EAGAN'S MIGHTY HIT MAKES LOCALS WEEP

WITH AN APPARENTLY SAFE MARGIN TO PORTLAND'S CREDIT, THE BOYS RAN THEMSELVES TO THE FINISH FOR A VICTORY IN THE TENTH.

Portland had the Tigers beaten yesterday for almost nine innings, but the Tacoma refused to stay beat, tying the score in the ninth and annexing two more in the first half of the tenth inning, winning a game that belonged to Portland, but which the locals failed to appreciate.
To Truck Eagan and Pitcher Thomas belong the credit of the victory, the former for his great batting, driving in four runs and scoring twice himself, the latter for his timely hit in the ninth that pushed Graham over the plate with the tying score, and for the splendid effort he displayed throughout the game, handicapped as he was by an adverse score from the second inning.
The luck in yesterday's game truly smiled upon the Browns, and were a little care exercised at several stages, the game would have not gone by the boards.
Druhot started the game and was properly taken out of the box in the fifth inning, after issuing a pass and then throwing the ball over the second baseman's head on an easy chance. From the very start Druhot was in tight places, having the bases filled five times in four innings, and finally every time save in the third inning, when his own poor throw to Steelman was the cause for three runs to tally.
Thielman was called to the rescue in the fifth, and although two men were on the circuit and no one out, the wary Jake retired the side without any runs. The bleachers and a number of women in the grand stand blessed when Druhot was taken out, and to help matters along, Druhot, just like a spoiled youngster, started for the clubhouse, walking in full view of the crowd. Druhot's silly action could not be construed in any other way than that he was making a grand stand play for sympathy. As he passed the bleachers he addressed several remarks to the crowd that were entirely uncalled for.
It seems to be a pretty state of affairs if a manager can't remove a pitcher or any other player when his judgment dictates. Manager Ely's action yesterday was proper. It was good baseball. Had he left Druhot in, and that youngster had allowed a few more runs, Ely would have been censured for not taking him out. In this respect, Manager Ely says:
"I took Druhot out because he was wild. As he helped present Tacoma with three runs, thus leaving us with a lead of but two, after passing a man and throwing over second on the next play, there was nothing to do but try another pitcher. Although the game was lost later, my judgment at that critical moment was correct, and I'd do the same thing again today if the conditions warranted it. What is the use of having pitchers if they are not to do as ordered, and to turn in and assist each other to win games? They should work for the same end—namely, the success of their own team."
The game as a whole was an interesting contest. There were plenty of errors, and the batting made things lively. The crowd was on the anxious seat many times. Portland's opportunities were many, but advantage was not taken of them. Castro's trick of hiding the ball and tagging out McLaughlin, who modestly was taking a lead for

third, provoked much laughter. The score tells the story very well.
Now the Runs Came.
Castro led off in the second with a double to left, which was followed by Nordyke's error. McCredie's long fly to Hannivan, a triple by Steelman, a pass to Druhot, Drennan's single and Spencer's triple, netting five runs for the locals.
Like Francis started trouble for Druhot when he winged Casey's chance to the bleachers. Hannivan hit for two sacks and after Nordyke went out Eagan walked, filling the bags. Lynch bunted to Druhot, and that worthy threw badly to Steelman and Casey scored. McLaughlin popped a fly to Spencer. Graham pushed a hit past Francis, scoring Hannivan and Eagan. That was all for the Tigers until the eighth.
Portland got two more over in the fifth on hits by Beck, McCredie and Francis.
With three men on bases in the eighth, Truck Eagan hit to left for two bases, scoring three runs. In the ninth, with Portland still one to the good, McLaughlin led off with a double to right. Castro put the ball under his arm and caught McLaughlin off the second bag. With two strikes on Graham, it looked like peaches and cream for the locals, but Thielman put one over the plate and the Tiger captain hit safely. Hogan sacrificed him to second and Thomas hit safely, scoring the captain and tying up the proceedings.
Beck dropped Spencer's throw in the tenth, allowing Hannivan's life. Nordyke struck out. Eagan hit one to the scoreboard for three bases and one run was in. Then Lynch singled and the slugger scored. McLaughlin and Graham each hit safely, filling the bags. Hogan gave Castro a chance for a triple play, but as one man was out, the Browns' star shortstop tossed the ball to Francis, retiring the side.
The Browns started their half of the tenth in a business-like way. Murphy took McCredie's place when Mac sprained his ankle, and led off with a hit. Francis followed out and Steelman walked, filling the bases, with no one out. Thielman struck out and Casey made a sensational stop of Drennan's drive, and started a double play which put the locals out of the running.

CASTRO HAD CHANCE FOR A TRIPLE PLAY

In the tenth inning of yesterday's game Louis Castro had an opportunity to make a triple play unassisted. With Graham, McLaughlin, and Lynch on first, second and third bases, Hogan drove a line drive which Castro grabbed with one hand. The catch retired Hogan and had it been necessary the Browns' shortstop could have easily touched McLaughlin and walked to third bag and retired Lynch, who had almost reached the plate. There being one man out, Castro tossed the ball to Francis, retiring Lynch, and completing a double play.
The chance for an unassisted triple play recalls the feat performed by Harry O'Hagen, of the Rochester team, in a game with Newark, when he retired three men unassisted. A peculiar coincidence is the fact that Jake Thielman pitched the game for Rochester in which O'Hagen's stunt was performed. There were men on first and second when O'Hagen, who covers the initial cushion, scooped an attempt at a sacrifice, and touching first, saw that no one was covering second, and he ran to the middle station, beating the base runner to the bag, and had completed the most authentic unassisted triple play on record.
Castro's chance yesterday was much easier of accomplishment, for he would not have had to run at all.

Oregon City, May 13.—Next Sunday afternoon the eighth battery ball toss-

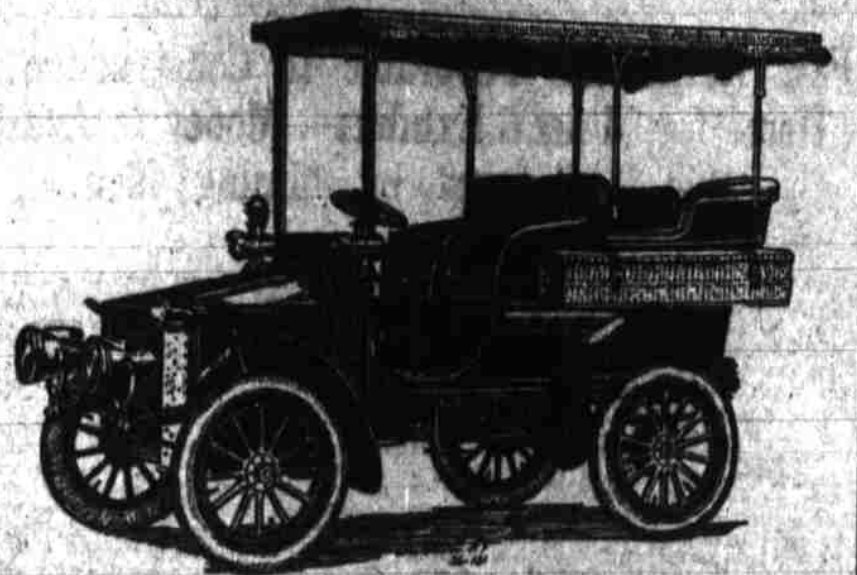

OREGON TRACK MEN ROUNDING TO FORM

TRAINER KATWARD AND HIS MEN OFF FOR FOREST GROVE TO MEET THE ATHLETES OF PACIFIC UNIVERSITY—THE TEAM IS IN GOOD FORM.

Eugene, Or., May 13.—The University of Oregon track team has rounded into good form under the direction of Trainer Katward, and will leave today for its first meet of the season on Saturday with Pacific university at Forest Grove. The members of the team have not yet been announced, but 14 men will be taken, including the trainer and manager.
The team is much stronger than is commonly supposed, and will give a good account of itself in Saturday's meet. The absence of McKinney will weaken the chances in the weight events some, but Hugg and Frisell are both showing up well. In Swift the team has one of the strongest mile runners it ever had. Many believe that he is as good as Foley, who holds the state record for the mile run. Moore, the freshman sprinter, is doing good work in the dashes, and the university may not appear so weak in those events as reported. In the pole vault and jumps the team is woefully weak.
