ILLINOIS FIGHT
WILL BE WARMREPUBLICAN BATTLE KINGS ON
GOVERNORSHIP-MARYLAND
REPUBLICANS HOLD CONVENTION-
ROOSEVELT FAVORED-CONGRES-
SIONAL NOMINATIONS.

Springfield, Ill., May 11.—The Illinois Republican convention here tomorrow will be the largest ever held in this state. There are plenty of indications that it will also be one of the liveliest. In addition to choosing delegates-at-large and alternates to the national convention, the convention this year is called upon to nominate candidates for governor and other state officers to be voted for this fall. The selection of delegates to the Chicago convention and the endorsement of President Roosevelt will be little more than a formality. All interest centers in the nominations for state offices. The city is alive today with candidates for the nominations. Their friends are also here in force.

For months the race for the gubernatorial nomination has been on in lively earnest and increasing in intensity as the convention date approached. Governor Yates early announced his candidacy for re-nomination. Backed by the state machine, he has stamped the state from Chicago to Chicago and has left nothing undone that would add to his strength. The governor will go into the convention with a good lead in the number of instructed delegates, though the number is considerably below that necessary to nominate.

The first candidate in the field against Governor Yates was Col. Frank O. Lowden of Chicago. Colonel Lowden is a son-in-law of the late George M. Pullman, the palace-car builder. During the last five or six years he has engaged actively in politics, but has never held public office. Colonel Lowden has brought all his guns to bear against the Republican state machine, and his campaign has been as active in all respects as has that of Governor Yates. The latter has been at odds more or less with the present national administration, and it was expected when Colonel Lowden entered the race for the governorship he would receive valuable support from Washington. Evidently, however, these expectations have not panned out very well, for the talk of federal patronage has failed to attract any great number to the Lowden camp, and, furthermore, Senators Cullom and Hopkins have declined to interfere in the contest.

Besides Yates and Lowden, the field of aspirants includes several others, each of whom must be considered in the running, especially in view of the possibility of a combination being made. These candidates are Attorney-General Hamlin, who has many friends in the Cullom-Hopkins camp; Lawrence Y. Sherman, a consummate politician and ex-speaker of the Illinois assembly; Col. Vesper, who has served many years in congress and has the united support of the "old soldier" vote, and Charles S. Deneen, who has long been prominent in Cook county politics. On the eve of the convention the chances appear to be unbiased observers to favor the re-nomination of Governor Yates. But Illinois politics has furnished many surprises in the past, and no one can say with certainty that tomorrow's balloting will not add another to the list.

MARYLAND REPUBLICANS.

Baltimore, May 11.—The Maryland Republican convention to choose delegates to the national convention at Chicago was opened today. The platform will endorse President Roosevelt's administration, and the delegates-at-large-Senator Louis E. McComas, Congressman William H. Jackson, Gen. Felix Agnus and Stevenson A. Williams will be instructed to vote for him.

JAPANESE AGENT
BUYS OREGON HORSES

Within the next few months the victorious Japanese troops may be mounted on Oregon horses, chasing Cosacks across Manchuria. An agent of the mikhado's government is said to be working among eastern Oregon ranchers selecting the best horses that are to be found in this state.

Dr. Armstrong, a well-known horseman of British Columbia, was recently awarded a contract by the Japanese minister of war to furnish the little brown troopers with 50,000 Oregon and Washington carcases. These mounts are to be delivered as quickly as possible. Dr. Armstrong is reported to be in the Dallas, while two of his agents are making purchases of horses in southeastern Oregon towns.

It is stated that Dr. Armstrong is anxious that his mission be not made public, as he fears an increase in the cost of carcases if the ranchers learn that the Japanese government was buying for Oregon horses. Dr. Armstrong looked over the ranges of British Columbia and Washington, but was able to find only a few animals that suited. Too many of the Washington horses are said to have the mange, while the animals that were born and bred in Oregon select the best horses that are suffering with many ills that placed them at once on the horse-draw.

During the past week Dr. Armstrong is said to have met a number of well-known Oregon horsemen in this city, and it is reported that several deals were made for the purchasing of animals. Dr. Armstrong did not state just how soon he expects to send the first shipment of horses to the flowery kingdom, but he is said to be of the opinion that it will be within a few weeks.
