IRISH LAD WINS THE METROPOLITAN

FAVORITE, HIDDEN BY SHAW, RAN AWAY FROM BUNCH, AND WAS NEVER REARDED, WINNING BY TEN LENGTHS—GOING AT OTHER TRACKS.

Morris Park Track, New York, May 6.—Irish Lad won the Metropolitan handicap yesterday in an interesting race, in the presence of 35,000 spectators. Toboggan won second, being beaten by two lengths and Beldame finished third. The winner was a 2-4-1 favorite, but was backed down to 2-1. The bunch got away in good shape, Irish taking the lead in the first 90 yards, and never relinquishing it, all though Toboggan did his best to force into the first position. Shaw had his horse well in hand, however, and coming into the stretch urged Irish Lad to his limit, and the great horse won easily by two lengths.
The race was worth \$11,500 to the winner, \$2,000 second money, and \$1,000 went to the third horse.
Yesterday's handicap was the last Metropolitan to be run at Morris Park, as the Belmont's will have it transferred to Long Island track next season.

Five Vessels Leave Portland With 3,242,958 Feet of Lumber.
