ORDERS ISSUED FOR CORBETT'S TRIP HAS
MILITARY FIELD DAY NO FIGHTING SIDE

Brigadier-General Funston, through Adjutant-General Evans, has issued the general orders calling for a three day department athletic meet at Vancouver barracks on May 19, 20 and 21. The affair promises to be an interesting event and will give the athletes of the Department of the Columbia an opportunity to test their skill on the field and track. Vancouver barracks will be a veritable athletic camp during the three days' meeting. The order is as follows:

Headquarters Department of the Columbia, Vancouver Barracks, Wash., April 21, 1934—General orders No. 11—The following recommendations of a board of officers convened by special orders No. 52, current series, these recommendations are approved and published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

1. That there be a department contest at Vancouver barracks, Wash., for three days at such time as the department commander may designate.

2. That the following constitute the program of events: Pole vault, throwing 16-pound hammer, running high jump, 100-yard dash, pitching a wall tent (two men), 220-yard dash, standing high jump, putting 16-pound shot, 220-yard hurdle, rope climbing, bicycle racing (one mile), shelter tent pitching (two men), running broad jump, 440-yard run, standing broad jump, 120-yard hurdle, potato race, obstacle race, presentation of medals.

3. That the program be as equally divided as possible among the three days of the contest under the supervision of the field committee, and that the order of events as above prescribed shall not be changed by the committee except for cogent reasons.

4. That not more than two entries for each event be permitted from each troop, battery, company or detachment.

5. That the hours of the contest shall be from 10 a. m. to 12 m., and from 1:30 p. m. to 3 p. m. each day.

6. That credit by points be given organizations as prescribed in general orders No. 8, headquarters Department of the Columbia, 1933, and that credits for the potato race be given as therein prescribed for cogent reasons.

7. That a field committee of 13 officers be appointed to take charge of and manage the contests, from whom there shall be selected one referee, one starter, three judges, three inspectors, one clerk, one scorer and one timekeeper, and that one non-commissioned officer be detailed as announcer, and equipped with a megaphone.

8. That the members of the field committee who are stationed at Vancouver barracks be a sub-committee of the Columbia, 1933, and that credits for the potato race be given as therein prescribed for cogent reasons.

9. That the program of events be published in the department as soon as available, and that the commanders be directed to forward to department headquarters the names of competitors for each event at least seven days prior to the contest.

10. That post commanders be advised to send more competitors to the contests than are authorized to receive government transportation; to obtain transportation for the extra competitors at the lowest possible rates, and to pay for such transportation from the proceeds of the post exchanges.

11. That the commanding officer of the cavalry at Fort, Walla Walla, the infantry at Vancouver barracks and the field artillery at Vancouver barracks be each directed to send a baseball team from their commands, and that the commanding officer, artillery district of Puget sound, be directed to send a baseball team providing transportation is available.

12. That there be a game of baseball between the Puget sound team and one of the Vancouver barracks teams to be selected by lot on the first day of the contests; that there be a game between the Walla Walla team and the other Vancouver barracks team on the second day; and that the winning teams play on the third day of the contests. Games to be called each day as soon after 3 p. m. as practicable.

13. That a grandstand be built at the baseball field, Vancouver barracks, and that admission fees be charged at this grandstand during the baseball games, and that the money be used for the benefit of the post exchanges.

14. That the winning team be given appropriate prizes consisting of baseball materials.

15. That the annual athletic competition for the department will be held at Vancouver barracks, May 19, 20 and 21. Pursuant to telegraphic authority from the war department, quartermasters are authorized to issue transportation to and from the competition for the following number of men: From Fort Walla Walla, Wash., 25; from Boise Barracks, Ida., 5; from Fort Wright, Wash., 6; from Fort Lawton, Wash., 10; from artillery district of Puget sound, 15; from artillery district of the Columbia, 15.

16. That competitors should arrive at Vancouver barracks not later than the morning of May 18.

17. By command of Brigadier-General Funston.

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COLUMBIA CREW IS ENDOWED BY GOULD

New York, April 28.—James Myers, '04, manager of the Columbia crew, has announced the gift of \$10,000 to the crew by Edwin Gould, who was graduated from the local college in 1882.

The money was presented in the form of an endowed fund, the annual interest of which, amounting to some \$400, is to be used as part of the expense of maintaining and equipping the Columbia crews.

This is not the first donation of its kind in the country. While at Columbia, Mr. Gould rowed in his class crew and took a lively interest in aquatic.

The idea of endowing college athletics is a rather new one. Only a few weeks ago it was suggested by President Harper of the University of Chicago to endow all forms of sport embraced in the activities of the Western Conference of Colleges in order to do away with paid admissions. The idea was condemned as impracticable, but the gift of Mr. Gould is a refutation of that theory.

English Racquets Issue No Challenge.

New York, April 28.—Although there will be no challenge for the Davis international tennis cup this year, it is hoped that English and American college players may meet in a series of matches.

According to B. S. Prentice of Harvard the proposition of the Intercollegiate Lawn Tennis association, every effort is being made to induce the English collegians to visit this country this summer.

A team of Oxford and Cambridge has been invited, and there is every prospect of a meeting, provided the financial end of the trip can be arranged. Some definite announcement will be made later.

The annual tennis match between Harvard and Yale has been arranged for Saturday, May 26, on the grounds of the New Haven Tennis club. Six men will represent each college, three teams in the doubles, and six matches in the singles.

Last year Harvard won by six matches to three.

Of old Harvard team, B. S. Prentice, captain; J. I. B. Larned and R. Bishop are still in the college. Of the Yale team, E. Clapp, T. B. Cole and T. Lewis, captain, will play again this year.

AMATEUR ATHLETES PREPARE FOR FAIR

Amateur athletes all over the country are preparing for the Olympic games at St. Louis on June 2, 3 and 4, when the Amateur Athletic union holds its championship meeting for field and track games.

PREBLES MINUS HIS SOLDIER NINE

REGULARS CANNOT GET LEAVE TO FILL DATES ARRANGED BY MANAGER, WHO IS COMPELLED TO RECRUIT A TEAM OUTSIDE OF VANCOUVER BARRACKS.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Vancouver, Wash., April 28.—Manager Prebles of the local baseball team left last night for Eugene, Or., where he is booked to play today, but Prebles did not go with his old depended team. Most of the members of the Vancouver team, in fact all except two, are members of the U. S. army stationed at these barracks and is known as the post team.

Prebles stated that he thought he had completed arrangements with the understanding that the members of the ball team would be granted permission to go to the different points scheduled to play.

In the afternoon, however, he stated that he was informed by the post commander that the soldiers would not be granted permission to leave, and Prebles then, in order to fill the date was compelled to organize another team from Vancouver citizens.

It is stated by some of the officers at Vancouver barracks that the post commander's action in this matter was due to the fact that it was the understanding that the post team was to be an amateur and for the past 18 months, it is said, there has been a spirit of professionalism among the soldiers at the Vancouver barracks, and this has done a great deal to discourage pure amateur athletics in the army, for the reason that the men who play in the professional line receive so much money that they lose interest in the sports where such payments are lacking.

During the game with the Columbia university on field day, it was said, the post team had two civilians on the team, which is contrary to the rules of the A. U., to which the post team is supposed to belong. And then, too, it is further stated that the Columbia university team supposed it was playing a soldiers' team.

It is also believed that the organizing of one ball team out of the different commands will militate in securing the best results in the games to be held at the department field day meet next month. In that meet the respective organizations must have the team from their own organization and in no instance will a batterman be permitted to play in an infantryman team.
