

DEMOCRATS ARE LOADING CANNON

COUNTY CAMPAIGN BEGINS NEXT TUESDAY WITH A ROUSING MEETING AT MOLLA. ELABORATE PREPARATIONS FOR DEBATE AT BAPTIST CHURCH.

Oregon City, Or., May 13.—The Democrats will commence their county campaign next Tuesday with a rousing meeting at Molalla at 1:30 in the afternoon. The Molalla Democrats are the largest club of that town have the meeting in charge, and they are loading up their Jefferson cannon, and the boom that will issue from its throat will be heard all over the county. The Democrats are hopeful of placing a number of men in the courthouse this time, and they are leaving no stone unturned to accomplish this result.

At the meeting in Molalla will be heard the orator of the Democratic party in this county, besides some of the candidates. J. E. Hedges, joint candidate for state representative between Multnomah and Clackamas counties, will come with words of cheer to his fellow party men.

Other warhorses will be J. J. Cook, who was twice elected to the position of sheriff on the Democratic ticket by one of the largest majorities ever registered for a candidate in Clackamas county; J. E. Jack, who was Cook's deputy; O. D. Eby, Democratic central committee chairman, and R. A. Miller, who needs no introduction to the people.

The next place that the Democrats will take by storm is Marquam, and they will hold their meeting at that place on the 18th at 7:30. The other places where meetings will be held are N. E. on the 19th, Manzanita on the 20th, and the week will wind up with a rousing meeting of the Democratic hosts at Canby.

High-Class Entertainment.

Elaborate preparations are being made for Mrs. Edwards' recital at the Baptist church, Saturday evening, May 14, 1904. Mrs. Edwards gave the same program at the White Temple, Portland, to a large audience on April 25, and has been invited to repeat it in Oregon City. A special car will bring down from Portland, and will put on the living pictures of the civil war in full uniform and regulation camp style. Decoration day is near at hand, and for that reason the main part of the program will be patriotic.

Special features of the evening will be the tableaux and pantomime by popular young ladies of Oregon City, and a double attraction by pretty robes and colored lights.

Death of Alfred Bissell.
Alfred Bissell, aged 30 years, and a veteran of the Mexican and civil wars, died here yesterday morning at the home of his son-in-law, W. M. Shank, after a long illness. Mr. Bissell was a delegate from Illinois to the convention which first nominated Lincoln for the presidency. He was a personal acquaintance and friend of the martyred president. He built the first flour mill in Santa Fe, N. M., where grinding of grain had been done with the stone implements made by the Indians.

Arrested for Creating Disturbance.
Thirteen youngsters were arrested by Night Officers Shaw and Noblitt for disturbing the slumbers of F. M. Naught, who was sleeping in a house near the armory, where the Tinsmith-Smith wrestling match was being held. The boys arrested were: Ira Thornton, W. Valouco, C. E. McGeehan, Ora Boylan, John Ropell, E. Smith, Fred Ropell, E. Fosberg, Bailey Hill, Harry Siler, Jake Thurber, H. Glueck, and Due Woodruff. They were arraigned before Recorder Curry yesterday morning and pleaded not guilty.

While the wrestling match was in progress these thirteen youngsters, yet still wishing to see the sport, climbed up on the roof of the Quong Lee clubhouse, where the Chinamen are in the habit of drying their laundry. This point affords a good view of the armory floor through the windows. Naught says that he warned the boys that they would have to be quiet, and that their refusal to do so prompted him to call an officer. The boys claim that they did not make a disturbance, and that the Chinamen gave them permission to go up on the roof. The plaintiff says that they were on the roof for five days, and the next house to the home of the Chinamen, and that a terrific din was kept up, and as he goes to bed early to get up at 3 o'clock, he stopped the noise by calling an officer.

When the boys were arraigned before the recorder yesterday afternoon they presented a funny spectacle. Howard Brownell, who was their attorney, made them stand in line and as many of their admiring friends came along to see the trial the room was full of street urchins. While they were waiting three hoboes were haled before the court and fined \$10 or five days in jail. As they did not have the money they will clean the city next morning for five days. This looked serious to the boys and their fun of last night did not seem such a good joke.

Billy Hill was the first boy tried and he was found guilty and fined \$4. Ora Boylan was fined the same amount. Harry Siler, John and Fred Ropell and R. Fosberg were tried yesterday afternoon and their case will be decided tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. C. McGeehan, E. Smith and Due Woodruff were tried on the same charge as the other boys at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

These boys who are on trial form a gang in the south end of town and their arrest will tend to break it up and render that part of the town more tranquil. On complaint of Elizabeth Minns yesterday C. W. Todd and O. L. Turner were brought before the city recorder this morning and fined \$10 each for camping within the city limits and allowing horses to run at large. The men are horse traders and their horses ran loose and destroyed some of Mrs. Minns' garden. They will move their camping places to some spot outside the city limits.

Pioneers Honored.

On May 20 in Willamette hall between the hours of 2 and 5 the Women's Lewis and Clark club will give a reception to the Clackamas county pioneers and to those who were instrumental in building up the county in the early days. The county pioneers have never been honored in this manner before and the ladies who form the club think this little endeavor to show the esteem in which the pioneers are held.

Invitations are being sent out all over the county but as some who are pioneers may escape the notice of the invitation committee it must be understood that all who came to Oregon prior to February 14, 1859, are considered pioneers. The afternoon will be spent in banqueting the pioneers and providing for their entertainment. It is probable that some of the early settlers will be called on for speeches and stories. The ladies are bent on making the reception a success and there is every indication of their labors being rewarded as they desire.
