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### ESTIMATES DAMAGE TO SHIP AT \$15,000

In tow of the tug Dauntless, the disabled steamer Grace Dollar is en route to San Pedro, where her damages will be repaired. Captain Olsen, the commander of the vessel, has filed his wreck report. It makes the following showing:

Estimated value of the vessel.....\$60,000  
 Value of the cargo.....4,500  
 Estimated damage to the vessel.....15,000  
 Estimated loss of cargo.....1,000

The disaster is attributed to a broken tail shaft. Captain Olsen said he estimated the damage to the ship at \$15,000, although it might exceed that figure or fall below it. The last time he brought the Grace Dollar into the Columbia river she had a broken shaft, but he got out of the accident at a cost of only \$50 and one day's delay. The shaft was found to have had a flaw in it, and the Vulcan Iron Works of San

Francisco was compelled to furnish another. The disaster to the Sequoia, which put into the river in distress in command of Captain Olsen, entailed considerable loss to the owners. Just what the present predicament of the Grace Dollar will cost the captain would not venture to say.

### READY FOR FIGHT AGAINST SALOONS

MULTNOMAH COUNTY PROHIBITIONISTS MEET AND NAME TICKET FOR COMING STATE ELECTION—CONFIDENT OF WINNING LOCAL OPTION BATTLE.

These are the nominees of the Prohibition mass convention chosen at the meeting Saturday. They were placed in nomination by the county central committee. The committee comprises B. Lee Paget, H. W. Stone, F. McKecher, E. L. Lane, C. A. Nutley, A. E. Davis and C. A. Lewis.

There was much enthusiasm manifested in the convention. An appeal for funds resulted in contributions during the afternoon amounting to \$231.50, which amount was subsequently increased at the evening session by \$111 more. The finance committee had hoped to raise at least \$500. "The object in raising the money," said I. H. Amos, "is to assist in passing the local option law in June."

"The mass convention ought to contribute \$500 and the state convention, which will meet March 29-30, ought to produce \$2,000 more. I hope to see \$5,000 eventually raised. The real tug of war will naturally come in Multnomah county."

The finance committee appointed consisted of F. L. Posson, H. W. Stone, E. O. Miller, E. T. Johnson, R. H. Steele and Rev. N. A. Baker.

F. McKecher summarized the proposed local option law and gathered much encouragement as to its probable successful adoption from the fact that the initiative and referendum law had been carried by a vote of 11 to 1.

"I believe that the residents of any precinct," he said, "should have the privilege of keeping out saloons in their neighborhood. The matter as to whether the saloon is a good or bad institution or whether alcohol is a food or not, are not in issue. I am willing to let a majority vote decide the question as to where saloons shall or shall not be installed."

**To Stand Alone.**

Mr. Amos does not want to see the prohibitionists coveting or carrying favors with other political parties. He besought the prohibitionists to stand strictly by their colors and thereby add to their strength.


