(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Oregon City, April 30.—H. H. Johnson, who leaves for the Spokane Indian reservation in a few days to make a survey, has constructed an instrument to take along with him that will greatly help in the work of surveying. The instrument is called a clinometer or slope instrument. It is also used for measuring and establishing the angle of a slope. There are many of these instruments in use and they are a great help to the surveyor as they are very accurate.

Mr. Johnson is the first one of the local surveyors to construct one although a number of the manufactured instruments are in use. The only drawback to Johnson's idea is that the material that it is made out of is very light and it might become broken easily.

Will Have to Buy of City.
It is the general opinion among the city authorities that before the Southern Pacific company puts up its new steel water tank it will have to purchase land from the city on which to erect it. At the last meeting of the council the matter was brought up and the committee on streets and public property was empowered to take the matter up with the railroad company. The company engineers were here a week ago and surveyed a location for the tank, but it will not be built before the city authorities have an opportunity to act.

"HOLY ROLLERS" LOSE A CONVERT

EDNA V. SEELY OF OREGON CITY CAUSES THE ARREST OF HER BROTHER—LATTERLY SOCIETIES DEBATE—RAILWAY TRAINERS' EXCUSATION.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Albany, Or., April 30.—Miss Urania Florence Seely, a girl 16 years old, was brought before County Judge H. M. Palmer yesterday afternoon on a warrant charging her with being from under the control of her natural protectors and in the hands of the Holy Rollers. She was arrested upon a petition filed by her sister, Edna V. Seely of Oregon City, who alleged that her sister was with the Holy Rollers, that she was being injured, and asked that the girl be placed under the care of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society.

The girl was given a hearing before the court and three gentlemen of Corvallis who were well versed in the operations of the Holy Rollers, testified to the fact that the life of the girl with the members of the sect could only result in the complete degradation of the child.

It was shown that the sect, since it was expelled from Benton county last winter, has taken up its quarters in Linn county, just across the river from Corvallis, and here the girl-wife of Crawford, the apostle, has surrounded herself with a bunch of young men and women, especially some silly girls, and almost naked, they lie about the floor for hours at a time, praying. There is no furniture in the shack occupied by the Holy Rollers, and the bare necessities are all that they provide for themselves.

Among them is Frank Hurt of Corvallis, who was formerly a clerk in a general furnishing goods house. He and his wife are among the fanatics, and it was with him that this girl was found by the Linn county officers. When brought in she was hatless, her hair hung down, uncombed and unconfined, and she acknowledged having destroyed her hair in response to a divine command. After the hearing of the case, the county judge committed the girls to the Boys' and Girls' Aid society and Sheriff Worth

Carleton was ordered to take her to Portland this morning, which he did, being accompanied by Miss Edna Seely, sister of the girl, and who was radiantly happy over the success of her efforts to snatch her young sister from the hands of the fanatical sect that has already blighted so many lives and homes in this section of the valley. Another sister, an older girl, is still with the Holy Rollers. Efforts will be made to have several of the leaders of the sect examined as to their sanity and committed to the insane asylum.

FRANK HURT IS FORCED TO FLEE

RELIGIOUS SECT PARADE STREETS BAREHEADED AND BAREFOOTED—WORKER WITH HAIR HANGING LOOSELY OVER SHOULDERS AND EYES TURNED HEAVENWARD.

Corvallis, Or., April 30.—A scene on Main street at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon caused considerable excitement as well as amusement. It was a chase by city officers around several blocks and down to the ferry, in pursuit of Holy Roller Frank Hurt, who in spite of good report and evil, still pins his faith to the roller religion.

Mr. Hurt and a number of females have for several days been parading about, the former with bare feet, pants, loons rolled up half way to the knee, and bareheaded; the females, with hair hanging loosely over their shoulders, eyes rolled heavenward and heads bare. After the recent exposure of Agostino Josh and his villainous practices, the appearance of the local followers in their new role has much the same effect on local residents as does the waving of a red flag in the face of a bovine.

Wearied by the sight, Chief Lane today decided to end the carrying on of Frank Hurt, and when the latter appeared on Main street the officers gave chase. Hurt dodged down back streets and reached the river, where his own boat carried him across to Linn county and to safety for the time being.

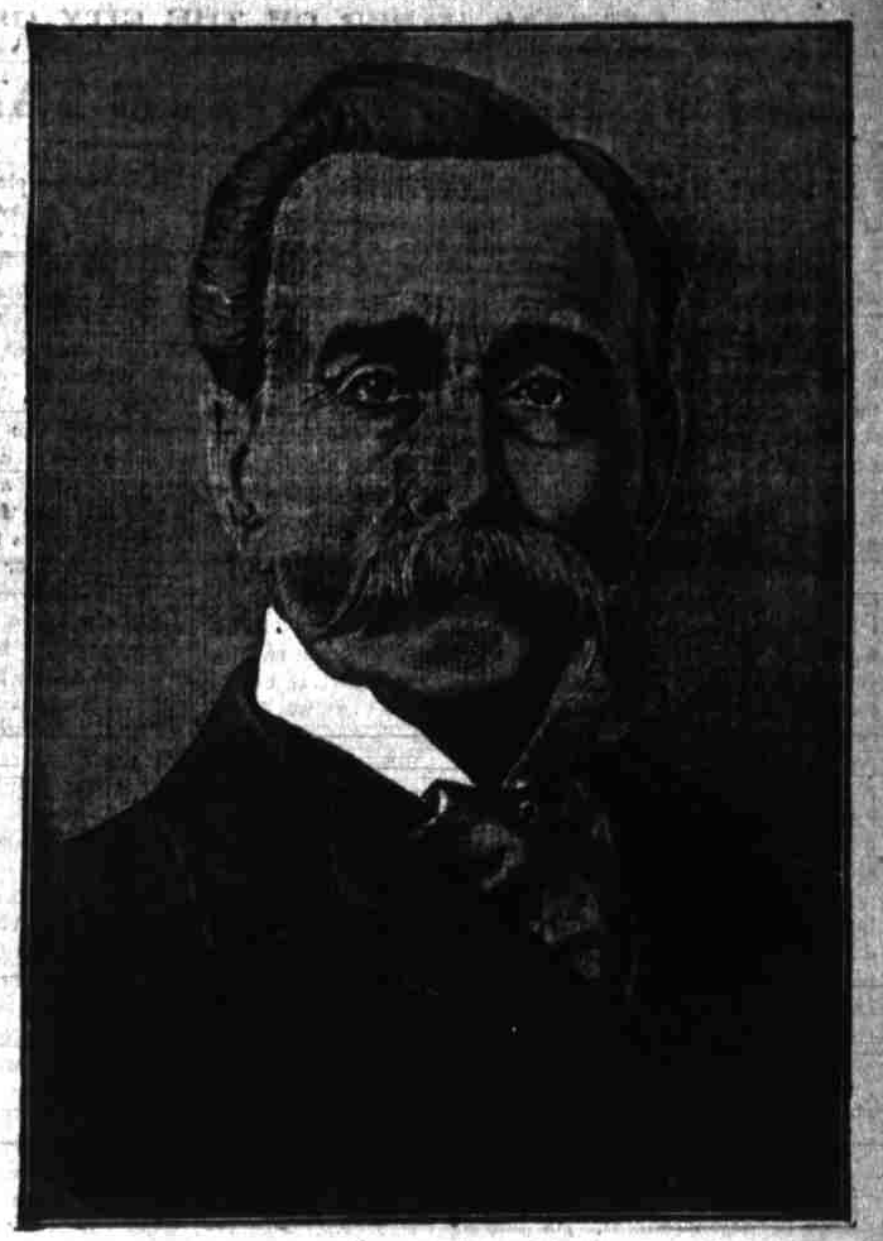

SUMPTER VALLEY RAILWAY EXTENDS

WORK TO BEGIN AS SOON AS SNOW IS OFF THE GROUND—AUSTIN AND PRINEVILLE CITIES TO HAVE RAILROAD—COMPANY BUILDS NEW ROLLING STOCK.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Baker City, April 29.—There is some activity in railroad circles with the opening of spring and just as soon as the snow is sufficiently off the ground and the roads in some kind of shape operations will begin by the Sumpter Valley Railroad company for the extension of its line from Whitney east and south towards Burns, the objective point in eastern central Oregon.

The Sumpter Valley is now in operation and has been for a number of years between Baker City and Sumpter, 33 miles, and for two years past the extension from Sumpter to Whitney, 14 miles, has been in operation, and last summer the further extension from Whitney to Tipton, eight miles, the top of the divide going down into the John Day valley, was partially finished before the snow came.

The work will now proceed on through Tipton, Austin and towards Prineville, Canyon City and Burns. Just how far the line will be built this year President Eckles is yet unable to state.

The steel is on hand for the Tipton extension and the market is easy for immediate delivery. Passenger and freight cars and locomotives were purchased last year in sufficient numbers to operate the entire line.

Besides this the company is building new refrigerator cars, cabooses and rebuilding locomotives. The distance from Tipton to Austin is seven miles and from Austin to Prineville 17 miles. The entire distance from Baker City by the proposed route to Burns is about 160 miles.
