

CHINESE MIGRATE TO THE CANNERIES

STRAIGHT OREGON TAKES 100 CHINESE TO ALASKA VIA SAN FRANCISCO—PACKERS LOOK FOR BEST SEASON AND POSSIBLE LABOR SHORTAGE.

When the steamer Oregon sails for San Francisco tonight she will have aboard 100 Chinese passengers. From the Bay City they will take passage for Alaska, where they have been employed to work in the salmon canneries during the coming season. Many Chinamen go north every spring to engage in the salmon industry, but this is the largest number that ever left Portland at one time for this purpose. It is believed in some quarters that a large exodus will make a shortage in the local supply of Oriental labor, particularly if they should be followed by many others of their countrymen.

Nearly all the work in the salmon canneries is performed by Chinese. It is stated that more canneries will be operated this year than usual, and as a result the Orientals will be in great demand. That much help will be needed is shown from the fact that the San Francisco firm that is necessary to send to Portland to get all the hands that are required. Heretofore in San Francisco the Chinese have been employed in obtaining all the laborers that could be profitably handled.

The canneries along the Columbia will employ hundreds of the dimble-fingered yellow men during the season, and for that reason it is considered rather doubtful if the local supply of that class of labor will be equal to the demand. If the celestials get the impression that there is likely to be a scarcity in the labor market they may decide to demand unreasonable wages.

Accommodations are being built on the main deck of the Oregon for the housing of the 100 Chinese passengers. When she came down from the north the steamer was fitted up with passenger accommodations for about 500 people, but since she has been plying between Portland and San Francisco the most of her space has been used for freight.

COMFORT OFFERS OFFENSE.
J. V. C. Comfort, general manager of the China Commercial Steamship company, has opened offices at 110 Second street, occupying the entire lower floor of the building.

He is expecting the steamer Lothian to reach the mouth of the river this afternoon. She is coming from San Blas Cruz, Mexico, and will begin loading immediately on her arrival. An effort will be made to have her in readiness for sailing about April 10. She will take about 5,000 tons of cargo, consisting chiefly of flour and barley. There will be 1,000 tons of the latter, which will go to Kobe. While it was purchased by Japanese business firms it is generally presumed that the shipment will eventually find its way into the Mikado's army.

Three thousand tons of barley will go to the Indrapura, which will probably be ready to sail about Tuesday. She completed discharging her cargo about noon and a half hour later shifted over to the Albina dock to begin loading for the outward trip. The rest of her cargo will also consist of flour.

While the boat shipments to the Orient have begun to fall off very perceptibly, they are being made up for in a great measure by the large barley orders which are being received.

TO IMPROVE ALASKA DOCK.
For the past day or two engineers have been running surveys in the vicinity of Alaska dock, and it is expected that those who have been watching operations that preparations are under way for the building of another sidetrack in front of the dock in order to increase the facilities for handling cargoes. This is the dock at which nearly all the Oriental freight is discharged and from which a portion of it is taken and loaded on cars for eastern shipment. The company has had this improvement under contemplation for some time, but this is the first time that any steps have been taken recently to bring about the change. The dock is in a very bad state in the vicinity much quicker dispatch can be given eastern freight.

SEVEN FREED FROM MARITAL BONDS

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT FIVE COUPLES ARE DIVORCED IN A DAY—CRUELTY AND ABANDONMENT ARE CHARGES—NO CONTEST MADE IN MOST OF THE CASES.

The marital ties binding together seven unhappy couples were severed this morning by Judge Sear in the state circuit court. The most interesting testimony offered was given by Ann B. Colby, who swore that Mary Ann Colby had been drunk too many times for him to keep track of them. The Colbys were married at Crown Point, N. Y., December 25, 1877. Habitual intemperance was alleged as the ground for the suit, which, in common with the other five, was not contested.

Jennie Ferguson was granted a divorce from Joseph Ferguson on the ground of desertion and was given the custody of her child. They were married at Hiawatha, Kan., February 15, 1882.

Habitual drunkenness, failure to provide and desertion, as alleged in the complaint, secured Angie H. Renno a legal separation from Henry M. Renno. The two were united at Vancouver, Wash., December 25, 1896. The desertion occurred in November, 1902.

Glenada Whitaker was allowed a divorce from Cyril J. Whitaker and permitted to resume her maiden name of Griffin. Cruelty was the charge. They were married at Portland December 25, 1902. The cruel treatment, alleged to consist of the use of profane language, derogatory statements about her relatives and declarations in the presence of witnesses that she did not love him, is said to have begun 23 days after marriage.

Henry A. Mantz declared that Alice Mantz is a woman of violent and ungovernable temper and who at times would accuse him of unfaithfulness. He had to go to St. Vincent's hospital October 19, 1902, he asserted, and she rarely visited him during the three months he remained at the institution, and refused to wait on or help him in any way. His tale of woe procured him a divorce.

Desertion secured Catherine McKim a divorce from William McKim. They were married at Toronto, Canada, December 4, 1891, and the desertion is said to have occurred May 28, 1902.

John J. Gotcher was granted a divorce from Nellie Gotcher. Married in Portland May 18, 1888, he asserted she left him about 10 years later. The woman was sent to the insane asylum at Salem in 1901. The maternal grandmother of the three children, Mrs. Annie Hengstler, was awarded the custody by Judge Sear, Gotcher consenting.

"HOLY ROLLER" CHIEF VERY BADLY WANTED

Corvallis, April 1.—The longing for a sight of High Priest Creffield of the Holy Rollers grows in intensity hereabouts, augmented by the reward of \$100 that is offered for his return. The opinion is frequently expressed by substantial citizens that Creffield is in Corvallis, or very near by. They have their idea on the fact that the present condition of the public highways makes it impossible for the fugitive to travel very fast by road, and that he has not gone by rail or boat there is little or no doubt, advertised and hunted for as he is at present.

Among local members of the former Roller fraternity conditions exist at present that cause the onlooker to smile. Whereas, only a few brief weeks ago about 50 of the followers dwelt in peace and harmony, most of the time at one residence, in which now the husbands of some of the "Roller" wives do not allow their dames to visit one another, nor to indulge even in the melancholy pleasure of discussing the days of good old roller times.

Though not told for publication, one husband of a former fanatical wife in this city declares that not long since he saw two of the Holy Roller leaders, who, with Creffield and Brooks, first started the religious agitation of that sect hereabouts; that he told them to clear out of the country, and that they have "cleared." His desire now is to see Creffield apprehended and summarily dealt with, as he so richly deserves. There is no doubt but that Holy Rollers in Corvallis has ended.

MARRIED AT THE MIDNIGHT HOUR

Eugene, Or., April 1.—Yesterday morning at the unusual hour of midnight, Francis M. Jorin, of Springfield, and Miss Kate Dell Hise of Elmira, were married in this city by Rev. Leon D. Green. There seems to be a bit of romance about the affair, although full particulars are hard to obtain.

It appears that the young lady's father, who is a respected member of Elmira, objected to attentions being paid his daughter by young Jorin, and refused to give his consent to their marriage. The young couple arrived in Eugene Wednesday night about 10 o'clock on the stage. The young man was out in quest of the county clerk or someone who could grant them a marriage license. He finally found Deputy Clerk J. D. Hamlin at the Commercial club, about 11 o'clock.

Armed with the marriage license the couple began to hunt for a minister to tie the nuptial knot and were directed to the home of Rev. Mr. Green, who happened to be an acquaintance of the young lady, and there they were made one. They left an hour afterward on the southbound train, bound for California.

BAKER COUNTY IS STRONG FOR MOODY

GOLD IS WHERE YOU'LL FIND IT

MINERS' OLD SAYING REAFFIRMED BY THE HISTORY OF THE GOLDEN CRATER CLAIM, WHICH WAS BONDED YESTERDAY TO DR. BROOK.

Sumpter, Or., April 1.—The Golden Crater claim, generally known as the Bear Gulch property, on which Wade & Camp held an option for some months, which has expired, was yesterday bonded to Dr. Brook. The ledge is on patented ground, owned by the Oregon Lumber company, and the bond which Dr. Brook secured is signed by David Dees, its president. The exact price the parties to the agreement will not make public, but it is understood to be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

While Messrs. Wade & Camp were working the property some remarkably rich ore was uncovered, running into thousands of dollars in gold, which was plainly visible to the naked eye. It was the sensation of last season and every mining man who visited it tried to get hold of the property, but there was some trouble about the previous bond that had been given during the life of the Wade & Camp option, and a clear title could not be given.

Local mining men were especially interested in the proposition for the reason that it is the first instance in this section where gold values have been found in lime formation, though such is not an unusual occurrence in either Montana or Colorado. Then, it had previously been thought that there were no gold ledges in that vicinity. The land had been filed on for the timber, which had been logged off and the ground was considered practically worthless until this discovery.

It was another striking proof of the old saying among miners that "gold is where you'll find it."

To Set Aside Fraudulent Mortgage.
J. J. Hennessy has instituted suit against the Cracker Creek Gold Mining company and Colburn & Peck, of Milwaukee, to set aside the mortgage given by the company on its property, the Lost Lode, Dewey and Mollala claims, in the Cracker Creek district, to Colburn & Peck, for \$940, and make his judgment of 1902 the first lien on the property.

In the complaint it is alleged that the mortgage is fraudulent; that it was given for the purpose of preventing plaintiff from collecting a judgment, when the officers of the company learned that he was about to sue.

The company made no appearance in the first suit, and judgment was taken by default. Attorney Smith of Baker City received a letter from one of the officers asking him to take the case, but when he suggested that a retainer would be necessary, there was no response.

It is reported from Granite that an exceedingly rich strike has recently been made at the Cougar. It is stated that Isaac Nall, who has charge of the development work for the Spokane owners of the property, a few days ago encountered a ledge in the crosscut he was driving, revealing ore which to all appearances was of a very high grade. Samples of it have been sent to Spokane for assay. The report states that the ledge measures between seven and eight feet, disclosing the best body and highest grade of ore yet disclosed at the property.

Good Ore at the New York Group.
Dan Halliday and Ed. Benson completed their assessment work at the New York group in the Granite district, and it is reported that the showing which they have made is most encouraging. It is stated that the property reveals good ore in large quantities.

Roy Wencelaw left yesterday to continue work on the California Gulch claims, owned by A. J. Donney. Everything is about ready for the season's run, and Mr. Wencelaw says that he will begin washing in about three days.

The Sumpter Sampling & Testing Works started in today on a consignment of ore from the Occidental and Phil Sheridan claims, coming in regularly now, and the indications are that the company will have all it can do in the future. The company is in position to treat ore from the smaller properties and give speedy returns. In addition to its commendation relative to the process required and the reduction machinery necessary in any given instance.

Robbins Will Locate in Boise.
Hon. J. H. Robbins returned this morning from Boise, Idaho, where he has argued to locate his family temporarily in order to place him in closer touch with his Wyoming mining interests. Mr. Robbins expects to move to Boise shortly after April 1.

HARRIS CARRIES MARION COUNTY

MINOR HERMANN SECURES BUT SIX DELEGATES OUT OF A POSSIBLE 22—FULL COUNTY TICKET NOMINATED—STATE DELEGATES NAMED.

Salem, April 1.—Hermann is lost cause so far as congressional delegates from Marion county are concerned. The erstwhile general land office steersman and present incumbent of a congressional seat in the house of representatives went down the line with only six delegates in the congressional convention out of 22. L. T. Harris probably secured the rest. Hermann may, however, get the two doubtful delegates, making his strength eight.

The Republican county convention of Marion convened yesterday afternoon and without much acrobatic nomination a full county legislative ticket.

J. J. Murphy was named chairman after a rather heated contest with Alfred L. Toose, who was backed by the supporters of Henry Snyder for sheriff. The Culiver men wanted the control of the convention and got it by seating Mr. Murphy.

The convention came nearly going to pieces over the question of endorsing Judge George H. Burnett. A committee brought in a set of resolutions endorsing Roosevelt, the county administration and Judge Burnett. Very few voted in the affirmative, but a storm of protest was up against the adoption of the blanket endorsement. The chairman declared it carried in face of the protest of several delegates who were on their feet at once demanding the eyes and nose, but the chairman refused.

The delegation is about evenly divided for and against Burnett, but his opponents say they will not be bound by the hasty and uncalled for action of the convention.

ASTORIA HAS BIG STRIKE ON HAND

ALL UNION CARPENTERS STAND OUT FOR EIGHT HOURS A DAY—CONTRACTORS SAY NO LONGER WORKMEN WILL CHASE WORK UNLESS GRANTED MORE PAY.

(Journal Special Service.)
Astoria, April 1.—This city is threatened with the biggest labor disturbance that has occurred, probably, in its history. Every union carpenter and housewrecker is out today, standing for their demand for an eight-hour day instead of nine hours.

The carpenters' union has arranged to take all contracts during the strike with the intention of not tying up the building industry which is at present on the boom.

The contractors are obstinate and say they will import non-union mechanics, but they are figuring without their host as the strikers have the sympathy of the people. The Manufacturer's association entertained 1,000 laboring men last night and there was great enthusiasm manifested during the meeting.

Another strike may be called tonight by the longshoremen, who demand a raise from 40 cents to 50 cents an hour, and from 50 to 75 cents an hour for overtime. No answer has yet been received from employers of longshoremen. All unions are well organized here and have pledged themselves to help one another.

GRAIN WAREHOUSE BURNS.

Independence, Or., April 1.—Fire destroyed the McClain warehouse at Suver, a small station four miles south of here, Wednesday night. The origin of the fire is not known. There were about 15,000 bushels of wheat and 1,500 bushels of oats, mostly insured, destroyed. Mr. McClain's loss will be about \$2,500. The loss to farmers having grain in the warehouse will be very slight.

FIRE NEAR MERLIN.

Merlin, Or., April 1.—The residence of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Riggs, near Merlin, was with contents, entirely destroyed by fire Wednesday night. Loss \$1,000 with no insurance. The fire was probably caused by a defective fuse.

LINN COUNTY IS POLITICALLY SLOW

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS VERY SLOW—OWING TO FADING INTEREST—SHERIFF MUST COLLECTING TAXES—A COUNTY JAIL WITHOUT A PRISONER.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Albany, Or., April 1.—The registration of voters in Linn county is progressing slowly, owing to a lethargy on the part of the voters that has been noticed in many parts of the state. Up to the close of business last evening the registration in this county was less than for the same time two years ago. The number of registered was 2,495, out of about 5,500 voters in the county. The Albany precincts and those immediately adjoining the city are fairly well represented among those listed on the county clerk's books. The voters from these precincts called personally at the clerk's office to register, but the outside precincts are slower in coming in, and those listed are secured by notaries and justices of the peace. The largest number registered from any one precinct is from West Albany, 118, while Bodaville in only represented by 11 voters on the clerk's books.

Sheriff Very Busy.
Sheriff Worth Hueston is crowded with work in the tax collection department. It was thought that when March 15 arrived and the time for relating taxes on real payments was ended the rush would subside, but this did not prove to be the case, for the entire force in the sheriff's office is constantly kept busy attending to the wants of the taxpayers. Up to last night 4,450 tax receipts had been issued on account of the 1903 roll and over \$30,000 had been collected with no sign of an early cessation of the rush. This is only a little over half of the taxes due from the citizens and property holders of Linn county.

An Empty Jail.
The Linn county jail has been for more than three months without an occupant. Before Christmas, 1903, the last prisoner was turned out of the jail by Sheriff Hueston, and since that date not a man has occupied a cell in the structure. Linn county people are certainly entitled to the name of being peaceful and law-abiding, for this record can probably not be duplicated by any other county in the state in recent times. Sheriff Hueston says that this condition of affairs has not existed in Linn county in many years.

W. in this state, and one of the most tireless workers in the order, has resigned his position and will shortly remove to Seattle, having accepted a position with the American Guaranty company of Chicago. He will have charge of the work of that company for the state of Washington. Mr. Hogue and his wife have for a number of years been prominent in the social and fraternal life of Albany and their removal from this city will be deeply regretted by the best people.
