

CANNOT ESCAPE

Another Attempt Made to Rescue Princess Louise From Madhouse.

(Journal Special Service.)
Berlin, April 2.—Lieut. Matiasch Keglitch today made another unsuccessful attempt to rescue his mistress, Princess Louise of Coburg, from the madhouse near Coswig, Saxony, where she was incarcerated some time ago, though perfectly sane.

The princess is held in the asylum under orders from her husband, Prince Philip, and with the connivance of the emperor, King Leopold of Belgium, the emperor of Austria and the king of Saxony. The lieutenant's scheme was betrayed to the police in a peculiar manner by one of the party to the plot.

Princess Louise's case was the sensation of Europe, and ever since her disgrace she has continued to contribute much matter for scandal.

It was but a few months ago that it was discovered that she was secretly meeting one of the guards of the asylum, and that a liaison had been formed between the two, although the woman is beautiful and the guard is described as a coarse, uncouth fellow.

When this scandal arose the princess gave the excuse for her actions as being that she had simply made a friend of the guard in order that she might escape from the madhouse.

WILLIAMSON SURE TO BE NOMINATED

THIS IS VIEW OF SITUATION TAKEN BY CHAIRMAN BAKER OF REPUBLICAN STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE—SAYS KARENYI IS NOT FOR MOODY.

Frank Baker, chairman of the Republican state central committee, regards Congressman Williamson's fight for a renomination as already won. "I am as sure that I will be the nominee as I am that I am alive," he declared this morning.

"Moody's friends are claiming every unscrupulous delegation from eastern Oregon," he continued, "but in several cases it is my information that they are for Williamson. The Oregonian says this morning that Harnsey has gone for Moody, but I have been in communication this morning by long-distance telephone with Republicans in that county, and I am told that Williamson will have a majority of the delegation. It is my belief that Harnsey will carry Union, which hold their primaries today. Baker county will be a harder fight.

"But what difference do these eastern counties make, anyway?" Mr. Baker drew out his pencil and began to jot down figures. "No matter how they go, Williamson will be nominated. He is sure of Multnomah—that's 71 votes—Clatsop 10 more, Columbia seven more, and Morrow county's five delegates are pledged to him. That makes 93 votes, which is just enough to nominate."

But Moody's friends say they will carry Columbia.

"Sheer nonsense! Columbia is just as safe as Multnomah."

"Then you think there will be no break in the Multnomah delegation?"

"No, sir," responded Baker with emphasis. "No honorable man who was nominated as a delegate under positive instructions to vote for Williamson will go into the congressional convention and vote for Moody. If for any reason any of them should feel constrained to vote against Williamson it would be his plain duty to turn his proxy over to some one else who would follow the instructions. That is the only course an honorable man could pursue. I tell you there won't be a break in the Multnomah delegation."

Judge Carey expresses himself with equal confidence and believes Williamson's renomination is absolutely assured. He said this morning: "The Multnomah delegation will stand pat. Of course there are men on the delegation who are friends of Moody, but they will all follow the instructions of the county convention. I have talked with several of them and they are all likely to vote for Moody, and they all tell me that they will vote as instructed."

But while so convinced of the outcome in the second congressional district, the Republican party leaders in this city are in much doubt as to the result in the first district. They concede that Herrmann has a hard fight and the gains made recently by Harris have upset many calculations. Today an honorable man will have an important bearing upon the result, although not wholly decisive, owing to the injection of other issues in several counties of the district.

RAINIEST MARCH FOR 25 YEARS

In its sickle vagaries the March which passed away so smilingly performed many curious feats in the way of introducing novel brands of weather to Portland during its stay. Not for 25 years has there been as much rainfall during the month of March as occurred during the 31 days just passed.

The weather bureau's monthly bulletin shows that the total precipitation for the month was much greater than for the same month in any other year since 1878. In that year the precipitation for March was 11.70, while in the present year it was 8.78, more than twice as great as was reported for the previous year. The average precipitation for the month of March during the past 26 years is 5.82.

There was one and only one clear day during the 31. That was the last day of the month, when the sun shone brightly throughout the day and there was a touch of spring in the air. Every other day was cloudy, though there were three others when it was only partly cloudy.

The highest temperature was 61 degrees on the last day of the month, while the lowest, 30 degrees, was registered on the second. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.83. On 27 of the 31 days in the month there was .01 inch, or more, of rainfall.

Frost occurred five times during the month. March 9, 15 and 16 there was a light frost, and a heavy one March 31. A killing frost was reported on the second day of the month.

There was a total movement of 5644 miles of wind during the month, with a maximum velocity, for five minutes, of 33 miles per hour. The prevailing direction was from the southeast.

MRS. E. L. WATSON CAUGHT IN CHICAGO

Chicago, April 2.—Mrs. Emma L. Watson, who is accused of defrauding the government and the public generally by issuing deeds to homesteads on inaccessible mountain peaks in the west, was arrested here this morning. It is said Mrs. Watson arrived last Tuesday from the Pacific coast.

The swindles charged against Mrs. Watson are the same for which three persons have already been arrested. Mrs. Watson has been sought by detectives since January. Captain Porter of the secret service and Detective Gallagher worked up the Chicago end of the case.

Mrs. Watson was taken before United States Commissioner Humphrey this morning and her case was set for hearing next Monday, after which it is probable the prisoner will be taken back to Portland.

Mrs. Watson is a handsome brunette. A diamond brooch glittered at her throat this morning and her fingers were adorned with rings. Operations of the alleged gang of land swindlers are said to have been daring. One of the accused men is E. L. Puter, who is now out on bail and who is reported to have arrived in Chicago with Mrs. Watson.

WILEY JAP LEARNS ENGLISH QUICKLY

S. MAKI NEEDED AN INTERPRETER DURING TRIAL, BUT WAS LOQUACIOUS IN THE LANGUAGE WHEN SENTENCED—ORIGINAL COURT'S BIG GUILT.

Though he had to have the service of an interpreter when he was arraigned on the charge of cutting S. Tsukigawa with a knife before Presiding Judge Cleland, in the state circuit court, a few days ago, S. Maki has in a brief period made wonderful strides for a Japanese in mastering the English vernacular.

"Six months," he ejaculated, when the court sentenced him to serve that length of time in the county jail. As he uttered the words he half rose from his seat. Everybody, including Judge Cleland, had to laugh.

Harry Richmond, jointly indicted by the county grand jury with William Dean and Ed Wiley on larceny and burglary charges, pleaded guilty, but said he thought being an American should save him from punishment. Judge Cleland thought an American should have known better. Richmond and Dean, who also pleaded guilty, were sentenced to serve seven years in the penitentiary. Wiley pleaded not guilty, and Attorney Arthur C. Dayton was appointed to defend him. The crime of which he, with the others, is accused is stealing \$175.00 from Amanda I. Carby.

George Noe withdrew his plea of not guilty to larceny and pleaded guilty to simple larceny. T. M. Dill, his attorney, said the case is peculiar as Noe has been in several insane asylums. Arthur C. Spencer, the assistant district attorney, said he knew this to be true. Judge Cleland suspended sentence pending an investigation of the facts.
