

JUDGE RICHARDS MAY BE NOMINEE

PROMINENT LAWYER AND MINING
MAN OF IDAHO SAYS HE WILL AC-
CEPT NOMINATION FOR GOVERN-
OR—HAS HAD ACTIVE POLITICAL
CAREER.

Judge J. H. Richards of Boise City, president of the American mining congress, and one of the leading lawyers of Idaho, is now in Portland in the interests of the annual meeting of the congress to be held here next August. Mr. Richards is one of the leaders of the Republican party in Idaho and has several times refused the nomination for governor of that commonwealth. This year he faces the same offer, which he will not refuse.

"If the Republicans of my state want me to run for governor, I will not tell them to 'get behind me,'" said Mr. Richards this morning. "But I will not ask them for this honor. Many of the party leaders have already asked me if I would be their standard bearer this year. I told them that if the Republicans of Idaho wished to nominate me that I would not refuse the honor."

"Since 1892 I have taken an active part in every campaign, and more than once have traveled thousands of miles during a hot campaign in the interests of the Republican party."

It is said that Judge Richards has the support of the rank and file of the Republicans of his state.

J. H. SELLER DIES IN SAN FRANCISCO

Fred Seller of this city has received a telegram from San Francisco stating that his uncle, J. H. Seller, died in that city last Saturday.

Mr. Seller was a member of the firm of Seller Bros. & Co. of San Francisco. He was identified with the early history of Portland and enjoyed an extensive acquaintance here. The deceased was 79 years of age and was a brother of Moses Seller.

FLOOD IS COMING FROM MOUNTAINS

WILLAMETTE AND COLUMBIA WILL
SOON BE SWELLED BY AV-
LANCHES OF WATERS NOW FORM-
ING FROM MELTING SNOWS—
MAY SOON FLOOD LOWER CITY.

Far back in the mountains, to the east and north, the snows have begun to melt, and the elements are preparing for a great flood of the Columbia and Willamette rivers, the crest of which will reach this point early in June, according to the local weather office. The river will rise rapidly during the week, as a result of the rains in the mountains and the melting of the snow. It is predicted that it will reach a stage of 18.7 feet tomorrow, and will probably be 22 feet on Saturday. By the end of the week it is feared that the city in the lower sections of the city will be flooded. The water does not flood the streets until a stage of 26 feet has been reached. Through seepage, however, the cellars will be flooded in the districts north of Yamhill and Sixth streets.

MANILA TERRIFIED BY BUBONIC PLAGUE

LOCAL OPTION CHAMPIONS MEET

MEN AND WOMEN IN FAVOR OF
TROTTERING SALOONS GATHERED
AT METHODIST CHURCH—W. W.
COTTON, R. L. PAGET AND A. F.
FLEISCHER MAKE SPEECHES.

Two local option rallies were held last evening at the Taylor-Street Methodist church, one in the main auditorium, for men, and the other in the lecture room, for women. The speakers at the men's meeting were Rev. F. Burgette Short, who also had charge of the meeting; W. W. Cotton, and R. L. Page. Dr. Short was the first speaker. He said that everyone should understand the meaning of the word liberty. In its purest and holiest sense, "Our wives, sisters, mothers, and sweethearts are powerless to vote for local option, but you cannot make it a labor of love to see that every man's rights are protected," he said.

W. W. Cotton said that he was not a prohibitionist, and that he did not believe that law would prohibit the sale of liquor in any large community. "I don't claim that all the vice in the world is attributed to drink," said the speaker. "There are some good men who are liquor sellers. We, however, have a condition of things in this city which for its good name and from the standpoint of morality ought to cease. Liquor licenses are easy to obtain. Believe in giving the people the power to have a little self-government of their own. The closer the government gets to the people, the better government we have. You can see that I am strongly in favor of the local option law."

Dangers of Young Women.
"In the large cities of the north, and particularly in a city like Portland, girls and young women have to work for a living. They have to be on the streets passing to and from their work, and someone invites them into a restaurant. Then a cocktail is ordered. Finally there comes a time when the dinner must be paid for, and the woman sells her honor. The man I have referred to in the restaurant is a coyote, but I cannot think of an animal low enough to describe the man who owns that saloon or restaurant and who permits all this sort of thing to be done. Local option would change all this."

Prohibition in Texas.

R. Lee Paget read the following from the Oregonian:
The adoption of local option in Multnomah county would result as follows: The city and county would lose \$140,000 revenue every year.
One-quarter of the buildings in the business district would be vacant.
About 4,000 men would be thrown out of employment.
The expenses of maintaining the city government would be as much as there would be enough revenues to pay it.

Taxes would be so high that no one could afford to own property.
He then read as a reply to these assertions the following telegram, which was sent voluntarily from Sheriff Lovings and the celebrated politician "Cy-clops" Davis:
"Sulphur Springs and Hopkins county prospering under prohibition. No vacant business houses in city; crime greatly decreased; real estate greatly increased in value. Moral sentiment and sobriety much better than ever before. Prohibition will prohibit."

An Ambiguous Outcry.

Mr. Paget referred to the Oregonian's report of the proceedings before the city council license committee, from which the average reader would conclude, he said, that the large body of representatives of the saloon at that time protested vigorously against the saloon boxes, were not worthy of much consideration, because the entire delegation consisted of ministers, women and prohibitionists, and view of the broad views just expressed by Mr. Cotton, he had also been the principal speaker on that occasion, he said he had been much puzzled under which of these headings that paper would classify Mr. Cotton. Continuing, he said:
"Last Sunday morning I observed an almost unprecedented event in the city of Portland. Incredible as it may seem, it remains a fact, that I saw a closed saloon. On closer examination I discovered that the cause was explained by a piece of white crepe on the door, the reason for which you will readily apprehend, but in the evening the doors were wide open, the presumption being that the funeral was over, and a brisk business was being done in direct violation of public decency."

Practical Method Needed.

"The local option law is not unfair, as claimed; but if it were, I believe it would be justified. I consider that we are trying to regulate the saloon business, which desecrates the Sabbath, ignores the law, and tramples upon the public conscience.
"Temperance lectures are not half so much needed as a practical method to regulate the saloon evil, and we believe that such a remedy is presented in this measure."

"It is marvelous that the Oregonian should allow itself to be lined up with the evil forces that are opposing this measure. On April 30 that paper published a long editorial, composed mainly of misapprehension and untruth, relative to the law; on May 11 it retracted it almost entirely, with the humiliating excuse and apology that no copy of the law was before the editor when it was written. But this was too late, as the waves of error then started are still in motion and will not cease before election day."

Women Greatest Sufferers.
Mrs. F. Burgette Short presided at the women's meeting. She said: "The evils of intemperance fall upon both men and women, and in a large sense it is true that women are the greater sufferers, therefore we are, or should at least be interested in the enactment of such laws as will protect our possible sufferings. There are two necessary factors in achieving reform under our form of government. They are agitation and voting. We, as women cannot vote, but we can agitate. There is a little sphere in which each of us can do our part, and these are the days we should put into practice the part we play in helping to bring local option to Portland."

Holds Christians Responsible.
Miss Abbie McElroy, secretary of the Y. W. C. A., urged women of Portland to work toward abolishing saloons. She said that she held Christians of Portland responsible for the conditions which exist in this city. She illustrated her points by giving personal reminiscences of her experience with rescue work. A. F. Fleischel came from the rescue meeting to urge the women to work hard to insure the passage of the local option law. "There should be a vice-president appointed for every ward," he said, "and a committee with a chairman for every district. Then you should all work, not with Christian people, whom you know will vote for local option, but with those who are indifferent about it. This local option law will fail to pass unless you pass it. The week before election, these committees should make a house to house canvass of every

precinct in the city, and when election day comes there should be at least five women on duty at every polling place in Portland, asking the voters to cast their votes for this law."

DEFENDS LOCAL OPTION.

Prof. R. W. Kelsey Refutes Attacks That Have Been Made on Measure.

Before one of the largest congregations ever gathered in the Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal church, Prof. R. W. Kelsey, formerly a member of the faculty of the Pacific college at Newberg, but now touring the state in the interests of the local option bill, last night delivered a stirring address on the merits of the proposed law, and refuted the many attacks that have been made upon the measure.

"If there is anything that can defeat the local option bill, it is the local option bill," said the speaker. "Large numbers of people, having no one to come before them and refute the lies published at the instigation of the saloonkeepers, will probably vote against the bill, believing that what has been published is the truth. The fact that the saloon element and all its kindred allies line up against the bill ought in itself to be sufficient to commend to respectable people that it would be a good thing to promote decency and order."

The rally was held in celebration of the fifteenth anniversary of the Epworth league. In addition to the local option address, Professor Kelsey gave a reading, and Miss Grace Hickok a recitation.

DEDICATE NEW TABERNACLE.

Appropriate Ceremonies of Central Christian Church Yesterday.

With impressive ceremonies the new tabernacle of Central Christian church, at East Twentieth and Salmon streets, was dedicated yesterday afternoon. Rev. J. F. Gormley having charge of the service, the speaking of the program was by the church, he stated that the membership had now passed the 100 mark, and that the Sunday school has an enrollment of 150. Both are still growing in membership. The present edifice is only temporary, as a building fund has been started, and in about two or three years the congregation expects to erect a handsome structure at a cost of about \$20,000.

Rev. E. B. Muckley, pastor of the First Christian church, of which Dr. Gormley was pastor for a number of years, and Rev. Albion Eason, of Rodney avenue church, were present and expressed the good wishes of their respective congregations. Dr. Dale, W. L. and J. H. and Judge Selbreid made short addresses, and the choir furnished appropriate music.

EXCOMMUNICATES LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

Dr. Ray Palmer Scores Saloon Element in Scathing Language.

Dr. Ray Palmer preached last evening at the White Temple on "Mankind Crucified at the Bar of the Open Saloon." The speaker drew a comparison between the crucifixion of Christ and the present day crucifixion of man at the hands of the liquor traffic. He denounced all who are in any way connected with the liquor traffic and pitilessly attacked the property owner who rents his building for saloon or gambling purposes, while perhaps posing as a saint before the altar of God.
"The legalized rum traffic is responsible for nine-tenths of the crime of our community," he said. "The open saloon in the brother of blood, the friend of fraud, the enemy of industry, the mother of murder, the wife of whom, the father of lies and the child of the devil. The rum traffic corrupts our courts, bribes our jurors, defiles the ermine of the judge, peoples our penitentiaries, crowds our asylums, fills our jails and manufactures paupers and criminals."

BISHOP BOWMAN LEAVES.

Bishop Thomas F. Bowman of the Evangelical association left this morning for California. He preached three times in Portland yesterday. In the morning he occupied the pulpit at the German church, Tenth and Clay streets; in the evening of First English church, East Second and Commercial streets, and in the afternoon he conducted a union service in Memorial church, East Eighteenth and Tibbets streets.

PETTY THIEVES ARE ON THE RAMPAGE

Thieves last night entered the office of the Firsaidt fuel company, Eighth street and Commercial, and stole a set of new double harness. Dan McInnes, 412 Guild street, reported this morning that he had lost some tools from the corner of Twenty-seventh and Third streets. Clay Street, 33 North Ninth street, reported that some carpenter tools belonging to him had been stolen from the corner of East Ash and Twelfth streets. The office of Pat Corcoran at Bonville was robbed of \$15 cash and \$30 worth of merchandise last night.

NEW ALASKA STEAMER.

Vessel Built by Joseph Supply Completed and Ready for Shipment.

By tonight the last stick of timber for the new Alaska steamer which was built by Joseph Supply will be loaded on cars, and shortly afterwards the vessel "knocked down" will be on her way to Tacoma. It will require 12 cars to make the shipment, and the work of getting the different sections together and making them occupy as little freight space as possible has been in progress for the greater part of a week. From Puget sound the timbers will be sent north on the steamers due to sail on June 4.

The steamer is for the Northern Commercial company, and will be operated on the Tanana river, a tributary of the Yukon. James Hannerhan, a representative of the company, arrived in the city yesterday. He is employing between 20 and 30 of the best ship carpenters and joiners that he can find to put the different sections of the new steamer together when the northern territory is reached. The work will be at St. Michaels, and it is the intention to have the steamer in commission a few days after the shipment reaches its destination.

The company has a large fleet of vessels plying in northern waters, and the mechanics who are going to St. Michaels will remain there the balance of the season doing repair work.

JEWISH RIOTERS ARE ARRESTED

SOLOMON WEINSTEIN AND F. NUD-
LEMAN APPREHENDED FOR
BREAKING UP SYNAGOGUE SER-
VICES—BATTER CHARGED WITH
SERIOUS OFFENSES.

Following close upon the sensational scenes at synagogues Nevah Zedek Talmud Torah, Saturday morning, at which time only the presence of mind of more conservative members of the congregation sufficed to still the storm that rose over the attack by Solomon Weinstein on Rabbi Abbey, warrants were served on Weinstein and F. Nudleman today. In the municipal court both men furnished bonds in the sum of \$250 each, and are now at liberty. Their cases are set for trial tomorrow.

Charged With Serious Offenses.
Weinstein, it appears, was the chief disturber at the meeting, but from the complaints, it would seem that Nudleman's offense, in the eyes of the law, is more serious. Weinstein is charged with disturbing a religious meeting, by making unnecessary noise, while Nudleman is charged with threatening to kill Rabbi Abbey by saying: "I will go to the synagogue and tear out the rabbi's gown; I will tear him to pieces."

1. Apple, the president of the congregation, and C. Davidson, a trustee, signed the complaint against Nudleman. Upon the advice of their attorney, D. S. Cohen, both of the men refused to make statements today, but said that they would be able to clear themselves. That there has been discontent and trouble among the members of the congregation both admitted, but they would make no further statement.

As published yesterday morning, Weinstein, at the close of the services in commemoration of the feast of the Pentecost, hurried to the pulpit and from that place called Rabbi Abbey an impostor, characterized his words as falsehoods and finished by calling him "anti-Semitic."

Fundamentalism broke loose. Some members cried out to "lynch the blasphemers," and had it not been for older and wiser heads among those present a serious riot would have ensued. As it was, the disturber was hurried out of the synagogue and further difficulties prevented.

The Friday night previous, Weinstein, it is said, rose in the meeting and declared the rabbi's words false, and from the ill feeling known to exist it was anticipated that there would be trouble Saturday morning. The congregation composed almost exclusively of Russian Jews.

District Attorney Manning represents the state in the case.

BOY KILLED IN CAR COLLISION

REGINALD MERRIMAN, AGED 19,
CRUSHED WHEN SOUTH PORT-
LAND CAR CRASHES INTO ONE
ON FULTON LINE—CORONER TO
HOLD AN INQUEST.

Coroner J. F. Finley will hold an inquest tomorrow afternoon in the case of Reginald Merriman, aged 19 years, who was fatally injured in a collision between a Fulton and South Portland street car at First and Grant streets just before last midnight. The lad was hurried to patrol wagon to the Good Samaritan hospital, and died within a few minutes. He was a son of William A. Merriman, of 522 East Nineteenth street, and at the time of his death was in the employ of the Hotel Seelye. Previously he worked for the Hasty Messenger company and was well known in the city.

The Fulton car was loaded heavily with passengers returning from Rhoads' park, and had proceeded south as far as a switch at First and Grant streets, near the curve. There the trolley left the wire, and it was while Conductor Joe Wright was working his way back to the rear platform to replace it that the South Portland car rounded the curve. Seeing no light ahead, Mortimer Horning had no warning of the impending danger until within a few feet of the car. He then did all in his power to stop his car, but in the collision that resulted Merriman was crushed so badly that he died.

The injured boy was quickly transferred to another car and brought back to the city. At the corner of Third and Grant streets he was placed in a patrol wagon and taken to the hospital.

Coroner Finley spent this forenoon investigating the accident, and concluded to hold an inquest.

HARRIMAN ROASTED IN SECURITIES CASE

Trenton, N. J., May 23.—Attorney John Johnson, representing the Northern Securities company, resumed his argument this morning in the Harriman-Pierce suit to restrain the distribution of assets of the Northern Securities company.

Harriman made caustic references to Johnson, who, he said, became a director in the Northern Securities company and that his stock acquired in the security company was through a vote. Therefore, said Harriman, he had no special rights in the case.

STRAKE AT A STANDSTILL.
