Seattle, Wash., April 30. — Portland

really brilliant game, but his support

him to come near the winning line.  
Francis resumed his time-honored po-  
sition on his pedestal near third base and

play. If the ball came to him, good and  
well, he would stand; but he would not  
start himself in order to reach first.

SEATTLE'S WATER IS  
TO BE NO CHEAPER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Seattle, April 30.—Seattle's munici-  
pal water system is earning about a  
quarter of a million dollars annually  
more than is needed to pay running ex-  
penses and extensions of mains, but it  
is not likely that water rates will be  
noticeably reduced by the Republican  
council in power.

Daulton, a Democratic member of the  
city legislature, has introduced the water  
system and the condition of its finances  
and has presented a bill cutting a third  
off the prevailing rates, but it is meet-  
ing great opposition, as for political  
reasons the Republican members pre-  
ferred to father a popular measure. Ac-  
cording to estimates which have been  
prepared at the suggestion of these Re-  
publican members the huge surplus will  
be absorbed by big extensions of pipes  
and other expenditures not necessary  
at this time or extending over a period  
of years, and rates will remain virtually  
where they are.

HIS BLOOMIN' CHAIR  
BEGINS TO SPROUT

INSIST ON COUNTY  
REPAIRING ROAD

RIVERSIDE DRIVING ASSOCIATION  
WILL NOT SPRINKLE DRIVE UN-  
TIL REPAIRS ARE MADE—BRIGHT  
OUTLOOK FOR THE ANNUAL MEET  
ON JULY 2.

The Riverside Driving association  
held a meeting last evening in the  
rooms of the Rural Spirit, at which it  
was definitely decided that the associa-  
tion would not sprinkle the Riverside  
drive until the county should make  
the necessary repairs to the driveway.  
In the absence of President L. Zim-  
merman, Judge A. H. Tanner presided  
at the gathering, at which many of  
the city's well known reimen were  
present.

The prospects for the coming meet-  
ing to be held at Irvington on July 2, are  
of a rosy hue and the members of the  
association anticipate a successful speed  
trial. Several handsome cups have been  
offered for the events and the com-  
petition will be strong.

It is possible that, since the efforts  
of the club to have the Riverside drive  
improved, the members will turn their  
attention to the St. Helens road, which
