

Browns Break Losing Spell

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BROWNS TROUCE SEATTLE SIWASHES

PORTLAND MEN SHAKE OFF THE
DROWNING, AND BAT PARKER
WILSON'S FITTING ALL OVER
THE FIELD—LARGE CROWD WIT-
NESSED THE OPENING GAME.

Seattle, April 27.—The Portland Browns got after Parke Wilson's men here yesterday afternoon and gave them a proper trouncing, the score being 3 to 6. It was the opening day and 5,000 fans turned out to witness the sport. Mayor Ballinger tossed the first ball over the plate amid great cheering, and the "noughty" four season was on with a rush. From the start the Portlanders meant business and went after everything in real baseball fashion. Needing a run to tie the score in the seventh, Nadeau started to steal second, while McCredie, edged off third, waiting for the throw before going home. As soon as Blankenship shot the ball to Mohler, the Portland right fielder was tearing madly for the plate and made it in good shape, while Whiplash Phil ambled safely back to first. Portland clinched the contest in the eighth inning, five hits and a few errors contributing five runs. Seattle made a fine rally in the ninth, but the best the Siwashes could do was to produce two runs.

The Browns played in gingerly fashion, and three of them stole bases in lightning fashion. Castro made a few hit with the crowd by his clever playing and fine batting. Beck and Drennan played in improved form, while Iberg was steady with men on the circuit. The score was:

ELY SHOULD BE TREATED FAIRLY

FANS THINK IT UNGENEROUS TO
KIDNAP CENSURE UPON THE PORT-
LAND MANAGER WHILE HE IS
SICK IN BED—HOW MEN HAVE
BEEN TREATED.

While the air is filled with all kinds of rumors and stories regarding the Portland baseball nine, its failure to win games and the causes thereof, it is no more than fair, considering the fact that Manager Ely is ill at his home, suffering from a high fever, to throw a little impartial light on the troubles, instead of "rubbing it in" on a man when he is down. It is ungenerous to give a man occasion to blush over something for which he is not responsible, because that same man may excel his defamer in countless ways.

That Portland has not won its share of games so far this season nobody will deny, but that the cause of losing so many games had its origin in Bakersfield because the players were refused car fare to and from the ball park is so juvenile in its attempt at explanation that it is laughable. It is a well-known rule in athletics, college and professional, that when a baseball team, football squad or track team begins training for a season, each man should do all the walking possible in order that he may improve his wind.

The essential part of training is to get men in such condition that they can stand a severe physical test without affecting their health, and to allow baseball-players, after resting all winter, to ride in streetcars on the way to and returning from practice, would be considered detrimental to the men themselves. An evidence of Manager Ely's method of training the men at Bakersfield is the fact that every player who reported there for work lost from five to fifteen pounds of superfluous flesh.

Regarding Fines.

Much has been said about town regarding the large amount of fines that were imposed upon the men during the California trip, yet it is a positive fact that not one of the team was fined during the two months' stay in California.

On last Sunday Captain Freeman fined Nadeau \$25 for not sacrificing when he was so ordered, and if Freeman did the proper thing he would have put a double penalty upon him.

The men were given whatever money was due them, and if they ran short of funds it was their own fault, not Manager Ely's. Shes, Butler, Iberg, Shields, McCredie, Drennan, Druhot, Thielman and Freeman were not without money, for the reason that they saved their coin, and it was a good thing for the remainder of the nine that their purses were empty.

So far as the report is concerned that there is talk of Dugdale coming here to manage the Browns, little need be said besides denying it. Dugdale will not manage the Browns this year, at least, and the chances that he may next year are as bright as night itself.

According to the players themselves, they are extremely anxious to win and feel the sting of defeat as keenly as Manager Ely. Beck and Castro have been doing everything in their power to strike their gait at the bat, and yesterday's performance at Seattle demonstrated that they can hit some. Beck has been so heartbroken over his failure to connect safely with the ball that he has been heard talking with his bat before stepping up to the plate.

And so it is with the other men. The slump caused by losing simply discouraged the men, and the truth of the matter is that they are mad with themselves at losing.

It was unfortunate that Manager Ely was taken ill, because his illness had a depressing effect upon the players, and the nine as a whole resented the attacks made upon their manager, while he is unable to be about to face the music.

Yesterday's victory will do more good for the Browns than all the abuse that may be heaped upon them. Manager Ely is a sick man and should be given a chance. It is unfair and ungenerous to strike him while he is down.

TO PLAY ON SUNDAY.

Charlie Gray, the clever young infielder, is to play shortstop on the All-Portlanders, while Patterson goes to third in place of Miller, who will probably play with the Leatherworkers.

Manager Siebels has discovered a promising young pitcher named O'Brien, who may be induced to twirl for the Leatherworkers.

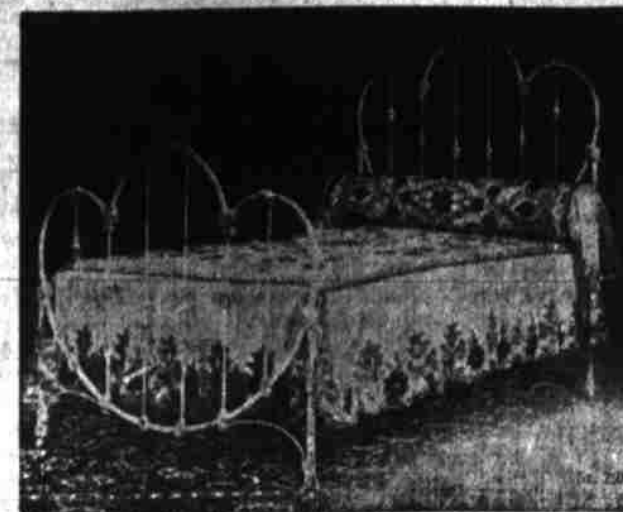

P. C. HOLLAND BUYS THE STATESMAN

WALLA WALLA STATESMAN PURCHASED BY PORTLAND MAN—POLITICS TO REMAIN DEMOCRATIC—PRESENT MANAGEMENT TO BE RETAINED.

Annapolis, Md., April 27.—Leading

lawyers and jurists of Maryland are gathered in Annapolis for the ninth annual meeting of the Maryland State Bar association. The meeting will be formally opened this evening with the annual address of the president, George Whitlock, of Baltimore, following the delivery of which the members of the association will be received by Governor Warfield at the executive mansion. The sessions of the convention will be resumed tomorrow and continued through Friday. There will be a number of addresses, among the prominent speakers being ex-Gov. William Pinkney Whyte, Chief Judge James McKenney Whyte, of the court of appeals, and Hon.
