DEALERS OF PORTLAND ARE NOW UNARTE TO PILL THE DEMANDS OF THEIR TRADE-PRICES GO UP EVERY SEASON-CLAIMS OF SHORT MEASURE.

During the past three or four years there has been an enormous advance in the price of cardwood in this city. These advances have been made despite the fact that this is one of the most densely wooded sections in the world; and that the wood can be got to market cheaply. This year the prices on various grades of wood show an advance of about \$1 a cord all around, and even at the new figure good wood is hard to obtain.

Wood dealers in this city say that it is next to impossible for them to get dry wood, and it is nearly equally as hard for them to get wood of any kind. All the wood men report they are weeks behind in their orders, and some of them do not know whether they can fill them The prices on wood as now or not. ranging and those of a year previous show:

Coal is beginning to become quite a factor in the fuel situation in this city, and the dealers report that the past year has shown a large increase in its use. Coal as a fuel is now about on a par with wood in the cost, and if the price of the latter shows the same proportion of an increase during the coming year


