and was a sister of Mrs. E. W. Pickering, and had some grandchildren, all living in Portland; besides other nephews and nieces in Pasadena and Los Angeles.

Positive assurance was given by friends of the family this morning that the interment and funeral will take place in this city, and that the remains will be laid at rest beside those of her husband in Riverside cemetery. It is likely the body will be shipped north tonight from Pasadena.

Left Vast Fortune.
As to the disposal of Mrs. Reed's fortune, which has been appraised at \$1,000,000, and which is in reality worth much more than that, no clear statement could be made; but one of the friends of the family said there was little doubt but that an oft-expressed intention of Mr. and Mrs. Reed would be carried out, which intention was to liberally remember public institutions in Portland, after certain legacies had been paid to immediate relatives. The estate, consisting of much valuable property, is chiefly in Portland and the northwest.

In speaking of the death of Mrs. Reed, Rev. Dr. T. L. Elliot, for many years her pastor in the Unitarian church, said: "She was one of the most noble women I ever knew. One of her chief missions in life seemed to be to do good, and to think of others. Her gifts to the work of benevolence and charity could be placed in no special class, because she would willingly and ready to help every worthy purpose."

"I was unexpectedly shocked by the message telling of her death. She was truly a grand and noble woman," said Cyrus Dolph, the attorney, said. "Although I had known that Mrs. Reed was ailing, I had no idea that her condition was so serious, and was greatly shocked by the news of her death last night. In fact, only today I opened a letter from her nephew, telling me that on the day he reached her bedside, there was a turn apparently for the better, and he thought she was going to recover."

"She was a grand, good woman, and her death is a blow to every old-time resident of Portland."

DENVER'S ELECTION MAY GROW TURBULENT

Denver, Col., May 17.—Intense interest is manifested in the city election, which is being held here today, and is the first under the new charter. Predictions of bloodshed are made, especially for the lower wards.

The election, for the selection of county and city officers for a term of four years. During that period many valuable public franchises will come up for renewal. Republican leaders are accusing Governor Peabody of treachery to his party in his refusal to call out the militia to prevent trouble. The Democrats control the police and the political machine.

In the lower wards everything up to noon was quiet, but several small riots have taken place in the residence wards where the Republican judges were thrown out of the polling places. Betting is 2 to 1 on the Democratic ticket, which is headed by Robert W. Speer. He will probably be elected. The weather is fine and a heavy vote is being polled.

LIGHTHOUSE TENDER WILL PROBABLY BE LIFTED TODAY—SEEK WILL BE ON DOCK 24 HOURS—SURE JOB TO BE DONE—DIGGING DEEPER CHANNEL.

For the Port of Portland commission this is a busy day. In the afternoon the lighthouse tender Columbia will be taken on the drydock at St. Johns. The vessel arrived in port last night from the mouth of the river, and docked at the foot of Couch street. About noon she left down the river for St. Johns, and it is planned to place her on the dock this afternoon. It is believed the tender will not be on the dock longer than 24 hours.

The pontoons are now properly ballasted, and there is charge of the dock say that everything will work perfectly. As is necessary with all new structures of this character, a great deal of experimenting has to be done on the start. Superintendent McIntosh has put in the greater part of his time of late in ascertaining the amount of ballast which each of the pontoons will require in order to submerge them to the proper depth, and it is announced that his efforts have been entirely successful. Whenever the dock is not in use Engineer Lockwood has advised the Port of Portland commission to keep the pontoons submerged the greater part of the time. After becoming thoroughly water-soaked he explained that so much rock ballast would not then be required in order to sink them to any depth needed.

In addition to docking the Columbia the Port of Portland commission began this morning the work of cutting out a deeper and wider channel from the harbor to Swan island, which is situated just below the mouth of the Willamette river. The big dredge is doing the work. It is estimated that it will take her about two months to complete the job. The channel will be made 30 feet deep at low water, and 200 feet wide.

NICOMEDIA NOW DUE.

Oriental-Liner Expected at Mouth of Columbia Today or Tomorrow.

Today or tomorrow the oriental liner Nicomedia is expected at the mouth of the Columbia. She sailed from Yokohama for Portland on May 20, and the passage was usually made by the Indra freighters in 17 days. As the Nicomedia is new to the route, it is thought probable that she may not make as fast a passage on her first run across the Pacific as she will be able to do later on.

The Nicomedia is bringing a full cargo of freight from the far east, but it is stated to be very likely that she will be forced to go out rather light. So far very few applications for wheat or flour space have been received, as compared with the orders sent in advance on previous occasions when an oriental liner was about due. It is said by those who are in a position to know that the Nicomedia will make out more than about 2,000 tons all told, and the major portion of the shipment will be made up of general freight.

All along the coast, however, the same condition exists. Scarcely any wheat and flour is being sent to Japan and China, the war being assigned as the reason. All the liners from the sound and San Francisco are going out light. In some instances the steamers have not taken out enough freight to ballast them evenly.

LUMBER VESSEL CHARTERED.

British Bark Inca Engaged to Take Cargo at Thirty-Night Shillings.

Lumber vessels still appear to be very much in demand. The British bark Inca was chartered this morning by the Pacific Export Lumber company to load lumber at Portland for Shanghai, China. The rate is not made public, but it is supposed to be in the neighborhood of 38c. That is the rate which has been paid of late for business of that character.

The Inca sailed on April 11 from New-castle-on-Tyne for Honolulu with a cargo of coal and is expected to reach here June 15.

GENERAL FEDERATION OFFERS BUREAU HELD—MRS. ROBERT BURDETTE A CANDIDATE FOR THE PRESIDENCY.

St. Louis, May 17.—The Odeon theatre never held a larger audience than that of this afternoon on the occasion of the formal opening of the biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. The rollcall showed the convention to be the largest in point of numbers ever held by the federation.

It was a case of "ladies first" with Mayor Wells and President Francis of the exposition. A half dozen conventions opened in St. Louis today, and the two officials were supposed to deliver welcoming remarks to a great crowd of them. In order that both officials might be on hand to welcome the fair visitors to the biennial, they canceled all conflicting engagements.

After several selections of music the convention was opened with an invocation by Mrs. Caroline Bartlett Crane of Michigan. In addition to the greetings on behalf of the city and the exposition there were addresses of welcome by Mrs. Philip N. Moore, president of the Missouri state federation, and Mrs. W. E. Fischer, representing the federated clubs of St. Louis. The response was made by Mrs. D. T. Denison, president of the general federation. These formalities and the appointment of committees occupied the time until adjournment.

Tomorrow morning will be devoted to routine business connected with the affairs of the federation. In the afternoon there will be an educational session. The speakers and their subjects are: Mrs. Frank L. Wean of Illinois, "Compulsory Educational Laws and Their Enforcement"; Miss Daisy Spickard of Nebraska, "Character-Building in Public Education Indirectly by Means of Literature and History"; Mrs. Jonathan F. S. Mitchell of Washington, "Character-Building in Education Directly by Required Instruction, as in France"; Miss C. E. Bush of Connecticut, "A National Aspect of Public Education"; and Mrs. Mary A. Bacon of Georgia, "A National Aspect of Public Education."

Tomorrow evening will be devoted to a discussion of "Child Labor," with reports from various parts of the country, and an address by Edgar G. Murphy on "Child Labor in America."

Mrs. Denison of New York, the present head of the federation, has declined to be her own successor as president. Her withdrawal leaves the contest between Mrs. Sarah Platt-Decker of Colorado and Mrs. Robert J. Burdette of California. Whether the contest will be evenly divided between the two, it is not improbable that a "dark horse" may be brought into the race with good chances of success.

FOR PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 17.—Arrangements are practically completed for the meeting of the 116th Presbyterian general assembly, which will begin here Thursday morning. The 600 commissioners from 239 presbyteries and 22 synods in all parts of the world and many are arriving already from China, India, Japan, Korea, Siam, Africa, Mexico and South America, as well as from some of the remote parts of the United States. The most important item to come before the assembly this year is the question of amalgamating with the Cumberland Presbyterian church and the Reformed Presbyterian church. Both bodies left the parent organization many years ago, owing to disputed points in government and doctrine. At the present time the members of the protesting bodies can and will conform to the present doctrine of the older and larger church and that a reunion is possible.

The two ministers who are most prominently spoken of for moderator are the Rev. Dr. J. Addison Henry, pastor of the Princeton church, Philadelphia, and Rev. Dr. James D. Moffat, president of Washington and Jefferson college.
