

GOVERNOR PRAISES
THE WORLD'S FAIR

CHIEF EXECUTIVE SENDS LETTER OF CONGRATULATION TO ST. LOUIS ON SUCCESSFUL OPENING OF LOUISIANA PURCHASE EXPOSITION.

Governor George E. Chamberlain has sent the following letter to the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, extending the congratulations of the state to St. Louis and Missouri on the opening of the Louisiana Purchase exposition. The letter was written in lieu of one to be sent President Francis of the exposition. It follows:

"Salem, Or., April 28.—Mr. H. L. Dunlap, Managing Editor Post-Dispatch, St. Louis, Mo.—Dear Sir: As executive of the state, and for and on behalf of the people of Oregon, I congratulate the citizens of St. Louis and of your state on the successful opening of the Louisiana Purchase exposition. Oregon, perhaps more than any other state in the union, has felt and now feels a deep interest in this, the greatest exposition of ancient and modern times, and her people have an abiding conviction that an enterprise which starts out under such favorable circumstances will terminate in complete success.

"It is indeed fitting that the Louisiana purchase should be celebrated by the people of your city and state, for it marked the beginning of a new era in our country's history, and was at the same time the crowning act of Jefferson's administration and a monument to his far-seeing and philosophic statesmanship. He more than any statesman of his time foresaw that the time would come when the enterprise and push of the descendants of those who had settled New England, the middle states and the south would seek to pass beyond the limit which had been established as our extreme western boundary-line.

"By this act of purchase an immense empire was added to our territory, and through its instrumentality the center of population, wealth and influence has gradually moved and is now moving from the Atlantic toward the Pacific, and truly may it be said that westward the star of empire takes its flight.

"Not only was Jefferson instrumental in adding to our territory the immense domain included within the Louisiana purchase, but his vision extended west of and beyond its limits, and to him was due the fact that the Oregon country was added to the United States. Realizing that the Pacific must in course of time become the highway for commercial intercourse with the Orient, as early as 1805, without the approval of many of the statesmen of his day and generation, he sent forth Lewis and Clark with a letter of credit against the world on their expedition of exploration and discovery. The result of the efforts of these daring adventurers was the peaceful acquisition of the Oregon country and the addition to our already vast domain of an immense territory rich in all the resources that go to make for the uplifting and enrichment of mankind.

"To Jefferson, then, more than to any other man, is due the fact that our territorial limits have been expanded beyond the wildest hopes of his contemporaries and the United States placed in the front rank of all the nations of the world for extent of territory, wealth and population.

"Following upon the heels of the great exposition now in progress in your magnificent city, the centennial anniversary of the last achievement of Jefferson will be fittingly celebrated in Oregon, where terminated the adventurous expedition of Meriwether Lewis and William Clark. Both these expeditions appeal to the patriotism of our people.

"It is a pleasure to me, as executive of this state, to wish your people unbounded success in the enterprise which you have inaugurated with so much effort, so much of seal and so much of patriotism; for as a loyal citizen of this great commonwealth, I feel that our people owe much of their success, much of their rapid growth in wealth and population to the early efforts which were made in behalf of this state by Senators Benton and Linn, two of Missouri's greatest men. It was largely through them that the people of the United States came to know and appreciate the

POLICE WAR ON
SECOND-HAND MEN

VIGOROUS CAMPAIGN INSTITUTED AGAINST MEN WHO SELL STOLEN GOODS—L. SHANK PLACED UNDER ARREST—FILE OF CATCH-BASIN GRATINGS FOUND.

War is to be waged on second-hand dealers who are believed to have been conducting "fences" for thieves, and the first man to be arrested is L. Shank, who runs an establishment at 312 Front street. He was arrested today on a warrant issued from the municipal court on complaint of Deputy City Engineer W. P. Lillis, charging him with receiving stolen goods. His case will be heard by Judge Hogue Monday.

The arrest grew out of the recent thefts of catch-basin gratings, which has caused the city engineer's office no end of worry. It will be recalled that Thursday afternoon Deputy Lillis caught a morphine-eater in the act of stealing a grating in South Portland, and after a hard race arrested him. In the municipal court yesterday the man was sentenced to serve a term of 90 days in the county jail.

A large number of gratings had been stolen, and an investigation was started at the instigation of City Engineer Elliott. Yesterday Deputy Lillis in his rounds found a pile of the gratings in the store operated by L. Shank. They had been broken into small pieces, with one exception, and this gave the whole case away. Consequently this morning Lillis appeared before Deputy District Attorney Adams and swore to a complaint charging Shank with receiving stolen goods.

There are said to be other second-hand stores in the city on which the police have fixed the responsibility for the loss of stolen goods, and other arrests are expected to follow.

Tried to Poison Carlos.

A dispatch from Lisbon today says the recent illness of King Carlos is now believed to have been due to an attempt to assassinate him by placing poison in his food.

The king's secretary and aide have also been ill for some time and are now being given anti-poison treatment. On this latter they show marked improvement, almost fully confirming the suspicion that their death was planned by poison poisoning.

COWS ON THE GRASS

Ice cream is darker in color now than it has been. The cows are on the grass, and the milk is coming in tinted richly with the deep color of heavy cream. "I think it a good idea to add a small tax to the annual levy for a certain period for the purpose of securing the fair grounds for a city park. The purchase is a good thing, the only question arising being to secure the property without inflicting too great a burden on the taxpayers at one time."

President A. L. Mills of the First National bank is enthusiastic over the proposition. He said:

Endorsed by Mr. Mills.

"The grounds should unquestionably be bought by the city for the park system. No more beautiful site could be obtained, and the improvements made there at a great expense should not be lost after the close of the fair. I have had this purchase in mind for more than a year, and only recently called the plan to the attention of the stockholders. If the grounds were purchased for the city, the memorial building that is to be erected in honor of the first explorers of the northwest could be left there. The next legislature should be asked to grant the city authority either to increase its bonded indebtedness to a sufficient figure to make the purchase or else to add a small amount—a mill or fraction thereof—to the annual levy for a certain period."

Mr. Swigert's Opinion.

General Manager C. F. Swigert of the City & Suburban Railway company thought the only question one of finance. He said:

"The city cannot have too many parks, and no more beautiful spot could be found than the grounds of the Lewis and Clark fair. Then, too, all improvements have been made, and this expense would be saved the city. There might be a question as to the advisability of having the two chief parks in the same locality, but perhaps this is not a serious objection. The only question is one of finance, and if that problem can be solved the proposition is a good one."

O. F. Paxton Is in Favor.

President O. F. Paxton of the Portland Street Railway company agrees with the other men quoted. He said:

"The grounds of the Lewis and Clark fair are so beautiful that I should think there would be a strong sentiment in favor of acquiring them for the city. It would be a shame to waste all the valuable improvements made there merely because the fair was over. Miles of sewers, macadamized streets, shrubbery, landscape gardening, walks and drives, suitable buildings and flower gardens form the ideal equipment for a city park and are valuable almost for any other purpose. The city cannot have too many beautiful parks, and there certainly is no more inviting spot in the limits of the city to be acquired than these
