19TH INFANTRY MEN DEFEAT LOCAL NINE

HOWARD AND SIEBLES PITCHED
BRILLIANT BALL, HOLDING THE
HEAVY BATTERING DOWN IN GOOD
STYLE — PATTERSON, BARKIN
AND KATHE WERE FAULTLESS.

The 700 local fans who journeyed to the ball park yesterday afternoon were treated to a fine exhibition of the national game. The contesting teams were Jack Rankin's collection of local stars and the Nineteenth Infantry (Vancouver) team of the Oregon state league. The soldier lads carried off the honors of the day by scoring a victory, the score being 4 to 1. The feature of the contest was the pitching of Howard for the soldiers.

The local team put up a clever game, considering the fact that it was the first time this season that most of them had had a ball in their hands. The work of the infielders—Howard, Rankin and Patterson—was especially clever.

Hugo Siebles did the twirling for the locals and handled himself quite cleverly for his first game. Although somewhat wild at times, he allowed but one walk and had the Vancouverians phased at all times.

Two unfortunate errors combined to work against him, and allowed the soldiers to score three of their four runs. The first misplay was charged up against "Home Run" Joe Marshall, who donned the spangles for the first time this season, when he threw wide to first, allowing the soldier to reach the first station in safety, from whence he advanced the rest of the journey on a passed ball and a wild pitch.

Low, Mahaffey failed to put in an appearance at the scene of hostilities, and one Burley Stevens was hastily introduced to Mahaffey's uniform, which was not spacious enough for Stevens' massive form, and the tightness of his casing hampered his movements. The uniform was made of strong material, for it failed to give in the least when Burley strenuously tried to reach for the fly in the sixth, the mufing of which cost two runs. The ball, after eluding the mits of the fielder, rolled clear to the fence and the two runners scored.

Big Bill Haynes played a star engagement at first. He scooped in the low throws and pulled down the high ones in clever style.

Joe Stutz cavorted around the center garden and fielded his position cleverly, considering the fact that not a single fly came his way. Joe made up for the lack of an opportunity to shine in the field by smacking out a pretty hit in the eighth and stealing third base.

Catchers Slavin and Delaher each played a clever game and, considering the fact that neither of them wore a breast protector, their work was all the more brilliant.

McAnally and Wundt, as well as Bentley, the third baseman, are worthy of special mention.

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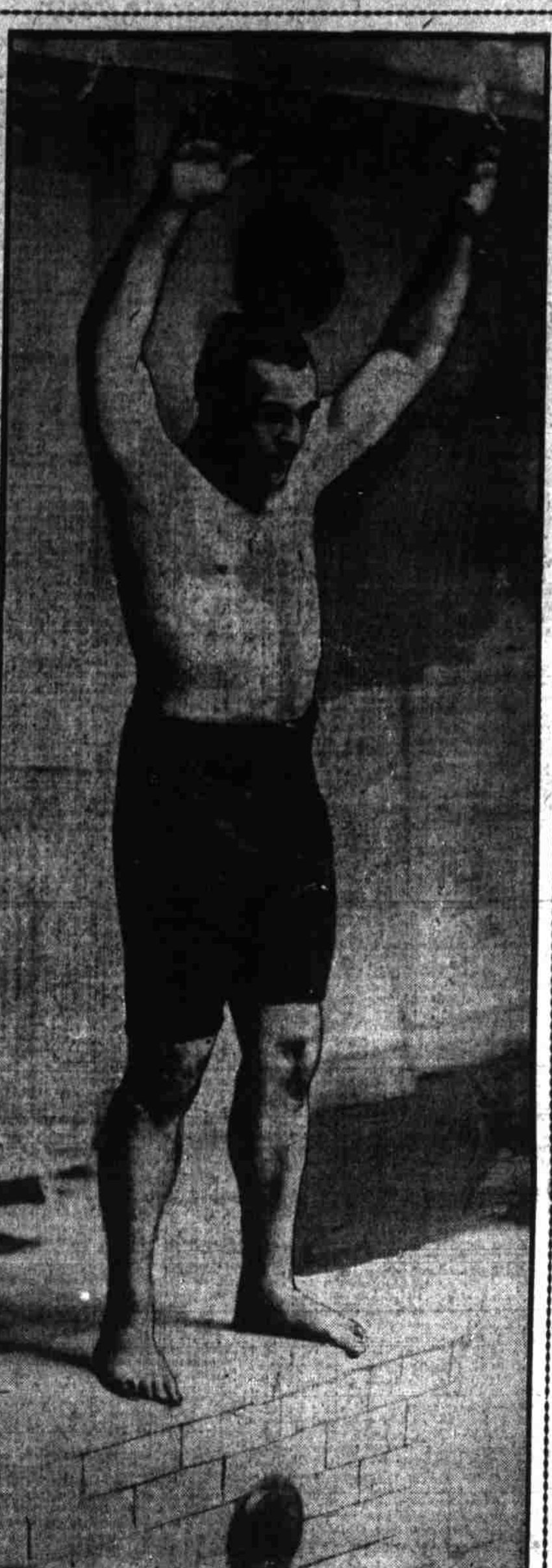
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CHAMPION JEFFRIES READY FOR A DIVE.

CELLENT FORM AND WHITE-
WASHES IRWIN'S TEAM, ALLOW-
ING BUT THREE HITS—CASTRO
FIELDING AND BATTED WELL.

Fresno, Cal., April 18.—Charles Druhota of Portland, the young, clever and promising twirler, occupied the "hill" for the Browns yesterday, and shut out the San Francisco team, allowing but three safe hits. So completely did Druhota have the Seals under his spell that the heavy San Francisco batsmen simply fell by the wayside in their endeavor to connect safely. Meany, Hildebrand and Andy Anderson nearly swung their heads off trying to locate Druhota's

curves. Castro played the best ball of the team. His fielding was clean and his throwing accurate. In the ninth inning he cut off a good chance to tie the score by hiding the ball under his arm and tagging Charlie Irwin as he left the second base. Castro's timely hit in the seventh inning scored Beck.
