cohn had disposed of his property at the corner of Tenth and Washington streets. Mr. Cohn is out of the city, but his manager says that although there were some negotiations regarding the property, it has not yet been disposed of to any one. "We would certainly know if such a deal had been made," he said.

Sixth street, as a business section, is fast coming to the front, and during the past few months several large deals have been made on that thoroughfare and on Seventh street. The latter street is not yet recognized as a business section, but the movement seems to be slowly but surely going in that direction.

There is some talk of putting a car line on Seventh street, and if this is accomplished, the real estate men say, it will soon be filled with large business blocks. W. D. Fenton is now constructing a large building in that section. Grindstaff & Blain, who purchased the property of the Jewish synagogue, on Sixth street between Oak and Pine streets, a number of weeks ago, have not yet decided upon what use the property will be put. The synagogue which is now located there will soon be torn down, as the congregation has already purchased a lot in the southern portion of the city and will begin the construction work on their new edifice within the next month. The congregation will vacate the present home by March 1.

In public schools and colleges formal programs were carried out, consisting of exercises calculated to acquaint the students with the life and deeds of the great American commoner. The Grand Army, Sons of Veterans and other patriotic organizations also held appropriate memorial services.

HARD TIMES IN SOUTH AFRICA

CHIEF OFFICER OF THE BLYTHESWOOD WRITES THAT CAPE TOWN IS FILLED WITH HUNGRY MEN, WHO SLEEP IN THE OPEN AIR—PACIFIC COAST BEST COUNTRY.

"Anyone that wants to come to South Africa must bring plenty of food with him or he will starve. It is worse than India, the great Boer war seems to have done more harm than good and people here have realized this finally."

This statement is made in a letter from Chief Officer H. Johnson of the ship Blytheswood, that arrived at Cape Town, South Africa, in December, after a quiet voyage of 99 days. Mr. Johnson, in writing to a Portland friend, states that the voyage was one of the quietest the ship ever made, and the trip around the Horn was made without encountering a storm.

Mr. Johnson writes of Cape Town and South Africa in general:

"Trade is at a complete standstill, food and clothing is high and many are sleeping in the open air. There is no chance for a poor man here, as the colony is filled with wealthy Jews, who are trying to import Chinamen for all the work in the mines, and have aroused much excitement by their attempt to secure cheap labor."

"I hope that we come back to Portland or some Pacific coast port, for it is the only human country that we can find," adds the mate in closing.

WISH DIRECT MAIL SERVICE TO ORIENT

The oriental mail service from Portland is the subject of a letter received by Samuel Connell, secretary of the chamber of commerce, from W. S. Shallenberger, second assistant postmaster-general, through Congressman Binger Herman. Assistant Secretary Mosemson said: "The chamber of commerce is endeavoring to secure direct mail communication between Portland and the orient. At present mail has to go from here by Seattle or San Francisco, and frequently shipments of merchandise going directly from here reach their destination before the invoices or other mail concerning them are received. This leads to great annoyance, trouble and expense, which, with mail going direct by the Portland steamers, will be avoided."

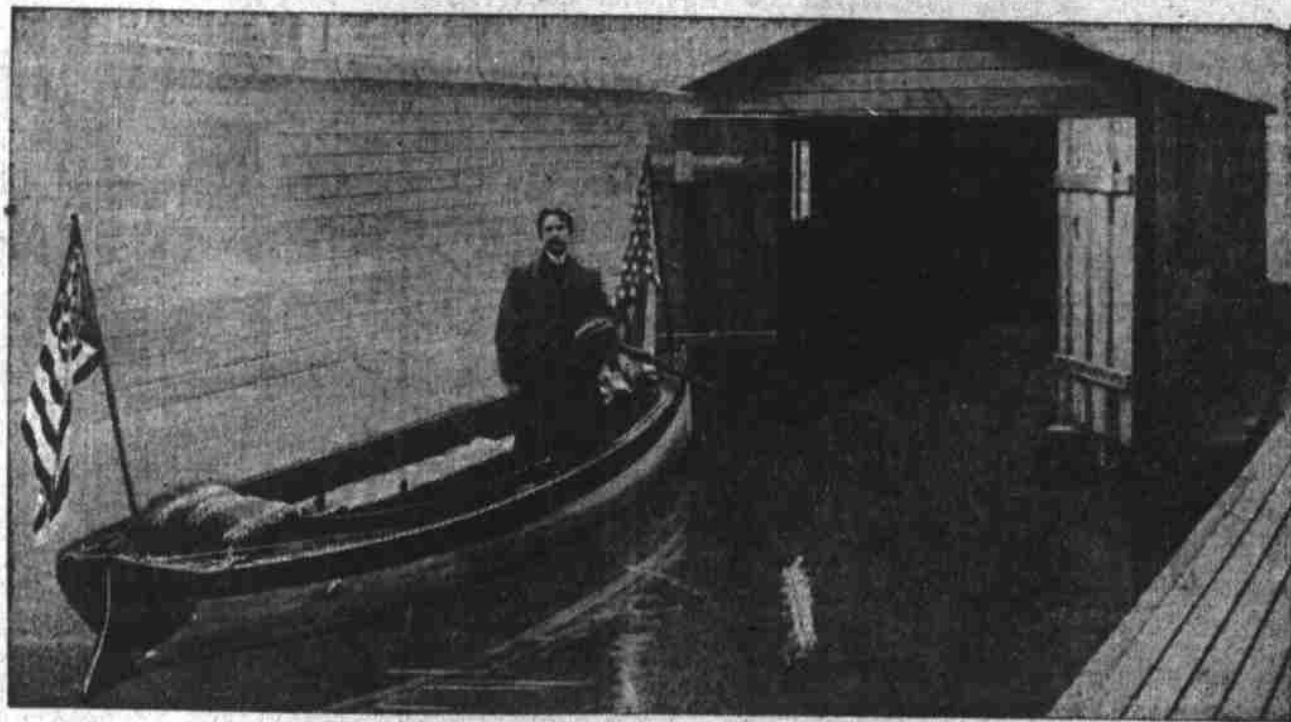
