

BEING THE EDGY OF THE BILL

REWARDING BUSINESS OF STATE-CANDIDATES FOR LEGISLATURE MUST BEGAIN THEMSELVES ODDS TO BENEFIT FROM KRUTSCHNITZ'S VISIT.

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Baker City, Or., May 9.—Mining men of eastern Oregon are beginning to search about and inquire into the record and predilections of the candidates for the state legislature on the Edgy bill.

A meeting today at Baker City was held to discuss the fact that they intended to support for the legislature a man who will vote for the repeal of the Edgy bill, believing that that law as it now stands is having the effect of retarding the mining business of the state and in some cases working absolute hardships.

Candidates for this district have not yet expressed their views on the subject, but will be required to do so soon. Eastern Oregon is to benefit from the visits of Julius Krutchnitz, director of transportation and maintenance of the Harriman line, to this state last week.

A representative of Mr. Krutchnitz, Democrat called upon Mr. Krutchnitz in Baker City just before he left for California Thursday after having spent several days visiting the main lines and branches in eastern Washington and parts of Idaho and Oregon.

He said that it was Mr. Krutchnitz's policy to develop the fullest extent possible on the part of the railroad company the wonderful resources of the inland Empire. The work begun by President Mohler will be carried on, additional new steel put in the main line and the roadbed ballasted and ties laid.

When winter came on. Some new bridge work will be undertaken and new branches will be built as fast as possible and others extended. Mr. Krutchnitz pointed out on a map places in Baker county where railroad improvement will probably be made in the near future.

This is Mr. Krutchnitz's first visit in detail to the northwest and he said he was coming again soon, that he might be familiar with the lines of the road here which he is endeavoring to operate in connection with the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific and Short Line. The improvements to be made upon the Southern Pacific Oregon lines will be very great and that road will have ample motive power and rolling stock for handling this business.

General Manager E. E. Calvin of the O. R. & N. said that it would be his effort to become thoroughly familiar with every inch of the road in eastern Oregon and carry out in detail the work of improvement as planned. He has promised to come to Baker City soon and spend several days in this vicinity. He proposes to become personally acquainted with the business men throughout eastern Oregon and will take up Baker county probably first of all.

With such men at the head of the transportation department whose work is supplemented by an efficient general superintendent, and with such men as Stubbs, Campbell, McCormick, Craig and Miller in the traffic department if Oregon does not progress it will be the fault of Oregon.

PLANTERS' COMPRESS CASE ON IN MEMPHIS

(Journal Special Service.) Memphis, Tenn., May 9.—The interstate commerce commission met in Memphis today for the purpose of continuing the hearing of the case of the Planters' Compress company, in which a number of the largest railroad corporations in the United States are the defendants. Included among the defendant roads are the Pennsylvania, Michigan Central, Southern Railway, Kansas & Texas, Missouri Pacific, Louisville & Nashville, Illinois Central, Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton, Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis, Yazoo & Mississippi Valley and Big Four.

The suit, between the time it was filed and originated in a demand of the compress company on the defendant railroads for a differential of 10 cents a bale in favor of the round bale as against the rectangular bale. The railroads, it is understood, recognized the demand of the compress company to the extent of making an allowance of 10 cents a bale, or the cost of compressing a rectangular bale, but a further reduction is insisted upon.

The outcome of the issues involved are awaited with much interest not solely because of the money directly involved but because of the rivalry existing between the round bale and the square bale compress companies.
