CHARLES W. GANONG DIES AT CANEMAH

DEATH RESULTS FROM CEREBRAL
HEMORRHAGE SUSTAINED
THIRTY YEARS AGO, CAUSING PARALYSIS—LAND OFFICE
—PAPER MILLS BUYING LOGS.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Oregon City, May 30.—Charles Wentworth Ganong, prominent citizen, pioneer and Democrat, died at his home in Canemah yesterday afternoon at 1:30, the cause of his death being cerebral hemorrhage which came to him Friday morning and which resulted in paralysis of his right side and rendered him unconscious. He was unconscious to the last but did not suffer any pain and died unaware that his bedside was surrounded by his children and grandchildren. He leaves a wife, Elizabeth Bacon Allen Ganong, and four children: Joseph Wentworth Ganong of Portland, Richard Clark Ganong, Mrs. Annie Ellen Howard and Mrs. Matilda Ganong Miller, all of Oregon City. The funeral services will be held at St. Paul's Episcopal church at 3 o'clock Tuesday. The services at the grave will be conducted by the Masonic order, of which he was a member.

Charles Wentworth Ganong was born December 26, 1837, in Toronto, Canada, and soon after moved to Missouri with his parents. He left Missouri and made the trip across the plains to California in 1851 and came to Oregon in 1853. On January 8, 1853, he married Miss Elizabeth Bacon Allen, daughter of Dr. William R. Allen, a native of Kentucky, who came to Oregon in 1850. They settled down on their present farm south of Oregon City about 35 years ago and since that time it has developed and improved until the Ganong place is one of the landmarks on the upper Willamette river.

Mr. Ganong will always be remembered for his straightforward honesty and his loyalty to the Democratic party. He was one of the old line Democrats and he despised anything that savored of trickery in his or any other party. In 1890 he was the Democratic candidate for sheriff of Clackamas county and in a county where the normal Republican majority is 1,000, he was defeated by but 27 votes. Two years after he ran again and was elected. During his term of office he gained a name for good work and was honored by members of all parties for his honesty. By the death of Uncle "Billy" Ganong, as he was affectionately called by all who knew him, the Democratic party has lost one of its sturdy oak and the state a good citizen.

TURNER IS THE DEMOCRATIC MOSES

RE-EMERSON HAS BEEN CHOSEN AS
THE STANDARD-BEARER DURING
THE CAMPAIGN — IN CLATSOP
COUNTY SHAW IS CONSIDERED AS
CHOICE FOR STATE SENATE.

Vancouver, Wash., May 30.—It is now almost three weeks since the state convention at Tacoma and the Democratic party of the state is confident that it has found the Moses who will lead it out of the wilderness and into the promised land. George Turner of Spokane is the one who has been chosen as the standard-bearer during the campaign.

Prominent Democrats of Clatsop county, while admitting that under ordinary conditions Clatsop county is Republican by a majority of about 500, yet they are disposed to believe that the action of the Republican primary at Tacoma in delivering the executive, the legislative and the judicial offices of the state into the control of the railroad corporations, has so disaffected a large number of voters that so far as the state and county issues are concerned, they will cast their ballots at the fall election for the state ticket and, at least, a portion of the county ticket put up by the Democratic party. Not that these disaffected voters love Turner more, but they hate him less.

So far as the county ticket has been mentioned, it is conceded that Col. B. P. Shaw is the choice of the Democrats for the state senate. Shaw has represented the county in the state legislature on several occasions and has acquitted himself in that capacity with credit to the county, to his constituents and to himself. He is a popular man and enjoys the confidence of the people, and he has been elected to the legislature in spite of the natural Republican majority in the county.

George Brady is named as a candidate for sheriff on this ticket. Mr. Brady is a lumberman and is well and favorably known throughout the county, and while he has never been before the people as a candidate for any office, yet it is assumed that he will make a creditable and energetic campaign.

For the office of prosecuting attorney, E. M. Green will probably be the nominee. It is claimed that the leaders of the Democratic party that under the peculiar circumstances attending the nomination of the Republican candidate for this office a portion, at least, of the Republican voters would be glad for a man whom they feel would enforce the laws of the state without being pledged in advance to furnish immunity to any one class of offenders.

QUESTION OF INCORPORATION DE-
TERMINED AT SATURDAY'S ELE-
CTION AND ISSUE SATISFACTORY
BUT LITTLE-ARTISANS OBLI-
VIOUS—MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Gresham, Or., May 30.—At the election held here Saturday it was determined by a vote of 51 to 18 that this place be incorporated. This point has been at issue for several months and is at last satisfactorily settled. It is the first step toward city life, and following will come the many privileges at forded any suburban village.

The ballot for officers shows the following successful aspirants: Mayor, Lewis Shattuck, of Shattuck Bros.; recorder, H. L. St. Clair, former Methodist Episcopal minister of this place; treasurer, J. D. Regner, harness dealer; marshal, B. W. Emery, proprietor of the Gresham livery stable. Aldermen—John Cooley, former road supervisor of district No. 10; T. R. Nowitt, proprietor of Gresham meat market and grocery store; George W. Kenney, road supervisor; Charles Merrill, Sr., teamster; J. G. Metzger, carpenter; J. H. Metzger, former merchant of this place. The total number of votes cast was 73.

The work has been quite well taken hold of lately, and in a very short time Rockwood can boast of being one of the best assemblies in the state.

COWLITZ COUNTY FRUIT PROSPECTS

COLD RAINS OF MARCH AND APRIL
WITH OCCASIONAL FROSTS
CAUSED DAMAGE — BARTLETT
PRUNES, ITALIAN PRUNES AND
CHERRIES ALMOST A FAILURE.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Kalama, Wash., May 30.—The cold rains of March and the fore part of April, with an occasional frost, materially damaged the fruit prospects in Cowlitz county this year. Royal Anne cherries are very scarce on the trees, especially on high lands, but on the low lands they are a little better.

Italian prunes are even a worse failure than the red cherries. There will not be more than enough to supply the local demand. Bartlett pears are also nearly a failure. They are one of the choice fruits, and their failure will entail considerable loss. The three best selling fruits are thus out for this year.

Other fruits promise well, but are not so extensively raised nor in so great demand. Strawberries are plentiful and will commence coming into market next week.

Black cherries are looking well and promise a full crop. Silver prunes and all kinds of plums are full and will in a measure make up for the failure of the Italian prunes. The redeeming feature in the fruit situation is the apple crop now on the trees. Never in the history of the county have the trees been fuller than at present, and if no misfortune overtakes them the crop will be a record-breaker. The only thing that seems to menace the apple crop is the dry weather. The rainfall for May has been very light and the weather very warm.

The indications are that the dry season has set in two months earlier than usual. The weather conditions for the last three weeks have been such as would be expected in this locality in July.

**MAY FESTIVAL AT
CLATSKANIE CLOSING**

An interesting feature was the baby show Saturday afternoon, the infant of Mr. and Mrs. Silas Graham receiving the first prize, and the child of Mr. and Mrs. George Tichenor the second. Eighteen babies were entered in the contest. Miss Mary Tichenor was the May queen.

SALEM WOMAN IS KILLED BY CARS

DEATH BETWEEN TWO CARS BEING
SWITCHED, IN CAUSING TO
DEATH—PARLOR MATCHES CAUSE
FIRE—DEATH OF MRS. O'BRIEN.

Salem, Or., May 30.—Mrs. J. H. Penland, of South Salem, was crushed to death between freight cars at 1:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon on her way home. She started down the railroad track on Commercial street. The local south-bound freight train was switching in the yards near the freight depot, and two of the large-size box cars had been uncoupled and left standing on Commercial street, a space of about four feet being left between them to allow people to pass as required by the city ordinance. Several people had crossed just in front of Mrs. Penland, but as she approached, the train back in onto the switch to couple onto the cars again. She evidently did not see the approaching train, and walked between the two motionless cars. She had reached the center of the car opposite the coupling when the train struck the first car, and drove it against the second. Mrs. Penland was caught squarely by the couplings.

Mrs. Penland was 47 years of age, and has been married for 30 years. She leaves three children, all grown. Mrs. Thomas Golden of Salem, Miss Leona, a deaf mute, who resides at home, and Mrs. Guy Gilbert of the state of Washington.

Parlor Matches Cause Fire.
Fire broke out in the home of Night Officer J. W. Lewis Saturday afternoon, and but for the prompt action on the part of Mrs. Lewis and the neighbors the house would have been in ashes before the fire department made the long run from the engine-house. Mrs. Lewis returned from spending the evening at the home of a neighbor, and when she struck a parlor match the head flew off and lighted on a sofa, which immediately became a mass of flame. The sofa, lace curtains and other interior articles were burned, but the flames were extinguished before the fire department arrived.

A peculiar coincidence, A. L. Brown, manager of the Salem Water company, caused a fire the same evening by the head of a parlor match flying off and striking a can of powder in the works. As he was standing near the powder, his hands were burned and his face singed, but not seriously.

Elaborate Soldier's Daughter Dead.
Mrs. Johanna O'Brien, 72 years old, a pioneer of Salem, died at her home on the corner of Capital and Marion streets, in the city, yesterday morning of a complication of diseases. She was born in Ireland and came to the United States in 1852. Her maiden name was O'Conner and she was the daughter of an illustrious English soldier who served 23 years under Wellington in the peninsular wars. In the war against Napoleon he won a gold medal for bravery.

A few years ago she fell heir to a small fortune from her sister, and now owns extensive property interests in Salem and several farms in Marion and Polk counties. Five sons and a daughter—W. B. Lawler, Albert George and Charles O'Brien of Salem, Frank O'Brien, proprietor of the St. Charles hotel of Albany, and Miss Anna O'Brien of Salem.
