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### PITCHER MOORE ALLOWS ONE HIT

COLUMBIA'S CHACK HOLDS MULTNOMAN CLUBMEN DOWN TO ONE BIT AND THEY TALLY ONE BUN IN THE NINTE-TEAMS PLAY CLEVER BALL.

For eight innings of some of the fastest amateur baseball ever seen in this city, Pitcher Moore of the Columbia university team shut out the crack Multnomah Amateur Athletic club aggregation without a hit or a run. In the ninth, with one man down, Kenny Fenton negotiated the only hit allowed by Moore and scored by daring base running, assisted by Jennings and Harold. Pitcher Martin's wildness in the second, coupled with clever base stealing by Moore and Wilkerson, and Parrott's must of a fly in right, allowed Columbia to score twice in the second. In the eighth Gleason hit safe and stole second. Banks juggled Moore's chance, but caught Gleason at the plate when the latter attempted to score from second on the misplay. 
