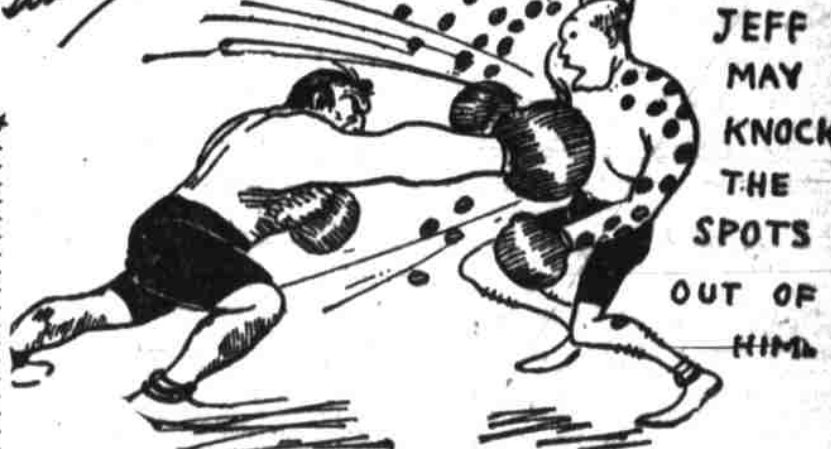

San Francisco, April 14.—There is a rumor afloat here that the Portland Browns defeated the San Francisco Seals yesterday, but it is discredited in baseball circles.

Tacoma, April 14.—The story to the effect that Portland had defeated Harrie's nine yesterday at Fresno is not believed here. It is thought in reliable circles that the canard was started by Mike Fisher, who is always ready for a joke.

Sacramento, April 14.—No verification of the report that Ely's team defeated Frisco yesterday at Fresno can be secured here.

Fresno, Cal., April 14.—Portland defeated San Francisco today by a score of 11 to 10. This statement is made on the authority of Manager Ely of Portland. It is confirmed by the captain of the San Francisco team, removing all doubt as to its authenticity.

The Portland team narrowly escaped. In the ninth Drennan, in center field, by an amazing catch, closed the inning with the bases full and one man forced home by Fitcher's wildness. In the eighth inning Ely took Thielman out of the box and placed Butler on the rubber. This availed little. In the ninth chapter Butler filled the bases. Score: Portland, 11; San Francisco, 10. Butler sent in a vicious smash and it struck Charlie Irwin in the cup-board, forcing in a run. Ely fainted and had to be carried to the rear. Consternation reigned and excitement was flush. Old Ike stood the gaff, however, and as he saw the last of Ely disappearing around the corner of the bleachers, being carried by Shields and Druhot, he shot the deciding ball over the center of the stone. "Biff!" went Bill Massey's willow against the Spalding, and far from the maddening crowd it soared. The three men on the circuit romped home. The ball was still going, and the vanishing form of Drennan could be distinguished chasing it. Faster and faster the swift center-fielder flew. He knew if he could get the ball the game would be saved, and he also felt that in justice to Ely's demise he should get that fly. With a terrific lunge he made for the fast-descending ball. It seemed beyond him, but an extra stretch of half an inch enabled him to get under it. Back to the diamond started Drennan, but the teams had gone home, the only one awaiting him being Umpire O'Connell. After he told his story O'Connell allowed the catch and awarded Portland the game, 11 to 10. It was a close shave. The score was:

BIG LEAGUES OPEN THE SEASON TODAY

BRIGHT OUTLOOK FOR THE NATIONAL AND AMERICAN ASSOCIATIONS—NEW YORK TEAMS EXCEPTIONALLY STRONG—WASHINGTON DISCOURAGED.

The National and American baseball leagues will inaugurate the 1904 season this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Almost simultaneously in eight cities the battle for pennant honors will be on among the two greatest leagues in the world. The American league will open the season in Chicago, St. Louis, New York and Washington; the National league in Cincinnati, St. Louis, Brooklyn and Philadelphia.

The White Stockings will have for their opponents in the first series at Chicago the Cleveland sluggers, headed by Lajoie. The Colts will play their first games in Cincinnati.

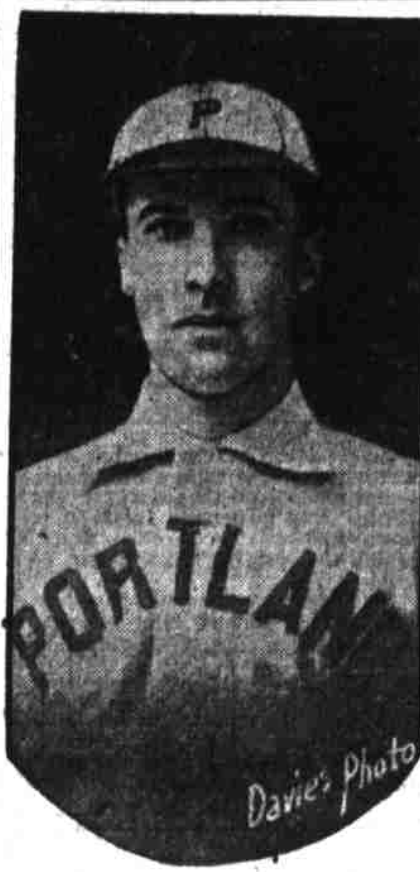
 In Excellent Condition.
New York, April 14.—After weeks of training in the south the New York Nationals and Americans have arrived here. The players of both teams, with few exceptions, are in excellent condition and ready for the opening of the season.

The infield is much stronger than it was last year. Breenahan may not be as fast as at third as Lajoie was, but he is a much heavier batter. Dahlon is a big improvement over Babb. The old Chicago shortstop is in better condition than he ever was at this time of the year and has batted harder than at any time last season.

 Griffith More Than Satisfied.
Clark Griffith, manager of the Americans, is more than satisfied with his team. With one exception, there isn't a player on his team who is not in shape to get into a championship game. The exception is Putnam, who is suffering with a lame arm. The other pitchers were effective during the entire southern trip. Powell, Hughes, Chebro and Griffith are a quartet hard to beat. Powell may be used in the opening game.

 St. Louis Hopeful.
St. Louis, April 14.—A splendid summer sport season is in store for St. Louis fans. While it is hoped too much to expect to see either the Cardinals or the Browns win out in their respective leagues, there is no gainsaying the fact that both teams are infinitely better than they were thought to be. The American league, especially, promise to be a surprise.

The Cardinals will have their full team in the field when they line up against Pittsburgh tomorrow. Danny Shay, the "Frisco shortstop, is the team's sensation. He will likely stay at short. Brin going to third and Burke to the bench. Shannon, the new right fielder, is proving a fitting substitute for Donovan and there is no mistaking the fact that Taylor, Corbett and Nichols are the same crack pitchers as of yore. Byers and Grady will do the bulk of the catching, while Beckley is assured of work at the initial station.

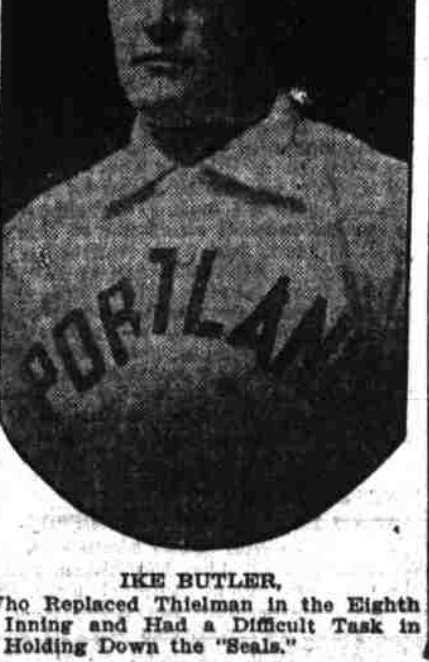
 Detroit Is Crippled.
