MORE TRAILERS ON ST. JOHNS LINE

President Swigert of the City & Suburban Street Car company, said last night that trailers are being worked on the St. Johns line of the company, and that more trailers are to be added. Double trailers are being run on Sunday, to accommodate the increased business.

This decision of the City & Suburban school boy and girl, to a part, at least, in the upbuilding and development of the city and state.

I am advised that the Commercial club will be glad to correspond with and send advertising matter to people at a distance when the names are furnished by citizens of Portland and Oregon, and while this is a splendid plan, it is a still better one to have printed matter accompanied by the name of the sender, and a personal letter always adds interest to the facts given in type.

MAKE ANSWER TO COMMISSIONERS

LEWIS AND CLARK AUTHORITY
REPLY TO HARRY AND WILLIAMS,
WHO OBJECT TO \$20,000
APPROPRIATION — TO INVITE
ECONOMIC CONGRESS.

G. F. Harry and Frank Williams, members of the Lewis and Clark state fair commission at St. Louis, will be informed by Secretary Edward C. Giltner that the commission has not appropriated an additional \$20,000 for buildings at the 1905 exposition, above what was first intended for building purposes, but that only \$5,000 additional has been given the fair directors.

This is the upshot of the action taken at a meeting of the commission yesterday afternoon, as a result of the letter received by the commission and published in Friday's issue of The Journal, from Mr. Harry and Mr. Williams. These gentlemen are now in St. Louis. They protested in a very strong manner against the action of the commission in granting \$20,000 for the erection of three additional buildings. It is claimed that \$74,990 of this amount was planned to be appropriated some months ago, but owing to various changes that had occurred, the money had never been finally set aside. The resolution requesting Secretary Giltner to write Commissioners Harry and Williams regarding the recent appropriation was introduced by J. H. Albert, and is as follows:

Misunderstanding.
Resolved, That the secretary be instructed to acknowledge the receipt of the communication of Commissioners Harry and Williams, and inform them that they misunderstood the situation; that there has not been an additional appropriation of \$20,000 for building purposes, but of only about \$5,000, the balance of the \$20,000 having been originally appropriated by the commission for the purpose; that the commission has carefully considered the outlay necessary in the future to encourage, secure and promote a full and complete exhibition of the arts and industries of the state, and in their judgment the means are ample for the purpose.

For Social Congresses.
The following resolution, introduced by Professor Young, was adopted:
Resolved, That it is the sense of the commission that a series of economic and social congresses should be held in connection with the exposition, and that the committee on education, history and educational congresses be instructed to take preliminary provisional steps for organizing such congresses.

Will Visit St. Louis Fair.
Oregon day at the St. Louis fair, June 15, will find seven of the state Lewis and Clark commission at the Missouri city. Besides Commissioners G. F. Harry and Frank Williams, who are now at St. Louis, President Jefferson Myers, and Commissioners Rafferty, Young, Spencer and Scott will be present at the exercises to be held in honor of the day at the Oregon building.

Besides the members of the commission, it is expected that several other well known men of Oregon will be present at the exercises, including ex-United States Senator McBride, who will deliver an address. Other speeches will be made by President Jefferson Myers and President David M. Francis of the St. Louis exposition.

Want Shorter Work Day.
A delegation of the State Federation of Labor visited the commission yesterday afternoon, and protested against carpenters at work on the fair buildings having to work nine hours a day, and being paid for this labor from \$1.85 to \$2 per day, which is below the union scale of \$2.50. The delegation consisted of G. H. Gram, president of the State Federation of Labor, Harry Rogers and H. J. Kundert.

Mr. Gram said that they visited the commission in order that they might lead on any trouble that may cause if the carpenters at work on the fair buildings were not paid the union scale of wages, and their working day be reduced to eight hours. He stated that the federation did not demand that they be employed, but that it did ask that the workmen receive the same treatment that is accorded carpenters and joiners at work in other parts of the city. He said that the laboring men of Oregon were deeply interested in the success of the 1905 fair, but if the men employed on the buildings were not given a reasonable wage, and a reasonable working day, there might be some trouble.

Talks along this same line were made by Harry Rogers and H. J. Kundert. The visitors were informed that the commission has not power to act in the matter, as all they did was to approve the plan of the buildings, that were submitted by the directors of the corporation. Commissioner Spencer said that the time to have made an objection regarding wages was at the time the bids had been let. The visitors were informed that they should appear before the board of directors of the corporation and state their objections.

Minor Business Transacted.
The thanks of the commission were given to A. R. Gebhardt for an article written by him on the game and fish of Oregon in booklet form. President Myers was given authority to suitably decorate the Oregon building at the St. Louis fair with furniture and pictures. It was voted that suitable metal plates be put on the buildings at the Lewis and Clark exposition that were erected by the commission. A letter was read from Tarleton H. Bean, chief of the forestry department at the St. Louis fair, which complimented this state upon its fine exhibits in the forestry, fish and game departments there.
