PITCHER MOORE ALLOWS ONE HIT

COLUMBIA'S CRACK TWINKLER HOLDS MULTNOMAH CLUBBERS DOWN TO ONE HIT AND THEY TALLY ONE RUN IN THE NINTH—TEAMS PLAY CLEVER BALL.

For eight innings of some of the fastest amateur baseball ever seen in this city, Pitcher Moore of the Columbia university team shut out the crack Multnomah Amateur Athletic club aggregation without a hit or a run. In the ninth, with one man down, Kenny Fenton negotiated the only hit allowed by Moore and scored by daring base running, assisted by Jennings and Harold. Pitcher Martin's wildness in the second, coupled with clever base stealing by Moore and Wilkerson, and Parrott's miff of a fly in right, allowed Columbia to score twice in the second. In the eighth, Glenn hit safe and stole second. Banks juggled Moore's chance, but caught Gleason at the plate when the latter attempted to score from second on the misplay. Moore took second on the play and scored on Hinkle's hit to left. Hinkle stole second and attempted to duplicate the trick to third, but was caught by Martin.

Columbia secured their fourth tally in the ninth, when, with two out, Alnslee muffed Jennings' fly and the left fielder scored on Fredell's two-bagger to left. Fredell stole third, and managed to get the run getting with a chance to Murphy.

The infield of both teams deserve especial mention for the clever manner in which they handled themselves. Chet Murphy accepted several difficult chances at third and his man at first, Fredell and Gleason and Banks and Fenton put up clever exhibitions around second.

In the outfield Wilkerson, Hinkle and Zan are deserving of special mention. The game was fast and snappy and kept the go at all stages, because the teams being inclined to wrangle over decisions of the umpire.
