In and About Vancouver

(Journal Special Service.)

The Hotel Columbia at this place was visited by a lone highwayman at 1:15 o'clock this morning, and several loiterers, who had not yet retired, were lined up against the wall of the barroom at the point of a revolver. There were four persons besides proprietor Hidden that were conversing in the annex of the hotel when a masked robber walked quietly in with an order, "Hands up!"

Those present were Dr. Wall, Post Quartermaster-Sergeant, and Mr. Kuhn, besides Mr. Hidden and one of his employees.

Just prior to the robber's entrance Messrs. Boardman and Reynolds, who had been members of the party, left, stating they intended getting a light lunch at one of the restaurants.

When the highwayman ordered the men to line up they were taken completely by surprise, thinking at first it was a joke being perpetrated by Boardman and Reynolds. They were not left long in doubt, however, as to the seriousness of the affair. The thug then made the men march into the barroom connected with the hotel, and line up behind the counter, with their backs toward him, while he emptied the cash register of its contents.

He then commanded the men to come to him one at a time while he went through their pockets. The amount received is not exactly known, but it is said to be about \$20. Who will finally get the nomination is a question that Polk county voters, and particularly those who reside in Dallas, are anxiously awaiting to see answered. This much is freely conceded by the leaders in the Republican party, viz.: If either Kirkpatrick or Loughery can get control of the three strong Dallas precincts, he will be the line for nomination. But can either candidate do better than to simply get a part of the whole delegation? This is a question that is disturbing the senatorial aspirants and Republican leaders, and one that will remain unanswered until after the primaries tomorrow.

CURFEW LAW IS NOT SATISFIED WITH TELEPHONES

WOMEN OF THE DALLAS ASK THAT BOYS AND GIRLS UNDER 16 YEARS OF AGE BE KEPT FROM THE STREETS AFTER 9 O'CLOCK AT NIGHT.

The Dallas, April 6.—At a meeting last night Mayor Gunning impressed upon the city council the importance of acting in the matter of the curfew ordinance, which was presented by local members of the W. C. T. U. some time ago, and who desire to have the ordinance enforced. The only change they would make in the ordinance is to raise the age of the boys and girls from 14 to 16 years. These they would have kept from roaming the streets after 9 o'clock at night.

The council asked the women to present such an ordinance to it and action on it will be taken at the next meeting.

Forger Arraigned.
J. M. Filloon, city recorder, has arraigned Walter Rice, the forger. Rice was examined and later pleaded guilty to the charge. Rice is wanted at Walla Walla and Seattle for like charges. LIQUOR SELLER IS ANGRY AT OFFICERS
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hillsboro, Or., April 6.—A. G. Watson, plaintiff, vs. L. C. Walker, recorder; W. Roman, marshal; Editor Hogue, Mayor; J. N. Hoffman, city attorney of Forest Grove, defendants, is the title in an interesting suit here.

A. G. Watson, who, in the past few months, has been arrested several times for selling liquor in violation of a city ordinance, is angry and has brought an action for damages against the above defendants in the circuit court of Washington county. The plaintiff alleges that he was assaulted and beaten by the defendants, and that he thereby damaged in the sum of about \$2,000. The case was set for trial yesterday, but the time was taken up in arguing motions and demurrers.

The defendants got until 1:30 o'clock to file an amended answer at which time plaintiff's attorneys filed motions to strike out portions of the answer. The motion was disallowed and a demurrer subsequently filed was also overruled.

The contention of the plaintiff is that the ordinance under which he was arrested was illegally passed, and that he was unlawfully deprived of his liberty when confined in the city jail. Whether or not the plaintiff will continue the proceedings is a question.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., April 6.—A man committed suicide by shooting himself through the head, about 15 miles north of here, early yesterday morning. The place of the tragedy was in the barn of a farmer, where he had passed the night.

The cause, evidently, was despondency. From naturalization papers found on him he was proved to be a Norwegian by the name of Peter Nelson. He had \$3 in cash on his person.

ALBANY PEOPLE ENCOURAGE KANSAS CITY COMPANY THAT SEEMS TO GAIN FRANCHISE FOR INDEPENDENT LINES—OTHER MATTERS OF INTEREST.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., April 6.—The city council met last night in called session to consider an ordinance recently introduced for a franchise for an independent telephone company desiring to establish an exchange here. The meeting was for the purpose of securing expressions from the people as to whether or not it was the popular wish that the franchise be granted. W. D. DeVarney, representing a Kansas City firm, and who is asking for the franchise, was present and explained that the purpose of the new company was to establish an exchange here as in other towns in the valley to connect with the farmers' lines and finally establish a service between the smaller places and the larger cities in the state.

Many farmers' lines, he explained, have been built, but cannot be connected with the city exchanges for the reason that the company now operating throughout this state will not permit them to be attached unless the company pay a heavy rental for the use of the instruments; and the new company proposes to sell telephones direct to the farmers and charge a small rental for the use of the city lines by the farmers.

Cheap Rates.
He also agreed to a contract fixing maximum rates for the rental of telephones to city subscribers, naming a rate fully 50 per cent less than that now charged by the company operating here. The local manager of the telephone exchange appeared and opposed the granting of the franchise, but the showing made by him was not equal to that made by Mr. DeVarney, and the citizens seemed to favor the new exchange to a great extent, owing in part to the fact that recently the rate on party lines in this city was raised 25 per cent. The council will, next Tuesday evening, take up the franchise ordinance and dispose of it and many here believe that it will be granted to the new company.

A local teachers' institute will be held in Brownsville next Friday evening and Saturday, and an interesting time is expected by the teachers and patrons of the schools on that occasion. The program for the institute will open Friday evening, with a lecture by State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, and the Saturday meetings will consist of discussions of school questions by the teachers and patrons. County Superintendent Jackson hopes to make a decided success of this meeting and the outlook is indeed flattering.

A pleasant evening was spent by all, refreshments being served before the happy company dispersed.

Shipping Horses.
A number of horses have been purchased here within the past few days for shipment to Portland and Puget Sound cities and some of these animals have been taken down the river on the steamers the Grey Eagle and the Pomona, each took on a load here for Portland and there are more shipments to be made. It is said that these horses are principally for the city trade, but it is generally believed they are being gathered up for the Japanese army for cavalry and artillery service.

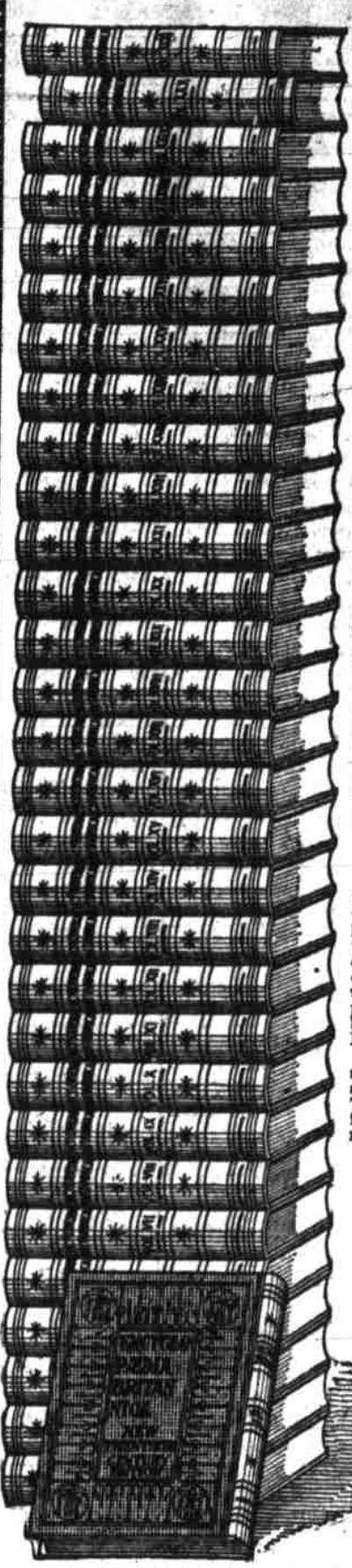
Some of the animals secured are heavy draft horses, but many of them are stock and as their destination is principally Seattle, it is thought they will be shipped to Japan for the army of the mikado.

Paid Double Taxes.
The most liberal man in Oregon has been found by Sheriff Worth Huston of Linn county. A few days ago the sheriff received a letter from a resident of one of the smaller cities in this county asking as to the man's indebtedness for taxes. The sheriff in response to the letter a statement showing the Inquirer's indebtedness in detail, the total amount due being \$42.05. Yesterday a second letter was received from the same taxpayer, returning the sheriff's statement, and enclosing a check for just double the amount of taxes due—\$84.10. This is the first case on record in Linn county that a man voluntarily paid more for taxes than the amount assessed against him, the rule being that citizens can sue to be much less than they are, and in many cases the sheriff is directly blamed with making the rate so high. Sheriff Huston thinks he has found a jewel, and declares the man who was so liberal in settling his taxes must surely be a good Democrat.

TILLAMOOK SAYS PLEASE "SHOW ME"

TOO MUCH TALK ABOUT A RAILROAD WITHOUT SUBSTANTIAL FACTS ALONG WITH IT—POLITICAL BIDDING HAS NOT LOST ITS GRIP—EDDY'S PLACE AS BOSS.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tillamook, Or., April 6.—William Reid is causing some comment by his numerous statements concerning the proposed railroad.

No citizen of Tillamook expects or demands that this city be made a terminus of any road.

It is likely that the citizens would ask before exerting themselves very greatly, an assurance of a station, switches, sidetracks, etc., but before arriving at that point in the negotiations there is a little preliminary which many will insist upon, something in the nature of "show me."

In plain words, the business men will ask for Mr. Reid's credentials, and for a reliable guarantee or promise by people financially capable, that the road will be built.

Ring Rule Dominant.
The action of the Republican county convention demonstrated that the "ring" has not lost its grip, say many politicians.

W. T. West, the nominee for joint representative, it is claimed, was probably put up to be slaughtered. He is a farmer, without experience in any matters of public import or policy. He is of the sort that a lobbyist would describe as easy.

The principal fight against Lamb for clerk and Stanley for sheriff will, it is said, be their connection with the old regime.

It is said that A. W. Sovereign was retired as chairman of the Republican central committee and was succeeded by W. H. Cooper, a change not at all to the advantage of the party, as Sovereign is an energetic politician. If Mr. Eddy is removed from the scene of action his place as boss will probably be sought by H. T. Botts, a Missouri lawyer. He is a quiet, industrious man, with a good knowledge of his own advancement, and may develop into a figure of the gopher species in state politics.

AFTER THE EUGENE TANNERY.

Ilwaco, Wash., April 6.—Business men of South Bend are making strenuous efforts to induce the proprietors of the Haines tannery, which is to be moved from Eugene, to locate at South Bend, and a building location has been offered free.
