BARBADOES CHAMPION CONFIDENT OF WINNING FROM THE MAN FROM DIXIE — EDDIE GRANEY WILL REFERENCE — CONTEST TO TAKE PLACE AT COLMA.

San Francisco, April 28.—Joe Walcott and the Dixie Kid will battle for the welterweight championship of the world tonight under the auspices of the Colma Athletic club. The new pavilion at Colma has been remodeled, and the electric and train service will be of the very best. There will be one train, which will leave at 7:30 o'clock, and the electric cars will leave Fifth and Market streets every 15 minutes. Walcott was to meet Billy Woods, the clever middleweight from Los Angeles, but after the showing Woods made against Mike Shrock last month the club officials called the match off and signed the clever Dixie Kid to meet the West Indies wonder. Both men are confident of winning, and Walcott goes as far as to say that Mr. Dixie will wish he was in Dixie before the fight has gone far. The Dixie Kid's record shows that he is a game. His last fight was with Al Neill in Oakland, whom he knocked out in the first round. He has been training for the past three weeks, and if beaten will have no excuse to offer in regard to condition. Walcott has been working with Jack Johnson at Oakland, and is also in excellent trim. The winner of the contest will meet Joe Gans.

Eddie Graney will act as referee, and can call extra rounds after the twentieth if necessary. There will be a 10-round preliminary between Fred Landers, the clever featherweight who knocked out Danny Dougherty in four rounds on the evening of the McVey-Johnson fight. Landers' opponent will be Lyn Truscott, the Australian champion. This will be the second meeting of these boys, their last contest resulting in a 10-round draw. The first preliminary will be called at 8:30.

The betting on the Walcott-Dixie fight opened yesterday, with Walcott the favorite.

FIRST GAME WON BY EUGENE NINE

BARBADOES VANCOUVER TEAM NO MATCH FOR THE BALL PLAYERS MANAGED BY DU BRANE—FAIR CROWD WITNESSED OPENING CONTEST.

Eugene, Or., April 28.—The Eugene Blues defeated Prebble's aggregation of Vancouver players here yesterday by the score 6 to 1 in the opening game of the State league season. Owing to the rain—it drizzled along all day—the attendance was not what it would have been had the weather been good, but nevertheless several hundred of the faithful were out. The diamond was muddy and fast playing was almost out of the question. However, the crowd got its money's worth and seemed well satisfied with the way in which the local team handled itself.

Owing to the refusal of the commandant at Vancouver barracks to grant furloughs to some of the soldiers who are members of the Vancouver team, Manager Prebble arrived here short-handed and entered the game with a patched-up team. More players arrived today, and this afternoon's game promises to be a better exhibition of the national sport.

FAMOUS AMERICAN STALLION IS DEAD

London, April 28.—The death is announced of the famous American stallion Foxhall at Lord Rosebery's farm.

Foxhall was by King Alfonso-Jamaica by Lexington and was foaled at A. J. Alexander's Woodburn stud near Lexington, Ky., in 1878, being 25 years old at the time of his death. He was purchased as a yearling by James R. Keene and named after his son, Foxhall Keene. Mr. Keene thought he saw in him a good colt and shipped him to England in his 2-year-old form. In 1881, in his 3-year-old form and carrying the white and blue spots of the Keene stable, he won the double events, the Cesarewitch and Cambridgeshire. In the former he carried 110 pounds and was ridden by Jockey W. McDonald. There were 18 starters. In the Cambridgeshire he carried 126 pounds, was ridden by Jockey J. Watts and won from a field of 32 starters. He also won the grand prix de Paris in 1881. In 1882 he won the gold cup at Ascot with 126 pounds up. Foxhall won many other races and when retired became one of the leading sires of England.

SPORTING GOSSIP.

W. Gayley, champion amateur swimmer of Australia, and Arthur Young, the Pacific coast champion, have been matched to compete in the 440-yard event for the Gleason challenge cup before the Olympic club of San Francisco.

Jack Karkreek, the American wrestler, has arrived at Melbourne, Australia, and issued a sweeping defi to all the antipodean wrestlers.

In a practice game the other evening in New York, George F. Slosson, the billiardist, recently broke the world's record at 15-inch ball-time, two shots, with a run of 291. The previous mark was 222, made in Paris last fall by Ora Morningstar.

Metoxen, the once famous player on the Carleton Indian football team, is now employed as a teamster by a Wisconsin paper mill.
