

BAKER CITY WATER SEED RESERVE NEEDS A MAN TO LOOK AFTER IT, BUT SALARY IS SMALL - SUMPTER WANTS PROTECTION FOR ITS WATER SUPPLY.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Sumpter, Or., March 30.—D. B. Sheller of Washington, forest superintendent, was here yesterday on the business of appointing a supervisor to take charge of the Baker City water seed reserve, which was set aside by proclamation February 5, 1904, to reserve the purity of the source of Baker's water supply. Mr. Sheller called an application for the position from V. R. Mead of this city, but inasmuch as the office only pays \$75 per month, and the man in charge has to pay his own expenses, Mr. Mead declined to file an application for the place. The water seed reserve embraces 50,000 acres, and it would probably consume the entire time of one man to keep it clear of stock.

Some time ago an application was made by the city council of Sumpter for a reserve to be set aside northward of here and covering the head waters of Pole and Wind creeks, which furnish the city's water supply, and which becomes exceedingly foul during the summer months on account of the stock being allowed to graze there. The reserve asked for takes in about 60,000 acres, but no action has yet been taken by the government. Mr. Sheller's attention was called to this application while here, and he is said to take the matter up with City Attorney Richards in Baker, who he met yesterday on business.

The fact that the Baker reserve will no longer be available to stock will have a tendency to drive sheep and cattle over to the Sumpter water shed and pollute the waters more than ever before. This was impressed upon Mr. Sheller, and he promised to take the matter up at once and do all in his power toward the attainment of the reserve.

Gasoline Motor Being Installed.
J. Frank Shelton, secretary of the Nell J. Sorenson company of this city, operating the Friday mine at Pearl, Idaho, returned from the property yesterday, accompanied by Otto Herlocker, general manager of the Highland mine, in the Rock Creek district, controlled by the same company. They stated that the foundation for the sinking plant to be installed at the Friday is nearly all completed, and the machinery is nearly all on the ground ready to be set up. The engine has 25 horse-power capacity, and is very complete in every respect. As soon as it is in place it is the purpose of the management to begin working in the double compartment shaft, which is now down below the level of the mine. It is to be sent down another 100 feet, and be kept in condition for permanent operations.

Scanda Crossover.
General Manager Wade of the Scanda Tunnel company, operating near Alamo, returned from the property at a few days ago, where he went with a new ventilator shaft to replace the one which was broken a short time ago. He says that work will be resumed as soon as the necessary repairs could be made to the plant.

The face of the Scanda crossover is now more than 2,700 feet from the portal, giving a vertical depth of about 1,000 feet. This is perhaps the longest in the district at the present time, unless exceeded by the longest in the North Pole. This is a crossover of 1,000 feet, and thence a drift, the latter being last summer more than 1,500 feet from the end of the crossover. It may be that the North Pole adit is now longer than the Scanda, and it will have the record for length of crossover.

RURAL TELEPHONES BECOME POPULAR

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Stafford, Or., March 30.—The Willamette and Willamette Telephone company organized here today and the officers are: President, Charles Baker; first vice-president, H. D. Aden; second vice-president, G. P. Gross; secretary, G. H. Rogers; treasurer, F. C. Gerry; general manager, E. S. Kruse, and general superintendent, L. P. Kooil. The company will incorporate with a capital stock of \$10,000, and will build and operate a telephone line from Willamette to Stafford, Frog Pond, Willows, Hood View and Newburg, going direct through the richest farming community in Clackamas county. The company is making arrangements with the Oregon Telephone company to connect with their lines at Oregon City. Petitions are now being circulated for the right of way, and as soon as this is granted by the court the company will begin work on the line.

Modern Flouring Mill.
W. Taughman's flouring mill is nearing completion and will be ready for operation in the near future. The machinery is of the most modern roller process and will have a capacity of about 12 barrels per day. The mill will be operated by a 20 horse water power and during the summer when the water gets low the wheel will be lowered about three feet so as to increase the strength to 30 horse power.
