MANAGER DUGDALE IS IN COMMAND

FORMER SEATTLE NATIONAL ARMYER THIS MORNING AND ASSUMES CONTROL OF PORTLAND BROWNS—WILL NOT MAKE ANY RADICAL CHANGES.

D. E. Dugdale, formerly of the Seattle Pacific National league baseball team, arrived in this city this morning and reported to President Ely at once. After a short chat the new manager started for the ball park to meet the players, but found only six on the grounds. The fact that the entire team did not report was a surprise to Mr. Dugdale, and those who were tardy will be notified this afternoon that hereafter every man must report at the park at 10 o'clock, otherwise there will be something doing.

This afternoon Butler will pitch the first game under the new regime and Shea will receive his offerings. Regarding his coming and probable changes on the team, Mr. Dugdale says: "I am glad to be here in Portland, especially in my present capacity, and will strive earnestly to produce a winning aggregation. I do not intend to make any changes until I see how the team works. I think that five or six games will be sufficient to enable me to get a line on the defects of the team. If I find any trouble that cannot be remedied by talking with the players and advising them, I shall proceed at once to replace them with new men."

Mr. Dugdale looks the picture of health and rotundity and he wore a smile over his broad face this morning that betokened hard work and earnest endeavor. In his new position as manager of the Browns The Journal today wishes him success.

COUNCILMEN ROW OVER AUTO SPEED

MERRILL AND ZIMMERMAN ENGAGE IN HEATING ARGUMENT OVER PROPOSED NEW ORDINANCE—LATTER SAYS AUTOMOBILISTS WILL BE TAXED.

Council routine was rudely broken yesterday when the ordinance came up providing that automobilists should not exceed a speed of eight miles an hour in the city. After the reading of the ordinance, Councilman Merrill said: "I move that the ordinance be amended so that 12 miles an hour be the speed limit. There are not more than three autos in the city that can go at the rate of six miles an hour, and the ordinance would not be enforced. I want to see the ordinance passed today, and in order that it may be effective, I move that 12 miles an hour be substituted as the speed limit. Machines in the city would have to travel on the boulevard and there would be nothing to stop them from exceeding the ordinance, and that would be almost impossible."

"We might as well make it 20 miles an hour as 12," said Councilman Zimmerman in reply. "Yes, or 50 miles, if they will violate it anyway. I am opposed to the amendment, and the owners of automobiles ought to be thankful that they are allowed on the streets at all."

Moosebats in the Way. "In a few years, Zimmerman and the rest of the old moosebats will have died off and then we will begin to get progress," remarked Mr. Zimmerman. "You will be taxed like a dog if you use the streets," concluded Zimmerman savagely.

Aside from the tilt between Zimmerman and Merrill, the meeting of the council was uneventful, nothing but regular routine business being considered. Engineer Elliott was instructed to prepare plans for the rebuilding and repairing the Tanner street sewer according to the recommendations of the sewer committee.

Taxed Like Dogs. "And there will be a little matter of license attached to this automobile business," remarked Mr. Zimmerman. "You will be taxed like a dog if you use the streets," concluded Zimmerman savagely.
