BIGGEST SHOW IN HISTORY OF CLUB

PORTLAND KENNEL ASSOCIATION OPENED THIS MORNING WITH THE LARGEST ENTRY LIST ON RECORD—MANY FAMOUS DOGS ARE ENTERED.

The biggest dog show in the history of the Portland Kennel club opened at 10 o'clock this morning with over 300 dogs entered, and at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon James Mortimer started his arduous task of judging the dogs.

The kennel club has made great preparations for this exhibition, and congratulates themselves on getting some of the finest dogs in the country entered. This morning all was commotion at the Exposition building, and the owners were busy getting their pets placed in the proper stalls.

One of the busiest men at the show is Billy Fechtelner, who has a fine lot of his famous smooth coated fox terriers ready to be judged. George McKillen put on a box in front of his Vallant Jr.'s stall and tried to get his dog to say that he would carry off the prizes this year, as he did last.

Vallant, Jr., is a famous fox terrier and beat everything on the coast last season. At this show there are a number of fine dogs entered in his class, and if he wins he will certainly deserve it.

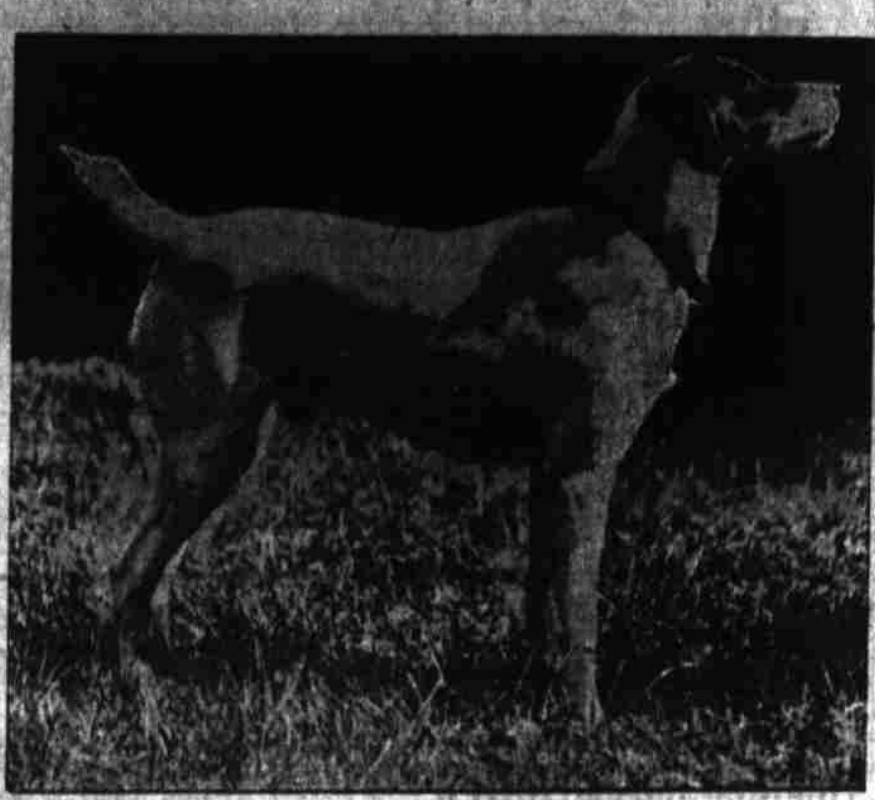
