RANKIN'S TEAM

BIG BILL HAYNES, OF THE SEAS
FOR ALL-PORTLANDS, PITCHED
A CLEVER GAME—LETTOV'S SUP-
PORT MAKES SEVERAL COMELY
WILD THROWS.

Big Bill Haynes was delegated to do the pitching for the All-Portlands yesterday, and he obligingly tackled the job. Hugo Seibels complained of a sore arm, and therefore "Little Willie" had a chance to display his ability in the pitching line.

Haynes does not pretend to be a slab artist. He prefers to play first base, but if he can get away with what he has in the throwing line, as he did yesterday, Jack Rankin would do well to use him regularly in the box. Haynes' opponent in the pitching line was Henry Lettov. Lettov pitched a excellent game, and but for a couple of questionable decisions dispensed by Umpire Burley Stevens and his team-mates' wild throwing might have won his game.

Haynes struck out seven of the All-Portlands sluggers, while Lettov made way with five of the Schillers in this manner. Claude Schmeer covered shortstop for the All-Portlands and made his lone error on the first ball hit down to him, which bounded badly. After that the kid had 10 more chances and handled every one in a clever style. He also stole two bases and otherwise helped materially in the victory of the All-Portlands. Jack Rankin and Archie Parrott also put up splendid fielding exhibitions.

Broderick and Hart distinguished themselves by making difficult stops, but marred their work by heaving the ball yards out of reach of Alec McNinis, the clever first-baseman.

Cal Giles fanned out the first three times he was at bat, but on the fourth time up he tore off the longest hit of the day, a three-bagger to center-field fence.

Hughes, who played right on the Schiller team, is a clever player, very fast going to first and a good base-runner. His own chances in the outfield were accepted cleverly. Slavin's work back of the bat was all that could be asked.
