

FIRE CONSUMES BOSTON SALOON

ESTABLISHMENT AT SECOND AND
COUCH STREETS DESTROYED BY
MORNING BLAZE OF UNKNOWN
ORIGIN—SALOON WAS SCENE OF
GEORGE SMITH MURDER.

The interior of the Boston saloon at Second and Couch streets was destroyed by fire this morning and the entire building and its contents damaged to the extent of about \$4,000. Insurance on the building and the fittings of the saloon amounted to \$4,500.

The fire was first observed at 7:50 o'clock by Patrolmen Frank Hart and W. Jones, who turned in an alarm. The exact cause of the fire is not known. It is thought to have started in the rear of Ang Shu's store.

A general fire alarm was sounded, but before the first engine could reach the scene the whole building was enveloped in smoke, with flames breaking through the roof. The building is a two-story frame structure.

Frank Kernan, owner of the building, says he will rebuild at once. The Boston saloon was conducted by Frank Guglielmo. The rest of the building was occupied, on Couch street by Ang Shu, a Chinese fish and fruit merchant; a Japanese pool room, and by Quon Lee's Chinese laundry. Abraham Rosenthal, a second-hand dealer, had a small store on the second floor side.

Guglielmo's saloon is insured for \$1,500. The proprietor of the Chinese store declares his loss will reach \$1,000. The office of C. R. Hansen & Co., employment agency, adjoining the Kernan property, was slightly damaged by water.

John Sampson was arrested by Patrolman Grif Roberts for stealing a valise containing clothing from Abraham Rosenthal's place. The man carried the stolen property around the corner to the pawnshop of Ed Rosenthal, on Burnside street, a brother of the man from whom he had taken it, and tried to dispose of the valise. The Burnside street dealer recognized the property and summoned an officer. Sampson dropped the valise and ran, but he was later found in hiding behind the store.

The Boston saloon was the scene of the murder of Mrs. Smith, who was killed by her negro husband in a room above the saloon during August, 1902. Sampson was tried in the police court this morning and sentenced to serve six months in the county jail. He refused to make any statement in his own behalf.

The prompt and efficient work of the police prevented the crowds from interfering with the work of the firemen. Patrolmen Hart and Jones, who first discovered the flames, had charge of the fire lines until relieved by Captain Bailey. The fire lines were stretched by Patrolmen Price, Grober and Lillis.

GREEN HIGHWAYMEN GET SMALL BOOTY

HOTEL CLERK AT THE DALLIES
HELD UP AND ROBBED OF \$4—

The Dailies, March 5.—S. D. Plummer, night clerk at the Barr hotel, was held up and robbed last night about 10 o'clock near an alley on Court street back of the White House saloon, by two men armed with pistols. Plummer was coming from the hotel with baggage.

The robbers secured about \$4.00. They were green hands at the business, and ordered Plummer to give up his money without compelling him to hold up his hands. Plummer took the money from his pocket himself. The money being in a buckskin sack, he addressed the epistolary in his pocket before giving it up. The robbers then ran down the alley.

Plummer gave the alarm at once and the officers have a man under arrest answering to the description of one of the robbers.

PLANNED TO LOOT A 'FRISCO BANK

BURGULARY TOOLS FOUND HIDDEN
AT THE ENTRANCE OF THE NE-
VADA BANK AND POLICE ARE
SATISFIED THAT A ROBBERY WAS
INTENDED—NO ARRESTS.

(San Francisco Bureau of The Journal.)
San Francisco, March 5.—Burglars' tools found under a box at the Pine street entrance of the Nevada bank at an early hour this morning, kept detectives and policemen watching the spot all the rest of the night. The immediate conclusion jumped at by the police was that an attempt was on foot to rob the bank.

In the same building at 303 Montgomery street is the firm of Keuffel & Esser, who have a large stock of surveying and other instruments valued at \$3,500. The French Savings bank is also in the same building.

The find of tools was made by a special officer. While passing by he noticed a piece of newspaper protruding from under an old box. In attempting to pull it out he found hidden beneath the box and wrapped in the paper a burglar's "jimmy," one small flat file, a screw driver and a pair of wire cutters such as are used for cutting electric wires. All the tools were new apparently.

Lieutenant of Police Burnett of the central station immediately detailed men on the case and ordered that strict watch be kept from a hiding place near where the tools were found while other men scoured the neighborhood. No traces of the persons concerned in the proposed robbery had been found up to 5 o'clock this morning.

ONE THIEF WILL KNOW THE TIME

K. RASMUSSEN HAS TWO WATCHES

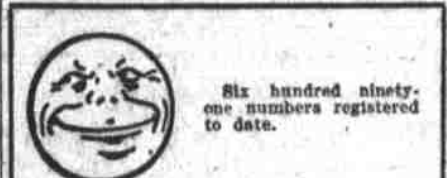

Awakened by some strange noise, Mr. Rasmussen arose and discovered that the watches were gone. The money was also missing. Patrolman Richards was notified of the robbery, but was unable to find a clue that would lead to the arrest of the thief.

IS SURE PROBERT WAS IN ALBANY

G. H. FITZGIBSON STATES THAT
HE SAW THE DAYTON BANKER
IN THE HOTEL IN ALBANY AND
THAT HE ACTED STRANGELY
DURING HIS VISIT.

That Arthur C. Probert, the absent Dayton Ore. bank manager, was in Albany, Ore., last Wednesday evening, is vouched for by George H. Fitzgibbon, traveling agent for Fisher, Thorson & Co., who returned to Portland this morning.

"I did not speak to Probert," he said, "but I know the man I saw at the Revere house at Albany was the one wanted at Dayton. He was busily engaged in writing letters when I first saw him and appeared nervous. The proprietor of the hotel, T. C. Bloomer, who did not know Probert, remarked the fellow's strange behavior. I had seen the man at Dayton on several occasions, but did not know at the time that anything was wrong. He left at 11 o'clock that evening on the Southern Pacific train, south bound. He handed a bunch of letters to the hotel clerk and the address on one was 'C. F. Probert, Jackson, Mich.'"

A dispatch to The Journal from Dayton states that a man named Hamilton had brought in the report from Dundee, a few miles south of Dayton, that Probert crossed the Wabamette river near that place at 3 o'clock Wednesday morning, going towards Woodburn.

It was reported that the depositors of the Dayton bank intended taking action to have the safe opened this morning, but up to 2 o'clock this afternoon nothing had been done. John Davis, local manager of the Diebold Safe company, was in communication with one of the creditors of the Dayton bank this morning and was informed that the depositors had not yet decided when they desired the safe opened.

Representatives of Gadsby & Co., a Portland house furnishing firm, are in Dayton today and have a claim of \$211 against the bank for fixtures supplied.
