EGGS RISING IN SORELY NOW LARGE WITNEDEALS GAVE A FIRMER FEELING IN THIS MARKET—LOOKS LIKE POULTRY RECEIPTS WILL INCREASE—FLOUR AND WHEAT DULL. Front Street, March 12.—The principal items of interest in the Portland wholesale markets today are: Eggs not coming so fast. Poultry market retains firmness. Flour and wheat are dull. Onion market is quiet. Firmness in all fresh meats. Eggs Are Coming Slowly. The receipts in the egg market today were not quite so large as they have been of late, but Saturday is usually a good day for receipts. During the past few days in the neighborhood of 1,000 cases of eggs have been sold to northern parties and this has helped to reduce the surplus in the market. Today the price of eggs was ranging along Front street from 15c to 15 1/2c. A few stocks are being placed in cold storage. The demand from the north is expected to be good for a short time. Poultry Retains Its Firmness. The poultry market retains its former firmness during the past few days. The price has been a trifle strained on account of the few arrivals at that time. Now the dealers are expecting a few arrivals from the north and are anticipating in the market during the coming week. In the poultry market there is a very strong feeling of the market. The demand from the north is expected to be good for a short time. The wheat market shows only a tone of dullness and the demand from either the millers or the exporters is very limited. The millers say they have the expected supply of flour for some time with a continuance of the present slow call for flour. The fact that the war in the orient did not cause a large decrease in the price of wheat is a relief to the farmer who was told that should hostilities occur he would receive over \$1 for his wheat. The reverse has been the rule for his smaller wheat. The price of wheat has been smaller instead of larger since the war with Russia began. In this city the millers are paying the highest prices for the best quality of wheat, but in the interior the figures are lower. Excellent Demand for Apples. Good apples are very scarce and the quotations are showing a steady advance all the time. The demand for apples is coming in faster than ever and are bringing more than they are worth. Some nice shipments came in yesterday from the vicinity of Hood river and brought top prices. Potatoes Are Very Dull. The potato market is very dull with the dealers both in this city and San Francisco holding off for lower figures. Tonight the market is very quiet. The price of potatoes is taking down nearly 10,000 sacks of potatoes and this will cause a weaker feeling. Onions Are Quoted Down. In the onion market all is dullness and activity. The price of onions is coming in faster than ever and are bringing more than they are worth. Some nice shipments came in yesterday from the vicinity of Hood river and brought top prices. Firmness in Fresh Meats. The fresh meat market is firm in all lines for good grades, veal and hogs being especially scarce. The price of meat is coming in faster than ever and are bringing more than they are worth. Some nice shipments came in yesterday from the vicinity of Hood river and brought top prices. Sending Money to California. Next week this market will be supplied with fresh California salmon from the Sacramento river. A \$200 a day will be sent out of this state for salmon which the fish men say is all lost to them, as the closed season does the work expected of it—to protect the salmon. Turner & Co.—The spot in the shipments of eggs to the north is about over, about 10 cases having been sent out during the week. Tott, Hine & Co.—Receipts are now satisfactory; eggs are firm, although receipts are few. Bell & Co.—A number of cars of vegetables and fruit have been delayed on account of a strike along the Southern Pacific; generally the market is quiet. Chatterton & Co.—Hogs and veal very scarce; eggs are moving all right at market prices; poultry, hogs and veal continue to be in demand with the receipts as yet inoperative. Markey & Co.—A few Showwater bar and Olygus systems are in today; small continue scarce; Sacramento fresh salmon will come in next week; season here opens April 15 and closes May 15. D. E. Melick—Potato trade is very dull; buyers in the bay city are holding off for lower figures, according to Mr. Melick, the market is rather quiet; onion market considerably weaker. Davenport-Thompson company—all the vegetables which arrived per steamer have been sold. Everding & Farrell—Eggs are not quite so plentiful; poultry, hogs and veal continue to be in demand with the receipts as yet inoperative. Orrer, O'Malley & Co.—Eggs are firmer and better; the market is rather quiet; veal and hogs are being eagerly called for. McKinley Mitchell—Potatoes and onion business is very slack; nothing doing at all; excess in steamer tonnage to take out large amount.
