BOW WOWS MEET IN ANNUAL SHOW

LARGEST DOG SHOW IN HISTORY
OF PORTLAND KENNEL SHOW
WILL OPEN TOMORROW MORNING—OVER 500 ENTRIES FOR
EXHIBITION.

The first to welcome, foremost to defend,

The bow wows meet in annual convention tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in the music hall of Portland's exposition building. The exhibition will be held by the Portland Kennel club, and will continue each day and evening until Saturday night at 11 o'clock when it will come to a close. James Mortimer of New York City, who will do the judging, arrived this morning and is at the Portland hotel. Mr. Mortimer is considered one of the most expert dog judges in the world and his work at the show will be watched with keen interest.

In all there are 500 entries and 300 dogs, which will make the show the biggest on the coast and the greatest ever held in Portland. A feature of the show will be the presentation of two puppies to the women. Each woman as she enters is given a coupon and on Saturday night two tickets will be drawn, and the holders will be given a thoroughbred cocker spaniel and a thoroughbred collie.

BUNTING SEASON FOR LOCAL FANS

BROWNS AND SEAWASERS TO OPEN
LOCAL BASEBALL SEASON TO-
MORROW AFTERNOON—SEATTLE
ARRIVED THIS MORNING—PORT-
LAND COMES TONIGHT.

The Portland Browns will arrive home this evening, and will open the local baseball season tomorrow afternoon at Twenty-fourth and Vaughn streets, in a game with the Seattle Seawas. Owing to the lateness of the hour of arrival this evening, nothing in the form of a reception will be tendered the team, excepting that a big crowd of fans will welcome them to Portland.

Tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock the first ball will be shot over the plate by Jake Thielman, who will pitch for Portland, while Jay Hughes will twirl for his team.

Governor Chamberlain and Mayor Williams will be unable to be present at the opening game, the former being detained at Salem on official business, and the city's executive having a council meeting that will command his attention.

From the peculiar record of the Browns, the attendant criticisms during the southern trip and the new men on the team, it is expected that an immense crowd will turn out to see for themselves whether or not Portland has a team worthy to represent this city. From the latest reports from Manager Ely, the men are all in fine condition, and the management desires the fans to suspend judgment until they see the team perform. As exclusively stated in yesterday's Journal, Jack O'Connell will umpire the series in this city.

Seattle Team Arrives.
Parke Wilson and his bunch of Seawas, including George Van Halten of ancient memory; Carlos Smith, he of the elongated frame, and one Kid Mohler, arrived from the southland this morning, and when discovered were busily engaged in doing justice to several porthouse steaks.

Parke Wilson expresses himself as well pleased with his present team, and is confident of landing his club well up in the race when the going sounds the finish of the 1904 season. Wilson thinks he has the most reliable pitching staff in the league.

"In Jay Hughes, Nick Williams and Frank Barber," says Parke, "I have three men, who do not do a good work as any of them. While Schock has not yet acquired his speed, he is one of the best in the league when he is right, and you will see him round to shortly. The rest of my team will compare favorably with any in the league, and I certainly would not exchange with any that I have seen."

One member of the Seattle team, who is always pleased to visit Portland, is Carlos Smith. Carlo is accompanied on this trip by his wife.

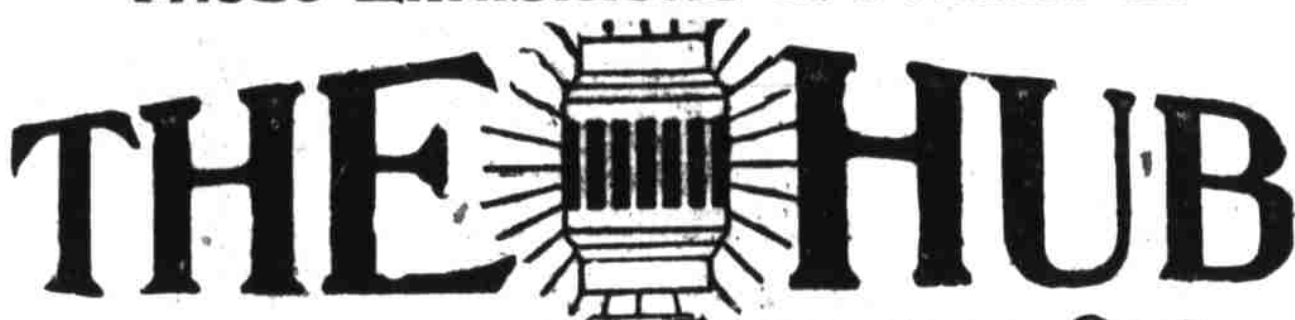
